Your generosity and caring are appreciated. The same applies to some who "are not coming back", coming back for a short time again and again. Thank you for being there when we needed you.

We have been the recipient of gifts of lemons for Lemon Slice, Lemon Sour Cream Cake, and that amazing Lemon Tart. Then there is the parsley lady who kept up our supply, and a keen gardener bringing excess produce to be turned into something delicious. Other gifts of produce came in, and boxes of chocolates and bottles of alcohol went down a treat too. Thank you for sharing the love.

Many young people have done a stint at The Café and earned a bit of money while gaining some skills, a work history, and reference to help them on their journey. There have been proud young mums and dads bringing in a newborn for us to coo over, that child growing up, going to school, college even. I'm pretty sure there are teenagers who have been regulars all their lives. Rain, hail, or shine, Sunday would bring out the hardy bikers who have been regulars for at least 20 years. Not always the same ones but always some, every Sunday, including one still riding who had his 90th birthday there. That's pretty special.

I am proud that The Café is a meeting place, pick up and drop off point, counselling service, lost property office, fund raiser, charity supporter, information centre (the other one), news service, flower seller (on behalf of Love Flowers), actual destination, and many other things besides. I don't hesitate to credit all that to the big-hearted girls who work there.

It has been hard work, with long hours and unbelievably challenging at times. There have been tears and laughter, dramas, medical events, police incidents and accidents, which have all become part of an experience shared with the warm hearted, community minded, encouraging, and supportive people of Helensville.

Thanks to landlords Jae and Nima, also Kara Singer from Arizto, I can now hang up my apron, take it a bit easier and be on the other side of the counter for a change.

There are many regulars I would like to say goodbye and thank you to. I hope you know who you are. You're the ones who



would have to come to a party if we could have had one.

I offer my best wishes to the new owner and would like you to know you will see familiar faces who remember your coffee order when they reopen.

Long before the days of virtual reality there were actual families and communities connected by organised recreation. In a time when travelling any great distance was difficult, there was a need to make your own fun closer to home, and make fun they did. Gatherings took place which were as much about socialising as exercising and competing - a way to keep up with the news of village life.

In 1885 the Kaukapakapa Jockey Club was formed and the first race meeting held which was attended by over 300 people. School swimming was a 'boys only' affair, which involved stripping off behind a hawthorn hedge, swimming naked and then running up and down the paddock to dry off. That's until the girls wanted in...... Next came a tennis club with courts marked out at the school, the Kaukapakapa Rifle Club in 1914, the Bowling Green in 1929 and the school pool in 1953. Add to this rugby, croquet, horse riding, hockey and cricket to name a few, and you can conjure up an image of a thriving active community.



We live in an age dominated by numbers. Over the last couple of months, as a nation we have been obsessively watching the number of COVID-19 cases, the number of ICU beds available, the number of vaccinations and so on.

Impacts of some numbers are very clear but others are much less so, requiring extra analysis or even soul-searching.

In the case of statistics relating to the economy, it's all too easy for our eyes to glaze over when figures get thrown about. But while interest rates may not seem like a great source of interest (pun intended), of course their effect on local families and work places can be huge.

It is probably more helpful to think about sets of numbers such as inflation and interest rates as indicating how good our quality of life can get.

In the case of inflation, it was disheartening to see news recently that the annual figure for the last 12 months is now 4.9%. The expectation is that interest rates will rise as a result, which is obviously a bad news for those owing mortgage-secured loans. And of course inflation itself can have a corrosive effect on wages.

For our people here in northern and west Auckland, and across the country for that matter, the greatest danger is of course "stagflation".

It's been years since we faced such a combination of stagnant economic conditions (perhaps inevitable following a global pandemic) and inflation (unavoidable when extra printed cash is swirling around).

If we think about the things that lie within our control, as individuals, families and communities, the answer surely lies in sticking together as best we can.

A year ago, the phrase "support local" was a catchery to rally our region around organisations – especially local businesses – that had been hit hard. In the dying weeks of 2021 it will be at least as important a sentiment, if not more so.

While it's currently necessary to purchase so many goods online – and the whole world is at our fingertips – we can still consciously choose the local, independent little guy or girl. It's our best hope of outrunning inflation. Improving the incomes of our friends, family and neighbours must be a priority. In an age of numbers, these ones really do matter.

From the Principal's Desk - Lockdown Learning

Interesting times for all of us living here in Auckland at the moment! Not least of which would be negotiating lockdown with a teenager. At Kaipara College we love our teenagers, for all their trials and tribulations they are passionate, interesting, curious, talented, funny, courageous and kind. Lockdown learning is not easy by any means and we have been very inspired by how studious and resilient our students are. Recently we have opened our doors to our senior students for targeted workshops for those who need them the most. Students are genuinely happy to see their teachers, but happier still to get on with their work in subjects that are particularly challenged by lockdown. For the next four weeks, the art, carpentry, science and maths spaces and others are buzzing with questions, activity and purpose, bringing life back to a school that has been closed for 10 weeks. All of this is happening while on-line learning continues for all our students, who remain at home.

The teachers at Kaipara College have been working tirelessly during lockdown, contacting students who are struggling individually, running on-line lessons, marking, giving feedback and creating stimulating lessons trying to keep our students engaged, as well as schooling their own children and supporting their immediate whânau and community. A sense of community has always been and remains very important to Kaipara College, but this has been heightened by lockdown. We know how important maintaining connections with our students and their whânau and each other are, and are working hard to keep on connecting. Sometimes it's a struggle to make connections with students, as they are no longer here on site, or sitting in the classrooms with us. But we never give up and hope that students feel supported by their teachers and the College community as a whole.

