Covid choices

We do not have any choice regarding wearing masks, with different rules at different traffic light options, but we all have the freedom to choose whether or not to be vaccinated.

The consequences of our choices are our responsibility, and ours alone. Freedom to choose to not be vaccinated does not confer a right to abuse those who are tasked with enforcing entry conditions in any situation.

Those who choose to be anti-mask have to accept they will be unwelcome in many places. Attempting to stand for your choice could lead to unpleasantness.

To those who have genuine reason for exemptions, you have an unfortunate situation, firstly in that you are dealing with physical/health issues anyway, and secondly that you are consequently limited in your activity within the community, depending which traffic light level is applicable. Under mandates there is no room for discretion – no mask or no vaccination excludes regardless of the circumstances.

People, you need to accept your circumstances and not inflict your aggravation on people trying to go about their work/ business. We are likely stuck with Covid consequences for some time. Let's live respecting others.



I don't think anyone would have envisaged that 2021 proved to be a more challenging year than what 2020 had already brought us. It could have been a year the government focussed its energy on other pressing issues including inflation, the rising cost of living, wages not keeping up – which are all forcing Kiwis backwards. 2021 could have been a year that the Government invested in better healthcare including more ICU beds to better prepare the country for the pandemic and future pandemics. Unfortunately, 2021 has been another year of inaction from the government with very little progress on the key issues that are having a negative impact on everyday New Zealanders.

Whatever 2021 has brought for you, I hope you can find something to be proud of. What's made me most proud in my role of your local MP is being afforded the opportunity to stand with the people of Kaipara-ki-Mahurangi at the Groundswell protest in July, to be a voice for farmers and the rural community. The cost of COVID - Rising prices are on their way

Kiwi families are starting to see the delayed and hidden cost of COVID. It comes in the form of rising prices. Over the next year we're going to hear a lot about inflation and the cost of living and we need to understand the cause in order to fix it.

The average thing you buy went up by 4.9 per cent in the past year. Some things less, others more, but people are noticing it across the board. It's like the Government put GST up five per cent. That would be a more honest way of recovering what it's spent on COVID, but politically disastrous for them.

Instead, the Reserve Bank has set interest rates low, and then printed extra money to boot. It's printed an extra \$60 billion over the past two years, and it's all now sloshing around the economy, bidding up prices here and there.

The natural reaction to rising prices will be for the Reserve Bank to then raise interest rates. It's shifted the pain into the future. Every mortgage will cost more in the next few years. If low interest rates made 2020 and 2021 more buoyant than expected, they give 2022 a sinking feeling.

At the same time, the production of goods and services has slowed down. People haven't been able to go to work. Some businesses haven't been able to open. Any sector that relies on the border, like tourism or export education, forget it.

The basic laws of economics haven't changed though. Inflation is 'too much money chasing after too few goods.' Pump up the money supply, throw a spanner in the rest of the economy, guess what? Prices will rise just as sure as night follows day.

Now, the Government and its sympathisers will say, 'oh but prices are rising everywhere.' It's true, in this sad world, you can justify anything by finding a country doing even worse.

Practically every country is following the same crazy policy of printing money to avoid hard choices. That doesn't make it right, and it doesn't help when prices are rising where you live.

Every country is dealing with COVID, too. That much is also true. But it doesn't mean we couldn't be doing more to control the cost of COVID. The Government should be doing what families do every day, control their spending. In the middle of COVID, it spent \$51 million designing the bike bridge that won't be built.

Altogether the Government has borrowed around \$50 billion since the start of the COVID period. It has twice raised benefits for people who stay home and don't produce anything. That is adding to inflation. It is bidding against private developers to buy land, raising the price of that too. It is the most inflationary Government New Zealand has seen in generations.

The Government certainly needs to stop pumping extra the money into the economy which drives inflation, but it also needs to stop doing things that make it harder to work and produce.

New holidays, labour laws, farm regulations, Emission Reduction Plans, taxes on utes and vans, and so it goes on. The Government should apply an abundance of caution to harming an economy that's on life support.

What about blocking workers coming into the country in the middle of a chronic labour shortage that's pushing up wage costs? If we don't start taking these things seriously, there is a real danger that airlines won't bother flying here and our problem will become more permanent then we bargained for.

Within our borders we could and should balance COVID with other needs. If the Government sets out criteria for a city being at orange and the criteria are met, that city should be at orange. If we keep talking about an abundance of caution, we won't have much abundance of anything else.

An Ode to Creative Writing

Summer is a collection of small moments; a photo album on fast-forward of laughter shared with friends, extra shift work, holidays to other parts of the country, the ocean, scorching sunshine, and disregarded to-do lists. It generally takes a few weeks for the novelty of the summer holidays to lapse into a functional routine, and when it does, I spend my time doing the thing that I have always loved most in the world.

A bookcase in my parents' bedroom is home to my first novel. On pieces of paper stapled together, my six-year-old self drew palaces, princesses in ball gowns, and flowers growing from blue-coloured grass. My writing is littered with misspellings and is scrawled across the page in a glittery pen, but it represents a wide-eyed wonder that I still feel when writing. A sense of purpose and connection.

