Kaipara Memorial RSA

Helensville Service Cemetery

Late last year members of the Kaipara Memorial RSA committee including Kevin Otto, Noel Bodle and President Rex Keane were joined by members of the Remembrance Army, Megan Patterson and Dan Walters and met with Auckland Council staff and Chris Fraser from Bronze Plaques NZ, who are contracted by Veterans Affairs to audit the Service Cemeteries around NZ.

Chris informed us that he checks all the plaques and plinths for condition and that they are not loose, that there is a "Seat of Remembrance" and "a granite sign" in place, the cenotaph is in good condition, the flag pole is in working order and the grounds are neatly mown. One item that Chris noted was that Helensville does not have sufficient parking. He will report back to Veterans Affairs. Chris requests that relatives use the concrete vases next to the plaques for flowers, rather than a glass jar, which get blown over and smashed. Chris also gave us a packet of "Flanders Field Poppy" seeds to grow in time for ANZAC and Armistice Day commemorations.

We did question him about the condition of the Cenotaph at Parakai, but he told us that it is under the control of the Ministry of Culture and Heritage. The Parakai Cenotaph has a Council Designation around it, marking it on Council planning maps and documents, to protect it from future developments.

Remembrance Army

After the meeting, Dan Walters and Megan Patterson showed us some of the Headstones of World War One veterans, which had been restored by the Remembrance Army, they stand out amongst the other grave sites. Whilst a large number of WW1 veterans were KIA and buried in War Cemeteries overseas, those who returned did not have the benefit of a New Zealand Service Cemetery, until they were created after World War Two.


If you have a spare hour or two, wander around the Helensville Service Cemetery, then visit some of the WW1 grave sites, which the Remembrance Army has restored.

North West resource consents

We need more than empty promises on housing. A warm, safe place to live should be the right of every New Zealander. It's the issue that politicians hear about the most and yet the issue the public trusts politicians on the least. And it's no wonder with so many broken and empty promises from successive Governments.

Labour was elected to fix housing after the previous government also failed. The bi-annual report from Core Logic shows it's harder than ever to buy a home in New Zealand. The average property across New Zealand is now worth 8.8 times' the average annual household income, and well beyond the long-term average of 5.9.

New Zealand has more land area than the United Kingdom with a population of 65 million. So why can't make enough land available to affordably house five million people?

The gap between homeowners and non-homeowners has never been wider, and the problem seems too difficult for either Labour or National to solve. That problem is the Resource Management Act.

I was contacted this week by a developer planning to replace four standalone homes with 17 new homes in a terraced housing complex. The plans are complete. There is an earthworks and drainage contractor lined up to start as soon as resource consents are issued.

His budget includes new stormwater and wastewater infrastructure. He has budgeted for council development contributions to support parks, reserves, and community facilities.

What he hasn't budgeted for is how long it takes to get a resource consent from Auckland Council. His application for land development and subdivision was lodged in October 2021. In late February 2022, the application has yet to be allocated to a council planner to review, let alone approve.

The Resource Management Act allows councils 20 working days to process a consent, yet after more than 120 days this application sits in a stack of hundreds on a planners' desk.

In November 2021 Labour and National pushed through the RMA Enabling Housing Bill under urgency. ACT was the only party to oppose the Bill because we don't believe the law changes will actually make more affordable land available for housing.

A developer gave evidence to Parliament's Environment Committee that his company burned \$1 million every year on land holding costs alone, because it took so long to get consents. That cost goes straight onto the price of a new home, when it is finally built.

Developers asked for one thing - make the resource consent process simpler and faster to speed up land development for housing. That is why ACT would repeal the Resource Management Act and replace it with separate Environmental Protection and Urban Development Acts.

ACT's repeal and replacement of the RMA would not only accelerate house building this would make a real difference to housing affordability - vital for healthy communities and a healthy economy.

Our reforms to the RMA would increase the certainty for investors, developers, and local councils, giving them the confidence to invest in ambitious projects, without living in fear of planners or the Environment Court.

These kinds of sensible and practical changes will make a real difference and hopefully restore the public's faith in politicians after being let down time and again.

Fast reliable broadband throughout Kaipara ki Mahurangi

It goes without saying how critical the internet is to us today. Our lives practically revolve around it, whether it be accessing emails or software, working from home, paying the bills or ordering those essential items.

