Rock hunting and hiding: The rockin' new hobby spreading kindness in New Zealand

Painted rocks all began in the U.S with a little group called Port Angeles Rocks founded by a group of women who thought that a community art project such as this would be fantastic for homeschooled students in Kitsap County. It now has well over 7,000 members, providing a sense of community among local families and residents as well as an exciting weekend or after school activity.

Vic Rocks in Australia (which has over 30,000 members) was founded by Jude Rangitaawa and Julie Walker in 2017. They run the Moongala Women's Community House in Bentleigh East and thought the activity would be a perfect way to instill a community vibe and get children enjoying the great outdoors.

If you love the idea too, why not start up your own local community Facebook Group? We bet it would rack up the followers in no time.

We can't tell what children would love more - creating magnificent rocks, or finding their own special little treasure!

In New Zealand rock hunting is spreading throughout the country. Children can be spotted in public places at all hours of the day, searching under bushes, enjoying their new hobby. Sometimes parents get caught up in the expeditions, on which any disappointments are quickly dispelled by the thrill of a find.

local Facebook group Rocks New Zealand in March; the site now has more than 2800 members.

It's two years since she first heard about the craze, but rock hunting and painting now takes up a lot of her time, along with bringing up her seven-year-old daughter, Katherine, and two-year-old son, Max.

It all began when Rachel's mum, Bev Foreman, who lives near Taupo, sent her a couple of rocks she'd painted and asked her to hide them. "I thought she was a bit weird," says Rachel.

"When you think about it, drawing a picture on a piece of rock, then sticking it in the bush somewhere – what's the point?"

Rachel says her husband gave her a funny look when she told him what she was off to do. Nevertheless, "We started hiding them – but didn't find anything for two months."

Undeterred, she joined the local rock group, one of dozens throughout the country. "One of the ladies gave us some tips on how to find them, and then we found our first one, a rainbow rock," says Rachel. "We replaced it with a red ladybug."

They found a couple more and shared their pictures with a Facebook group. Before they knew it, the hobby had become addictive. "A couple [of rocks] came home [with us] but then we'd go out and hide others," says Rachel. "On weekends, we'd go together, and then I'd sneak out by myself during the week."

A bonus was that the activity gave this rocker an excuse to go for a walk. "It's a weird feeling, but it got us out of the house a lot more than what we otherwise would have," she says.

Some days, the family would spend two to three hours at the Botanic Gardens; they were walking four to five kilometres every weekend.

"Katherine didn't whinge... she didn't realise how far she was walking as she was stopping to look behind trees, watching the bees, learning about plants... When Max came along, we were going four or five times a week to the gardens, and frantically making more rocks each night."

The artwork doesn't need to be elaborate to appeal to children, says Rachel. They simply love the joy of the find.

Taskforce the result of not having a solution

New Zealand needs more houses. Housing affordability for first-home buyers is the worst it's been in six decades and this is largely driven by a lack of supply.

After presiding over one of the most spectacular public policy failures in New Zealand's political history in Kiwibuild, Labour are now trying to figure out what they'll do about the current pressing issue – a shortage of materials.

The truth is that plasterboard is a sandwich of plaster and cardboard. What first world, industrialised country gets itself into such a pickle? An overly bureaucratic one is the answer.

Despite the issue being present for months now, Labour's solution has been to recently create a 'plasterboard task force', which we all know is just window-dressing for having no solution at all.

What does the Minister expect this taskforce to achieve that she and her entire department hasn't been able to to date? The industry has been clear about what the issue is and they want the Government to solve it, not keep talking about it.

A recent report from Castalia found that regulatory barriers around materials are a large contributor to New Zealand's woes, it says: "relaxing planning and consenting standards could both directly and indirectly resolve the issue of lacking competition and innovation in the building materials market." and suggested streamlining the substitution process for approved products as a solution.

ACT's proposal is for the Government to enact a Materials Equivalence Register, which would allow access to foreign approved substitute materials that can be used to build houses.

The reality is that excessive regulations are getting in the way of building houses and preventing competition in the market, this would help fix that – at least in the area of building materials.

How it would work: MBIE would be tasked with keeping a Materials Equivalence Register. They would initially focus on

plasterboard substitutes for dry areas of buildings, e.g. not bathrooms, where the risk is lowest. A material could get on the register in one of two ways. The first way is that an applicant would apply to have a material deemed equivalent. That might be an importer or producer of an equivalent material. The second way is that MBIE would proactively assess Material Equivalents in foreign countries, starting with Australia, and deeming any products available there as equivalents.