This year is looking different to what we know and love about "normal". Everyday there seems to be something new that we are being asked to consider or contend with, each of us trying to make the best of a situation none of us want to be in, individually and collectively. I do feel very much for our young people who are not able currently to enjoy the carefree life that they should be able to at the moment. Our young people are grieving, as we all are, for what life used to be like. Even simple things, like a haircut or a day or some time with friends. I think collectively we have strength as the Kaipara College community, however, as a school our main concern is maximising the wellbeing and educational achievement of all the young people who come to us. Wasted opportunity or waste to energy

New Zealanders collectively dump around 3.5 million tonnes of waste in landfills every year.

The big regulating Government think they are going to solve this problem with even more landfill taxes and paying councils to collect even more plastics which can't be recycled in New Zealand, and are banned by the countries we used to wish-cycle them to.

Recent proposals from the Climate Change Commission and the Government to reduce methane gas emissions from landfills, include collecting food waste separately from general rubbish.

Auckland Council has a trial food waste collection system which it intends to roll out across the city, if it can find the budget to pay for a fleet of dozens more trucks, and hundreds of thousands of plastic bins for Aucklander's kitchen scraps.

It turns out that Councils original plan to process highly odorous and mostly liquid food waste in Auckland was not feasible, so they are instead trucking the sludgehundreds of kilometresto Reporoa in the central North Island to mix with other composting waste.

This enormous waste of Council time and cost to ratepayers delivers a muchworse environmental outcome thanthe status quo, where food scraps go to local landfillsrunningmethane collection and gas to energy systems.

This is a case study for why Councils and Government should leave waste collection, processing and treatment solutions to experts, and simply set and monitor environmental performance targets.

Sincere efforts to recycle our way to a zero-waste future have failed and will continue to fail.

That is because many products are simply not viable to recycle, like the hundreds of thousands of tonnes of plastic and foam rubber produced from shredding 150,000 end of life vehicles, eft over from sorting and recycling plastics and paper, and treated timber from demolition and building.

Five million used tyres arethorn away every year, with only a

small volume used to replace coal in cement production.

Europe decided over twenty years ago to phase out landfills, because they believe that burying todays waste as a toxic gift to future generations is not just unethical, it is completely unnecessary.

The Danes chose waste to energy to complement their already high recycling rates, a country very similar to New Zealand, with unique environments and a valuable dairy industry. It makes sensefor New Zealand to now move quickly in that direction.

Project Keais giving new hope. The South Island Resource Recovery partnership, with the latest waste to energy innovations from Spain and China, intends to process 350,000 tonnes of waste currently dumped inlocal landfills.

Project Keasolves the major barrier to community acceptance,a high temperature plasma system that captures and converts air emissions into molten glass, which can be safely reused in concrete and building products.

Carbon dioxide and heat will be directed to local glasshouses to support year-round cropping, and 32MW of surplus energy will be injected into the local power grid, enough to power around 20,000 homes.

ACT does not believe that landfills can or should be eliminated. They will always have a role. Similarly, recycling has a valuable role to play, but we should acknowledge that it is not a panacea. It is an industrial process that makes sense in some circumstances and not in others.

The Government has called for submissions on a national waste strategy. If you want real solutions to reduce waste to landfill, like Project Kea, make your submission beforeNovember 26. Tell the Government waste to energy must be part of the solution.



For year 13 Students, the last few months have been an interesting end of our time at Kaipara College. It has not been the end everyone hoped for. Some things have been the same- we still have to do the same schoolwork, and we were able to have the school ball a month before lockdown. Most other aspects have changed. Sports games have been cancelled, classmates are only seen through Google Meets, 18th birthday parties have been postponed, and driving tests have been moved far into the future. We may never see our classmates again, at least, not in the way we have been used to.

When the lockdown was announced, year 13 was in the midst of university applications. Quite a few students were planning to fly down to Wellington to go to university open days the next weekend. Lockdown meant that we had to apply for universities all across the country without seeing what we were applying for. Planning to move somewhere you've never actually seen can be a bit daunting, especially when you have to put a deposit on your accommodation.

When lockdown was announced, we quickly fell back into the routine of going to class video calls, then procrastinating over the work set. It is always hit and miss over how many students show up. Even though the video calls were compulsory, in some classes I found myself alone with the teacher.

We were hoping that exams would be cancelled. They weren't. At the time of writing, we have to submit work to our teachers for a derived grade. We will still have to sit the exams, but will get the better grade of the two.

Many students find it much harder to learn at home, without the help of a teacher. However, the learning recognition credits helped many students pass the year earlier than normal. Lockdown is still stressful for students who are doing technology or art subjects they can't easily do at home. Other students struggled to learn content they needed for their university course.

Unlike many other schools, Kaipara College did not open fully to seniors on Tuesday 26th October. Instead they have held targeted, invite only workshops for students who need them. There are limited numbers in school. Students who need to work at school can. This is good, because it means we aren't going to school just to do the work we'd be doing online otherwise. Many students are sad not be able to see their friends, but happy to not have to be around many other people.

My time at Kaipara College is coming to an end. I have loved my time here and I am very grateful for all the opportunities I have been given. I now feel ready to move on to the next stage of life.