Sadly, for some of our communities it's considered a luxury to have fast, working access to the internet. This is obviously a cause for frustration on any regular day but it's another thing entirely to have slow and barely-there internet access during periods of lockdown and self-isolation. Unfortunately, this is the lived experience for some of our local communities.

That is why I'm advocating for fast and reliable internet access for all areas of my electorate as a priority in 2022. And I'm pleased to say that progress is already being made.

Recently I met with a Chorus representative to advocate for individual constituents. One community that has particularly been hit hard with poor internet access is the area of Coatesville. Due to its location, Coatesville was initially considered to be outside of Auckland city coverage to justify ultra-speed broadband, but at the same time was not considered as sufficiently remote or rural enough to justify the Rural Broadband initiative, so the residents were losing both ways.

Thankfully, where there is a will, there is way. Chorus identified around 650 residents who were willing to contribute to the internet trust scheme. Along with some government funding in the mix, we now have nearly all of these residents connected to fast, reliable internet. This is a huge win for our Coatesville constituents as a result of a combined public/private solution.

But the work isn't finished yet. My next mission is to seek out practical solutions for other communities that don't appear to have a silver bullet any time soon, yet who are desperately in need of working internet.

I will continue to lobby the government for a better deal for our north and northwest Auckland. Because reliable, working internet access is something that's worth fighting for.



This quaint exhibition of postcards is to populate our workshop room with A5 artworks continuing throughout the year.





Three Waters Reform

What does it mean for North Auckland

The announcement by the Minister for Local Government, Nanaia Mahuta, that the Government will create four publicly owned water entities to ensure every New Zealander has access to affordable, long-lasting drinking, waste and storm water infrastructure without ballooning costs to households and families, is a positive decision for Auckland and Northland.

Over the last four years the Government has been investigating a range of options using the best of international and local expertise – and has robustly tested the options with oversight and guidance of the joint Central/Local Government steering committee.

The investigation included assessing options such as central government funding to the status quo, sector-led shared service delivery and regional models, introducing a national centralised fund similar to the NZTA-type model, and regulatory reform alone. The Water Industry Commission for Scotland also assessed 30 different aggregation scenarios ranging from two to 16 entities. Other models considered were unsustainable and unaffordable for large parts of the country.

The reforms are aimed to ensure that all New Zealanders have safe drinking water and to ensure that the fixing our ageing water infrastructure and guaranteeing safe and affordable water for all New Zealanders is actioned. The provision of safe drinking water supplies has been a long-term challenge that successive Governments have ignored, but that the reforms intend to fix.

The reforms will create four dedicated and publicly owned water entities. Without these, we'll keep seeing burst pipes, contaminated water, and skyrocketing costs for households.

The case for change is clear:

- 34,000 New Zealanders get sick from drinking water each year
- Many councils regularly have boil notices in place and close beaches over summer because they aren't safe to swim in due to sewerage discharge
- 64% of councils don't have water revenues to meet the full costs of running water services and assets
- 20% of all water supplies serving 100 people or more don't achieve full compliance with New Zealand drinking water standards

New Zealanders deserve better, and something has to change especially as the cost of each council fixing these problems is very high and will see water costs balloon for the vast majority of New Zealanders over the coming years.

The Government has looked at all the options and sought local and international expert advice, and everyone reaches the same conclusion: this plan offers the most cost-effective way to guarantee safe drinking water and the \$185 billion of investment needed in water infrastructure over the coming decades.

As well, the Government received feedback from councils through the 8-week engagement period helped identify areas for refinement of the new entities – such as in the area of representation and accountability.

The Government will continue to work in good faith with local government to refine the outstanding details of the reforms design and will establish three technical reference groups, similar to the Stormwater Technical Working Group, that will include, iwi, industry and local government experts. These groups will help refine the reform proposals with regard to oversight and accountability; rural supplies; and the resource management interface.

This further work will be conducted within the government's reform bottom lines of good governance, partnership with mana whenua, public ownership and operational and financial autonomy.

The Three Waters Reforms will save New Zealanders money (amounting to thousands

per year, for many households), keep water assets in public ownership and make it harder to sell them, create jobs across the country, and boost growth.

If we don't act now, the question will always remain as "When?" As we know, procrastination is rarely a winning strategy. Putting our water reforms off will only see the costs rise.
