

A new chapter for South Kaipara Men and Family Centre

Following the temporary closure of Alison McKenzie House in 2016, the South Kaipara Men and Family Centre was grateful to find temporary accommodation at the Helensville Women & Family Centre across the road. A permanent home has now been found in the Awaroa Road building formerly housing the Te Awaroa Youth Club, a grand old lady who was

formerly the Takapuna Post Office and was transported to Helensville in six pieces by Hans van Duyn's Eurovision Building Removals in the mid-80s.

Last December, the South Kaipara

Men's Trust (now referred to more commonly as the Men and Family Centre) appointed retired Helensville resident Mike Bridgman as its new manager. His purpose is to re-build and re-energise the Centre, which has evolved considerably since it was set up around 15 years ago "to strengthen the role of fathers within the family" in response to the proliferation of graffiti in the town.

Mike, who had an extensive business background in the media, including roles in sales, marketing and management, and who is also involved in the community through the voluntary literacy group and the Citizens Advice Bureau, is focused on turning the place into a community hub, with the Men and Family Centre as its primary focus. He's pleased that, with a shared space that now includes a gym corner, a meeting room and a budding library, the building is really coming to life. The Van Duyn family trust, which owns the building, has generously allowed the Men and Family Trust to use the building rent-free for its first year of

occupancy. Money must still be found for the operating costs, and a considerable part of Mike's time is spent bringing in and managing funding from organisations such as Foundation North and the Community Organisation Grants Scheme (COGS). The local branch of St John and others have donated things like kitchen equipment. More recently a generous local donated a fridge/

freezer.



five tutors currently helping local people with literacy issues. The plan is to bring more volunteer tutors into the programme to meet increasing client numbers; South Kaipara Youth Trust (SKYouth), also running for several years, is now also using the space. This not-for-profit organisation supports community-led youth initiatives in the South Kaipara area. With a weekly youth club for 11-15-year-olds, together with the Kaipara Men's Centre, SKYouth supports pathways for youth-led initiatives including literacy support, and runs community movie nights and a homework club; local St John cadets are also pleased to be able to use the space for weekly training as their numbers are growing; a women's exercise group meets there regularly and rents space for their exercise programme.

Two more projects are in the beginning stages. A support group for solo dads is being built around a workshop concept, because, as Mike says, "Men talk better while they're making things." Generous donations of tools

and a bench are helping turn this project into a reality

Last, but by no means the least, the raised gardens already in place will be cleared and replanted, with a view to having a thriving community asset right at the back door. Mike's plan is that the gardens will be an important learning site and provide seasonal produce.

Collaborating with other agencies in Helensville is a key part of the plan and the Men and Family Centre takes part in monthly community support meetings where all the agencies in the town get together and talk about what they're doing. As Mike explains, "Collaboration between agencies is vital, especially given that there's so much voluntary work underpinning our local community."

Karen St John By Helen Martin

Kaukapakapa artist Karen St John was raised in a single-parent family by her father, a practical man whose own upbringing gave him the skills to build his own houses and furniture, to make Karen a dress for the school dance and to teach her how to sew. Working around fabric has been a theme in Karen's life – her first job was in a Wellington sewing factory, later in Auckland, sewing for a friend who had a clothing label took her to the level of a professional, and when she worked in a costume hire shop she took her first steps towards becoming an artist by going to night school to learn pattern drafting.

Travel overseas to places like Korea, Hong Kong, the Phillipines and Great Britain came next. Time spent in Japan teaching English sparked the interest in the Japanese language that saw Karen studying it at university back in New Zealand and then in Sydney, where she lived, worked and partied for a time. Returning briefly to Hong Kong she became increasingly aware of issues facing the planet. "Someone I knew was working on a fundraiser for Belize Rainforest and I began to learn about what was happening to the environment," she says.

Back in New Zealand, Karen volunteered at Greenpeace and was hired to help them set up and run their first telemarketing operation, before being employed as a fundraising manager, overlooking the direct marketing and telemarketing. Skills gained in that job came in useful when, as the partner of chef and café owner Peter Brennan, Karen fell into doing the bookkeeping for his business, enhancing her knowledge by studying accounting papers through the Open Polytech.

Looking for a positive lifestyle change Karen and Peter moved with their son Buster to Kaukapakapa over 20 years ago. For seven years Peter ran Porcini, his popular Helensville restaurant, while Karen found bookkeeping work. They spent many hours on their land, establishing extensive organic orchards and gardens to supply the restaurant and their own needs.

