

Scouts in action by Lisa Bamberger



As a family we joined the Kaukapakapa Scout Group quite a few years ago, and so began our involvement with the Rodney Coast Challenge. The Future Proof Life Rodney Coast Challenge, as it is now known, is a multisport event (literally multiple sports in one event) that traverses the Rodney District from Muriwai Beach in the West to Wenderholm Regional Park in the east.

This iconic FUNdraising event has been run by Kaukaupakapa Scouts for 22 years. But this year was different, this year my

daughter competed. I'd like to say this involved lots of good training and preparedness - but she's a teenager and so on the day I was a little apprehensive about how she would go.

On Sunday 17th November, locals would have seen teams and

individual competitors, run through the beautiful Woodhill Forest, saunter on road bikes through sunny Helensville and ride up, up, up through Kaukapakapa to Makarau Scout Camp, from there they leapt onto their mountain bikes to courageously venture up and down the infamous Noakes Hill on their way to picturesque Puhoi, then they race down the river by Kayak to the finish line picnic and prize giving at Wenderholm.

My daughter's team, "She'll be right" was made up of brave Scouts with no previous multisport experience but with lots of grit and determination. At the end of her 10km run, Marea, with a huge smile, looking quite shattered, said "That was great! Could I do it again?" With wonder in my voice I asked "Next year?" and she replied with a cheeky smile "Now would be OK" - ahh the wisdom of youth, or was it adrenalin!

They all had the greatest fun, coming in as the 5th youth team and 1st in the School's Challenge. The first youth team home, with an incredible time of 4 hours and 1 minute, which had them the 8th team home overall, was "Mission Impossible", more Scouts and Kaipara College youth.

Some competitors living far afield, return each year to use the RCC to train for bigger multisport events, others are ticking something challenging off their bucket list and there were at least four instances of two generations entering the

event.

With any sport, attracting new players ensures the future strength of our national competition. This year we had 318 competitors including corporate teams, multiple teams from Orewa and Kaipara Colleges, and our youngest ever competitors were a team of Year 6 kids from St Heliers Primary School - they rocked!

Each stage of the event has its challenges, but overall it is a great introduction to a different sort of team sport. With a fun, family atmosphere ensuring the support crews and spectators have as much fun as the competitors.





Local work in Sculpture in the Gardens

Since 2007, Auckland Botanic Gardens in Manurewa have curated a large-scale biennial outdoor sculpture exhibition. The November 16 opening of the 2019/2020 exhibition was a lively event, with performances from musicians and refugee and migrant youth group Mixit. Speakers celebrated the many people and organisations who contribute to the Gardens' success, including Friends of the Botanic Gardens, who first initiated the idea championing New



Zealand artists by having high quality outdoor sculpture as a permanent part of the Gardens' attractions.

With the exhibition showcasing 20 works selected from 90 proposals and beautifully displayed along a 2km walking trail, it is of special interest to us is that a piece by Helensville sculptor Jeff Thomson is featured and that Jeff is the only sculptor whose work has appeared in all seven exhibitions. Islands', which is a unique and striking depiction of all the islands in the Hauraki Gulf, is shaped from used corrugated iron, water, galvanised steel mesh, hay, wire and wetland and aquatic plants, some of which were sourced from Helensville.

The exhibition is open until 1 March at 102 Hill Road, Manurewa. Entry to Auckland Botanic Gardens is free.

During December artist Andrew Denton will be occupying the front window beside the café, sculpting a nativity scene from clay. He will welcome people popping in to chat, and watching him through the window will be ever changing entertainment. The window is available to be booked for a day to a month. Additionally, space within the gallery is available for artists to operate with an audience.

Any one will be welcome to come in, sit, make tea or coffee (gold coin donation), chat. Space for meetings can be arranged for community groups at any time, with no charge (donations welcome) for not for profits. There is a private carpeted room with an expansive view available to hire by the hour or day (suitable for small meetings or consultancy, counselling etc.). Full kitchen facilities complete the potential options for use.

