

In search of good food



You may have seen conversations happening around the community over the last few months about food, and more specifically good food. It's part of a wider project currently underway to create a Food Plan for South Kaipara.

The project is one of the initiatives that came out of the community-led response to last year's COVID lockdown.

In the first week of the Level 4 lockdown, a number of social service agencies including Te Ha Oranga, Kindred Family Services, Out West Youth and Parent Aid North West banded together to create a foodbank for people they knew would struggle over those unprecedented few weeks.

Over a year later and the Kai Collective Te Awaroa is still going strong. A manager has been employed and every week a committed and dedicated team of volunteers pack kai parcels to feed an average of 45 families.

"As proud of the Kai Collective as we are, and as impactful as it is, we know that it is not solving the bigger issue of food security," says Ana Christmas of Kindred Family Services, one of the agencies involved in the foodbank collective. "We're so fortunate in this area to have an abundance of food with farmers, hunters and the biggest harbour in the Southern Hemisphere right on our doorstep, and yet people are still struggling to put a nutritious meal on the table each night for their family, particularly when a crisis happens."

The answer, it's hoped, will come from the community. From people who have a few too many apples falling off their backyard trees when it's picking season, to people who know how to preserve fruit and are keen to



pass that knowledge on to others.

Community gardens is an idea that's receiving a lot of interest. But there are other ideas like berm gardens where someone walking by would be welcome to pick a bunch of silverbeet, food co-ops so people can take advantage of buying in bulk, as well as ways to get food delivered for those who might struggle with transport to get to town to do a big shop.

The ideas don't stop with growing food. It could go further, for instance a community kitchen or café that creates employment, runs cooking classes and has a pay-what-you-can menu.

Mike Bridgman of the South Kaipara Men's Trust is also excited about the potential of the Food Plan. "Having people work alongside one another, at a community garden for instance, offers so much in terms of education, connection and community building," he says.

Press release: Report shows National Climate Change Risk Assessment grossly exaggerated climate change risks

A Tailrisk Economics review of the National Climate Change Risk Assessment (NCCRA) found that it grossly overstated climate change risks and assessments were based on poor quality evidence and analysis.

The purpose of the NCCRA, which was released in August 2020, was to provide the 'best available evidence, information and assessment of risks' to inform the development of a National Adaptation Plan (NAP) that will set out what will be done to respond to climate change risks.

The central message in the assessment was that the climate change risks are very serious, even in the relatively near term. Eight of the 43 sectoral risk assessments found that the consequences of climate change would be 'extreme' by 2050.

'Our review of the NCCRA found that for the most part, the assessments were not based on the 'best available evidence' and often consisted of little more than a recitation of their 'five horsemen of the apocalypse': more extreme weather events, more drought, more river flooding, higher sea levels, and more wildfires, followed by unsubstantiated claims that they will have either major or extreme consequences, with little regard to the underlying science.' said Ian Harrison Principal of Tailrisk Economics. 'Some of the NCCRA assessments were plainly absurd,' Harrison said. 'it was claimed that extreme risks to social cohesion by 2050 would result in 'permanent disruption to education, employment and community services. Patterns of daily activity and behaviour unable to continue. Coping range of all communities exceeded,' all because the temperature had increased by less than one degree and sea levels had risen by about 20 centimetres.'

The science does not show that wind speeds will increase significantly, and river flooding risk might actually fall overall. There might be some more droughts, a few more wildfires, and expenditure to protect against sea level rise, but these effects are likely to be outweighed by the positive impacts of climate change, including warmer weather and more fine days in summer, and the impact of carbon fertilisation on primary sector productivity. Tailrisk Economics reviewed the social, political and economic risk assessments, assigning evidence quality scores of between 0 and 10 to the cited evidence. The average score was a very low 3.09. Much of evidence was irrelevant or did not support the arguments. Critical research reports that did not support a 'catastrophist' narrative were often ignored or misrepresented, and in some cases steps were taken to cover up 'inconvenient' evidence. 'It is disturbing,' Harrison said 'that the science is becoming increasingly corrupted by politics and money'. 
Having tried that diligently for over 3 years now, I'm rapidly reaching the conclusion that some "vinegar" in our advocacy efforts may have at least as much chance of success.







Hamish explains: "The Safe H2O mobile unit is equipped with state-of-the-art nano-filtration which filters out anything larger than 0.001 micron. Tank sediment is vacuumed from the bottom of the tank and the balance of the water is cycled through the system removing e-coli, giardia, lead, pesticides and other contaminants to make your drinking water safe. The purified water is returned to the tank ready for use."

The Safe H2O process retains and purifies your precious water, meaning there is no requirement to purchase replacement water. The process has the added benefit of not risking damaging the insides of your tank.

The Safe H2O system has been successfully running for six years elsewhere in New Zealand. Hamish decided to bring the service to the northern market after observing the recent droughts and the difficulty in sourcing water.

"Water is a precious commodity, and especially as climate change continues to affect weather, it's important not to waste it."

Clean and safe drinking water is critical to ensure the good health of you and your family. And it is something we often take for granted, as various recent incidents with water quality around the country demonstrate.

The Ministry of Health recommends water tanks are inspected and cleaned annually, and Hamish says it is important to continually do a visual check of sediment build up.

"Whether its birds, rats, possums, pollen or someone spraying in the area, contaminants build up over time. This can apply to rain or bore water."

Hamish says a regular tank clean will not only provide clean and safe water it will also allow household filters to work better and last longer. Ultimately this saves costs, on top of being better for your health.

Hamish said, "We regularly hear the comment that 'we have built up immunity' to whatever is in the tank water. We had one farmer who had not cleaned his tanks for 20 years and suffered from shingles for over a year with his medication making no impact on the disease. We cleaned his tank and water and he contacted us two weeks later to say the shingles were clearing up."

I became a teacher to make a difference for our Maori tamariki in mainstream school settings – I want them to succeed and reach their potential in all areas of school. "