After the move to Kaukapakapa, Karen began to paint. "Painting is a wonderful meditative thing and I found it came easy to me," she says. But eventually she became "bored with the flatness of it" and wanted to explore ways of creating forms in 3D. This year, joining a group of women doing wool felting got Karen working with three-dimensional forms, creating animals from felt. A suggestion from Arts in the Ville organiser Kura Geere-Watson that she exhibit some during the Labour Weekend festival became the catalyst for the direction Karen had been working towards – she wanted to work with clay in a way that would also use her sewing and painting talents.

Enter the critters, anthropomorphic textile sculptures which are fantasy creatures with human-like bodies made from a combination of clay and textile, wire and wood. Everything - the forms, the clothes, the little leather boots - is made by Karen from scratch. "I make a wire armature for the body, covered with batting, then I make a cover for the body. The heads are sculpted out of air dry clay, and other components, like the lasts I use for the leather boots, are made from baked clay," she says. You'll see some at Arts in the Ville.

Karen works from home, creating her art work and running a business; after completing a diploma in pattern drafting and design at the New Zealand School of Fashion and a couple of courses in tailoring, she set up her business de Saint Tailoring, specialising in pattern drafting, made to measure alterations and repairs. She also spends time in the beautiful garden she and Pete have created. "We make sure we have fresh greens and we know where they come from and what was used to grow them. But while the property started out as a place to grow food, it's no longer just about that, it's also about being in a beautiful environment. The enhancement to your life is hard to articulate but it's a holistic thing, being a part of it as opposed to what we can get from it. Being serenaded by a tui is a priceless moment."


Bee Keeping Presentation


Sunday 16th September 9.30am to 11.30am

How will the Anti-Money Laundering and Countering Financing of Terrorism (AML/CFT) Act affect you? Pt 1

On the last day of July I received 'Beyond Balances', the monthly newsletter sent to their clients by Denise Maffey and Associates Ltd.

The main article covered the new rules that came into effect on 1 July 2018 for lawyers, and will come into effect on 1 October 2018 for Accountants. These rules are contained in the Anti-Money Laundering and Countering Financing of Terrorism (AML/CFT) Act.

A quick check on the Justice Department website at https://www.justice.govt.nz/justice-sector-policy/key-initiatives/aml-cft/info-for-businesses/lawyers-accountants/ and my head was spinning.

The rationale given for the act is that "This will help prevent money laundering, make it easier for authorities to find out where 'dirty' money came from, prosecute criminals, seize illegally earned money and assets, and stop crime and terrorism." As usual, however, it will increase the workload of professionals and increase the costs for the innocent 'Joe public' who need to access these services!

From now on any business providing a whole range of services, such as Lawyers, Accountants, Real Estate Agents, Conveyancers, Business that provide trust and company services, Businesses trading in high value goods, Sports and racing betting as well as banks, casinos, various financial service providers, and some trust and company service providers, will be required to follow the new rules.

It means that when you ask your accountant to do a job for you, and it may seem only a simple job to you, like witnessing a signature for a Trust document, they will have to go through a number of steps to determine if the rules apply in your case. If they do you will be required to make an appointment with your accountant as it could take some time. You will need to supply proof of identity, evidence of where you live (not less than 3 months old), and if money is involved you may have to provide proof of where the money came from.

As each individual accountant, law firm, bank or other business needs to check how the rules apply to them and their clients individually the cannot rely on any check done by anybody else, such as a JP, furthermore the interpretation of the rules are down to the individual firms, so what one may be happy with another may not.

As Denise Maffey says "We're still learning about all the aspects of the new rules, what tasks they apply to, and how often we need to get proofs. For lawyers, they are collecting this information now, some on a job basis, and some on a client list basis. We will be starting to collect this information from now on."

Next month we will discuss how you may be affected when you ask a JP to sign/witness some documents for you and then we will cover what to expect when buying or selling a house.

Be patient

Don't blame the professionals, they are not happy about the new rules any more than you will be.

Proof of Identity

This is a current passport, or a current firearms licence. It may NOT be a drivers licence, if you do not have one of these there are a small number of other documents but you will need to ask the firm what they will accept.

Proof of Address

This needs to be less than three months old, and show your name and residential address as a delivery address. The list may include bank statements, rates notices, power bills or a government issued letter or statement. If your mail goes to a PO Box you will need to change the address to your home address for at least one of the documents.