Councils would then be required to accept Material Equivalency as a matter of course, if they refuse then consent is granted as of right. Councils would be absolved of liability for a decision to accept deemed Material Equivalent.

This is a practical solution that will provide better outcomes almost immediately. It will also lead to more competition and choice in the building materials market over time.

Kiwis shouldn't have to wait for a taskforce to go away and deliberate before eventually coming to a conclusion and eventually provoking some action. Major party housing policy has followed a familiar pattern in recent years. Promise. Win. Fail. Apologise. Labour is now approaching the fourth and final stage.

Smokefree Rockquest at Kaipara College

Kaipara College is undoubtedly home to a highly successful music department. On June 10th, eight bands from Kaipara College, composed of members in Years 10 to 13, competed in the annual Smokefree Rockquest regional heats. This is a nationwide music competition for bands and solo/duo competitors at an intermediate and high school level. Rockquest has a 34 year history, with New Zealand musical successes including Opshop, Brooke Fraser, and Bic Runga, all having roots in the competition.

Smokefree Rockquest is divided into four stages. First, all bands and solo/duo competitors are invited to compete in the regional heats. This year, heats for the North Shore region were held at Auckland Girls' Grammar School in the Dorothy Winstone Centre – an amphitheatre-style auditorium boasting 795 seats and an impressive sound system. Kaipara College's bands each performed live an original song of up to five minutes in length to a panel of judges and audience members. They were competing against 36 other bands from the North Shore area.

The top twelve bands from each region, as decided by judges, are invited to participate in the online regional finals. Four of Kaipara College's eight bands have qualified for the 2022 regional finals, Haze of Youth, Rusty Van, Sonitus, and Zoned Out. These four bands had three weeks to record themselves performing an additional original song to submit to judges, alongside their live performance, for regional award consideration and the selection of bands to compete in the semi-finals.

The top two bands from each of the 22 regions are considered for the semi-finals, where the leading 30 acts (10 solo/duo competitors and 20 bands) in New Zealand will have the opportunity to perform three songs to a live audience. The top 10 acts from the semi-finals are then invited to the national finals, held in Auckland on September 24th, 2022.

Thousands of dollars worth of Rockshop equipment are awarded to place-getters in the regional and national finals, along with a professional studio recording session and mentoring for all semi-finalists.



All Kaipara College band members are enrolled in music classes at the school and have three classes a week to work on their songs. Students also attend Band Factory – an after-school music workshop where they can practise and meet other like-minded peers. In addition to this, bands collaborate outside of school to fine-tune their performances. Kaipara College students practise for upwards of seven and a half hours a week in preparation for Rockquest and other similar music competitions throughout the year.

Education should be a priority

New Zealand has officially reached a truancy crisis and its only getting worse. The Ministry of Education has confirmed a total of 67,000 students were chronically absent from school in Term Four 2021, compared to 57,621 in Term Three 2021. Rewind to 2017 and the number was 37,900. That's a 76 percent increase in chronically absent students since Labour - an incredibly disturbing statistic.

I acknowledge that Covid-19 restrictions and lockdowns have caused significant disruption to our children's education and that many students will have become disengaged from school during this time. However, the government hasn't done anything to address truancy, despite stating that "school attendance has to improve". They have however spent an additional \$5 billion each year for education but without any plans or targets for children to be attending school more regularly. We're left wondering as to what this spending has achieved because today, children not only are regularly absent from school but, worse yet, are being caught up in juvenile crime, including stolen cars, ram raids and thefts by children as young as nine.

And it's not just our truancy rates either. Our 2021 NCEA results confirm that literacy and numeracy achievement is also declining under Labour. It was found that literacy attainment for Year 11 students at decile 1-3 schools have taken a significant plunge, falling from 78.5 per cent to 74.8 per cent in just one year. Numeracy attainments have also taken a dive, falling from 76.9 per cent to 73.8 per cent.

Despite an extra \$5 billion a year being poured into education, achievement and attendance is going backwards. It really is a mystery as to where all this money is going. The one thing that is clear, however, is that this government is utterly failing to deliver in education and our children are sadly suffering the consequences.

Attendance at school is critical to our children's future, which buys them an opportunity to be successful. Literacy is an essential skill needed for a lifetime and sets our children up for their future. National has consistently voiced the importance of school attendance and last year we released a comprehensive plan to get our schools back on track.

I held a public meeting on education with Erica Stanford MP for East Coast Bays and National spokesperson for Education on Monday 4 July, at Te Manawa, Kokiri Auditorium, 11 Kohukohu Lane, North West Shopping.