It has always fascinated me that the thoughts, emotions, and imaginations that flood my mind are simply electrochemical reactions: intangible and virtually incomprehensible. Yet I can transform these ideas into a dialect that can be recorded and that will last beyond me. Then, someone completely separate from me in identity and their experiences can translate what I have written into something of their own.

Granted, I have fallen into brief periods of love with other avocations - painting, competitive swimming, photography, astronomy - but it always results in a desperate homesickness for the anchoring to myself that creative writing provides me. Writing has taken me across the globe, introduced me to some of my best friends and mentors, and is an outlet for both the processing and documentation of my life's experiences. My



sentimentalism has meant that I have kept everything I have ever written and can take those memories out on both rainy and sunny days. I can watch my writing evolve from the naive narratives of princesses and fairies; to science fiction; to introspective paragraphs about the parts of the world that I find interesting. Often, the stories I write don't follow a ground-breaking narrative arc or include any of the morals and themes for which I analyse others' work. But I think that writing has always helped me to understand the world around me. As a child, I examined the world through a lens of fairy tales and fantasy, and now the focus of that lens has shifted to that of a science and philosophy based perspective.

But in any context, I have, and will always, write because of a necessity to give shape to the chaos that swirls otherwise rampantly through the world around me.

Spreading Christmas Cheer

20 December 2021

The Kindred Family Services' team worked as hard as Santa's elves over November and early December, co-ordinating its annual Christmas Appeal, to ensure Christmas came to those might otherwise have missed out.

Executive Director, the aptly named, Ana Christmas, says being able to rally the community's efforts to support those in need has been a humbling experience, especially with over double the number of deserving families on the list than last year.

"It has been a real privilege to co-ordinate this effort and see the community step up to help those who have shouldered the burden of lockdowns more than most," she says.

158 families received support from Taupaki to South Head, including those in Riverhead, Waimauku, Huapai, Muriwai, Woodhill, Helensville and Parakai. They included 206 adults and 266 children and teenagers.

The reason for their need is varied. Some are in financial hardship after job losses, some are suffering anxiety or depression, some are living with family violence, and some have suffered the loss of a loved one. There are also grandparents raising grandchildren and whânau who have had more mouths to feed as people moved home during lockdown.

The recipients are clients of Kindred Family Services, Outwest Youth, Parent Aid Northwest and Te Ha Oranga. Other families were nominated by local schools.

"By and large these are people who are doing their best to get by at a pretty tough time," says Ana Christmas. "By offering this support, it's an acknowledgement that they're seen, that they're cared for and that they're recognised for the hard work they're doing to push through despite this year's many obstacles."

Kindred Family Services pulled together resources including 25 Christmas Hampers made by Kumeu Rotary and 45 Christmas Boxes organised through Helensville Police.

Its online Christmas Appeal raised \$4000 which, along with funds from the Ministry for Social Development to support the community through COVID were used to buy gift vouchers from local businesses.

Ana Christmas says this year's Christmas Appeal was different than past years' because health and safety concerns around COVID-19 meant physical donations weren't appropriate.

"But the flip side of that is that because we received such generous financial support from donors and from the Ministry for Social Development, we were able to buy vouchers from local businesses who have had such a tough year and pay forward some of the support we've been fortunate to receive from them over the years." She adds the other win is that parents and caregivers will get the pleasure of shopping for gifts for their own loved ones, "and that's an experience everyone deserves to enjoy at this time of year."



Working towards a pest free Rodney West

Rodney West is a special environment full of unique native flora and fauna. All the way from the Kaipara harbour reaching into the Waitemata. There are backyard streams flowing to the Kumeu and Kaipara Rivers, wetlands interconnecting with lakes, and dune ecosystems reaching into the forests whilst making that important connection to the West Coast. Home to an abundance of our native species.

But this landscape is under threat from pests, both animals and plants. Groups and schools across Rodney West, South Kaipara Landcare, Predator Free Muriwai and Waimauku, Manu in the Ville and Pest Free Huapai /Kumeu, are working to change this so that our native flora and fauna can survive and thrive.

Boyd Steel and Shona Oliver have been employed through Rodney Local Board funding to support the groups working to Restore Rodney West, an audacious but worthy task.

Pictured below is Boyd loading the details of a trap placed by Kaipara College Students, onto a free mobile app TrapNZ. This will facilitate the uploading of catch data by the students and maintain location details for their traps, which is part of the "Manu in the Ville" project on TrapNZ.

If you are already trapping or have bait stations active on your property, we applaud you and invite you to join the local project. Check out TrapNZ for the Helensville – Parakai area and search "Manu in the Ville" and please join up. If you require assistance, then help is close by via the Facebook page "Manu in the Ville".

If you want to learn more and get involved, there will be a trap building day at 42 Mill Road, Helensville from 10am on Sunday 23rd January 2022, ably run by Tora Mckenzie. Our aim is to get enough traps built so the riverside walkway from Te Awaroa-Helensville to Parakai is continuously trapped from start to finish. Attendees can purchase an affordable trap for their own backyard, whilst in attendance.