RSA Armistice Centenary at Helensville

The Kaipara Memorial RSA will be commemorating the 100th anniversary of the

signing of the Armistice that ended World War One on Sunday the 11th of November at 1100 hours. The club will hold a parade that will form up at 1045 hours between Countdown and the RSA and march to the Helensville War Memorial Hall Cenotaph, where at 1100 hours on the 11th day of the 11th month, exactly 100 years ago, a commemoration service will be held, including laying of wreaths and, as proclaimed by King George V, two minutes silence will be observed in memory of the 16,700 New Zealanders who died for their country in World War One, including the 35 soldiers from our district and who are remembered on the Cenotaphs at Parakai, Helensville and Kaukapakapa. (There are several names missing for some unknown reason).

The KMRSA holds dossiers on most of the men who are remembered on these Cenotaphs, with details of their name, number, rank, medals awarded, theatre of war, service records and home addresses prior to enlisting. Any relatives or people interested in viewing these dossiers should visit the KMRSA museum during opening hours at 49 Commercial Road, Helensville.

Families are encouraged to wear their relatives medals on their right chest and join the parade, Poppies will be available at the RSA. Medals should be worn by Service and ex-service personnel.

The club will be open for lunch and refreshments after the ceremony, the museum will be open and a video "ANZAC War Horses" will be playing.

Crossing the Kaipara Bar

In July, Coastguard Northern Region, in association with Coastguard Kaipara, held a free, well-attended seminar at Kaipara Cruising and




Sportfishing Club in Mill Road. Titled 'Raising the Bar', the purpose of the seminar was to give local boaties an opportunity to brush up on practices essential to avoiding danger when crossing the Kaipara Bar. As Coastguard Kaipara President Iain Gulliford said in his introduction, "The idea is not to put you off, but to give you the tools for safety."

The bar, we were told, can be a wild place; 13 miles long and 4 miles across, with a quick tide of 7 knots, waves up to 12 metres and few landmarks. 138 recorded wrecks, the most recent the Francie in 2016, are testament to the treacherous nature of the bar.

Northern Region Coastguard speakers, Darren Arthur, Coastguard Northern Region Education Manager and Nico Doodeman, Coastguard Northern Region Duty Officer, and Iain Gulliford gave a wealth of information, with plenty of examples, including You Tube clips, maps and discussion from the floor. Points covered included: why the Kaipara Bar is dangerous; local area knowledge; pre-trip planning (e.g. check weather, tide and bar conditions); essential equipment (with a lot of emphasis on the right kind of life jacket to wear when crossing the bar); steps necessary for safety (e.g. approach at moderate speed, assign roles to the crew); how to communicate with Coastguard when you're planning a crossing. The Coastguard Maritime Education Programme, which provides recreational boating courses, was also discussed.

The Victorian poet Alfred Lord Tennyson (1809-1892) wrote about his impending death in 'Crossing the Bar', using the sea as a metaphor for the barrier between life and death. It's a poem often read at funerals, with the final lines - I hope to see my Pilot face to face/When I have cross'd the bar — very familiar to mourners. By contrast, the seminar at Kaipara Cruising Club was 100% literal, not about inevitable death, but about choices to ensure life. Bottom line: If in doubt, don't go out.

From Penk's Pen

Free Speech and 'views that divide'

Whenever I'm invited to provide a contribution to this publication, my usual preference is to highlight matters of local significance. This time, however, I've decided to share some thoughts on free speech, as it's a subject that has been in the news a lot lately.

Freedom of expression is the principle that individuals and communities have a right to articulate their opinions and ideas without fear of arbitrary retaliation, censorship or sanction. It's one of the most precious human rights.

As you will no doubt be aware, our city's Mayor, Phil Goff recently sought to control the usage of an Auckland Council-owned venue, arguing that:

"Venues shouldn't be used to stir up ethnic or religious tensions. Views that divide rather than unite are repugnant and I have made my views clear."

Many of my constituents have contacted me recently to convey their concerns. In a letter to Mayor Goff, I challenged him to explain what legal or moral right he was invoking when he decided that some views were too divisive for us to hear.

The point I relayed was not that overseas visitors had the right to be heard (or even that their points were "right"). The point was actually more that Auckland's residents and ratepayers had the right to hear them, if they so chose. That right was denied.

Every day as MP for the electorate of Helensville – the west and northwest of Auckland, in other words –I hear from constituents annoyed about Auckland Council dropping the ball. (There are some honourable exceptions, particularly among our own local elected representatives, but the overall mood is dissatisfaction.)