Volunteers have kept our collective wheels turning, in particular, so please allow me to thank you on behalf of the community (as is my unique privilege, as your elected representative) for another 12 months of selfless service.

Please take care over the upcoming Christmas-New Year period, whether you're earning or learning, caring or volunteering. Let's give our amazing emergency services much less worrying work to do on the roads and in the surf this summer.



Don't misunderstand me, it was perfectly run; It started on the dot, reports were given, motions were tabled and passed, almost without comment, committee members were elected (no voting required) and the meeting was over in 16 minutes.

This is an organisation which is drawing \$180,000 in subscriptions out of the businesses in the BID district, had a total income last year of \$232,001 and yet of the over 400 members ONLY A FEW showed any interest and turned up to the AGM – WHY. The lack of numbers could have been influenced by the fact that the Notice of the meeting was buried on page 6 of the "News from Your Association" email of 10 October. It could have been that is was held at 6pm at the Helensville Tennis Club rooms - not easy to find and finding a parking space was diabolical as the netballers had claimed them all! It could have been that the reports and accounts, which ran to over 50 pages, were only available from the Association website and were not easy to find and download, or it could be that, from my point of view, the Association does nothing relevant to the vast majority of business

Objectives: Work with businesses, agencies and iwi to improve our townships and key destinations.



Melissa Haven

Although she's only been our Community Constable since September 2019, Melissa Haven has a long association with Helensville. She went to Kaipara College, as did her father, it's where she met her future husband Liam Haven, whose family are established locals. Liam is also a Constable



at Helensville Police Station. "Because Liam works shifts, we sometimes see each other more at work than at home," says Melissa. He is also a member of the local volunteer Fire Brigade. The couple live locally with their two daughters.

While Liam joined the Police Force five years ago, having first worked as a plumber, Melissa joined a trainee programme on leaving school. "My brother-in-law was in the Police and when they came to a careers' day at school it got my attention. It seemed like an exciting job, with no two days the same, and I liked the idea of the camaraderie and the fitness side of things." After the sixmonth trainee programme, where Melissa was introduced to subjects like law, diversity and ethics, she went to Police College, graduating in December 2003. For the next 16 years her work included the front line in Henderson, community work in Massey, front line and community work in Kumeu and the family harm unit in Orewa.

As our Community Constable Melissa works with community groups and schools. She's the Police liaison for the community patrol. "The patrol volunteers are a real asset to the Police, particularly in a rural setting as we sometimes don't have the manpower to cover such a large area alone", she says. "They're doing a wonderful job keeping it running, and we want to increase the number of volunteers to make even more of an impact. "She also works closely alongside Neighbourhood Support, providing coordinator Margaret Faed with information to send out to her street coordinators and attending neighbourhood meetings. Again, the aim is to encourage more people to join.

Melissa explains that Helensville Station is fully staffed, with a Sergeant, two officers on prevention, (herself and Youth Aid Officer Lou Unkovich), and six public safety team (PST) officers, who work on the front line attending 111 calls. When there's more than one call-out, Community Constables are also required on the front line. The large area the station covers runs from Woodhill to the top of South Head, including the beach, Kaukapakapa, Makarau, Glorit, and Waitoki. With their station considered part of Tamaki Makaurau, Melissa and her colleagues are often called to support events in Auckland City like the Royal Visit and Christmas in the Park. As part of Rodney, they're required at events like the Matakana New Years' Eve celebrations and the infamous Crate Day.