With this in mind, my open letter concluded with the following words to the Mayor:

"I will not advocate to reduce the legitimate expression of political views, whether or not I agree with such views personally. Nor should you. Focusing attention on the core business of local government might remove any temptation you might feel to do so in the future."

Room 14 review Strike day, 2018

On Wednesday 15th August, 1,479 primary and intermediate schools in New Zealand closed due to the 2018 strike day. The strike happened because teachers wanted more money, they haven't had a pay rise in nine years and that means their wages have not gone up with inflation. The sad thing is that 40% fewer teachers are in training. Last time teachers had a pay rise guess how much they earned... they didn't earn an extra \$20 or \$15 they only earned an extra 20 cents!

We interviewed some people about the strike. According to Mrs Clarke (a teacher at Helensville Primary and a mother of 2) it



was a stressful occasion, not only because she didn't get paid but also because she had to find a place for her children to stay. Although it was also a good thing because teachers need more support.

According to Mrs Stokes (a teacher at Helensville

Primary and a mother of 3) "It felt empowering to march down Queen Street because we all had a common cause and the heart of the problem is that our children are not getting the best education they can because the teachers are overworked. When I was marching I thought we would get some negative responses from people, but instead we had a lot of support."

Haylee and Emma (two students at Helensville Primary) said they were happy about the strike day because they had a day off and felt like the teachers should get paid more because they basically have to handle children all day.

In total, 10,000 teachers marched down Queen Street, Auckland, with many more attending large rallies in Wellington, Hamilton, Whangarei, Dunedin and Christchurch.

We need to support these teachers because eventually we may not have any teachers left!



Shelly Beach Fire Brigade is fundraising for vital equipment!



Shelly Beach Volunteer Rural Fire Force was first setup by the South Head community back in 1977 and is now a part of Fire and Emergency NZ.

Over the years SBVRFF has adapted to meet the needs of this unique community. The SBVRFF covers the whole of the South Head/Kaipara Peninsula, and co-responds to other emergencies in the Nor-West region.

We are usually the first to arrive at local emergencies, and these call outs include: Medical Emergencies, Rescues, Motor Vehicle Accidents, Natural Disasters, Structural Fires and Wild Fires.

We also have crew who have travelled further afield participating in the Fire Campaigns in Australia, the US and Canada and Nationally crew have been deployed to Christchurch in the Search and Rescue operation immediately following the Earthquakes.

Crew involved in these areas undergo specialised training and all of our crew members are well trained, gaining NZQA and Fire and Emergency New Zealand industry specific qualifications.

Currently we are fundraising to make our service even more efficient. We are looking to purchase two new defibrillators to provide the community on the South Head Peninsular with greater coverage and quicker response time in the event of a cardiac emergency.

We already have defibrillators on both of our appliances at the Shelly Beach Fire Station and one with our medical co-responders in Tupare; we are looking to expand this by having defibrillators available to our medical co-responders at Wilson Road and another one further north along South Head Road.

We would greatly appreciate any help you can give by way of donation to purchase the equipment needed to respond quickly to life threatening cardiac emergencies.

10 year budget 2018 - 2028

Decisions made regarding funding for local board projects:

- The local board's key advocacy project (One Local Initiative) for an indoor court in Huapai will be progressed, with \$22.4 million earmarked for allocation following completion of any necessary pre-work or business cases which will begin this year.
- An additional \$10 million of funding per year for the local boards' transport capital fund (in the Regional Land Transport Plan).

The majority of local responses (70 per cent) were in support of the Rodney Local Board's priorities, either partially or in full. Following feedback, the Rodney Local Board will:

- Allocate a total of \$290,000 to continuation of the Healthy Harbours fund, which contributes up to 50 per cent of the cost for landowners to undertake riparian (riverbank) planting and build stock proof fencing to protect our harbours and waterways
- Grant \$150,000 to the Mahurangi Sports and Recreation Collective as a contribution towards the design of the next stage of the multisport building on Warkworth Showgrounds
- Allocate \$55,000 to the development of a master plan for the future reserve at Green Road, Dairy Flat
- Allocate \$80,000 to the development of an open space management plan for reserves across Rodney
- Continue to support and fund community-led town centre improvements, with Warkworth and Helensville receiving funding to undertake detailed designs this year
- Deliver a number of public transport, footpath and park and ride projects through the introduction of a transport targeted rate.



"There should be something for everyone from an individual needing mentoring through to courses for allied health professionals in motivational Interviewing," says Mick.


The book is available from Helensville's Paper Plus and other outlets and can also be purchased in electronic form.