The new non-emergency 105 number has recently been established to take the strain off the emergency 111 number. There was a time, not so long ago, when disorderly behaviour and graffiti were an issue in Helensville, says Melissa, but we seldom have those issues now, thanks partly to the presence of the Community Patrol. Burglaries and car break-ins are ongoing and take up much police time. There's always intense public interest when the police

helicopter turns up. "If you see the Eagle helicopter out here it may be that someone's decamped from committing a Crime, like a burglary or from a stolen car. It could be following a pursuit or looking for a missing person." There's more of a police presence now because they're fully staffed. "My goal is to get out there more and be the person who's seen. I'm working on getting to know all the business owners, giving people a chance to chat about their issues."

Melissa loves her job. "Helensville was somewhere I'd always eventually wanted to work. I think it's a cool little rural community. Compared to larger communities growing and losing their community focus there are so many community groups here that really invest in the people, and lots of volunteers doing awesome work. This job has its ups and downs, but I enjoy it. I want to give this role a good go because I feel passionate about the place."

Te Awaroa Residents & Ratepayers Association

The Annual General Meeting of Te Awaroa Residents and Ratepayers Association was held on 20th November.

A proposal to work with Helensville Museum on Council issues was well received.

Guests Damian Albert, our senior police officer, and Melissa Haven, our new community constable, engaged in discussion with those present.

Another issue for community concern: Helensville went from having a direct phone line at our Council Service Centre, to having to call Council central call centre to be transferred through to Helensville if the operator could identify the existence of Helensville. Now the Council call centre has no knowledge of any phone number to connect to Helensville, leaving us having to actually go to the service centre. The comment from service centre staff is 'people don't talk to people now, the world has changed'. Does this signal the imminent end of Helensville having a service

Museum facing two-edged sword.

When the Helensville Museum sought to locate a container on the property they lease from the Council, to house items currently deteriorating outside, Auckland Council awoke to the reality of the Museum being sited on an old tip. It took several months and numerous communications to obtain consent for the container to be placed on the grounds. Now Council has prohibited the placing of any new structures thus ending any plans for expansion. As storage facilities are desperately required this has presented some new challenges. During the process of obtaining consent they were also told that they could not plant trees and even that they should restrict gardening activities.

So the Museum is now battling bugs and bureaucracy, a twoedged sword.

The second issue highlighted by this stance of the Council is that of the Museum's boundary fence. The Museum Committee has known for some time that the northern boundary fence should be extended out a further 10 metres to fully encompass the area they are leasing. There was no need in the past to do it but the option is now no longer open to them because it involves digging holes on a former tip site, now prohibited.

The Museum is joining forces with Te Awaroa Residents and Ratepayers Association (TARRA) to form a two-edged sword to battle Council.

Coffee and a chat

In November, a coffee and a chat session, hosted by Community Constable Melissa Haven and Youth Aid Officer Lou Unkovich, was held at TeAwaroa Café to give locals a chance to meet with Helensville Police Officers, South Kaipara Community Patrol and Rodney Neighbourhood Support andbring up any concerns they may have about community issues.

The Police shared important information regarding their contact numbers. The emergency phone number is still 111. For non-emergencies, people are asked to call 105 or go online to 105.police.govt.nz. Non-emergency reports include theft in a public place, theft from a car, intentional property damage, shoplifting and lost property. The site also provides information on reports already made.

Paul Smith, who has been volunteering with South Kaipara Community Patrol for eight years, explained that the job of the volunteers is to regularly patrol their designated area, establishing community awareness of their presence and reporting anything suspicious. As 'the eyes and ears of the police', patrols free up Police resources, increase community resilience and identify safety issues. As locals are all too aware, since the South Kaipara Community Patrol has been in operation Helensville's graffiti problem has all but vanished. The Patrol, which is led by John Tarrant, is keen to sign up more volunteers. The minimum requirement is one patrol a month.

Neighbourhood Support is a nationwide community-led movement that works closely alongside the Police and brings people and neighbourhoods together to create, safe, resilient and connected communities. Rodney Neighbourhood Support coordinator MargaretFaedexplained that members are kept up with news via email and was keen to sign up new members to join the 5,500 households who already belong.
