

# Sayers Welcomes Election Race Based On Integrity And Principle by Cr Greg Sayers, Councillor for the Rodney ward

Greg Sayers, Rodney's current Auckland city Councillor, says it is positive Rodney has a contested local election. It's a great way to raise issues and keep the local politicians accountable, he adds.

His statement comes after it was announced that Sayers is being challenged by Rodney Local Board deputy chair Beth Houlbrooke in the upcoming October Auckland Council elections.

Councillor Sayers says he enthusiastically welcomes an election race based on integrity, community representation and principles.

Sayers successfully ousted ex-Rodney District Council Mayor Penny Webster for the Rodney seat on Auckland Council in 2016 and was returned unopposed in 2019.

Going into the campaign race, Sayers says he is deeply heartened from community feedback with people repeatedly telling him they appreciate the way he steps forward and fights for a fair deal for Rodney.

"I realised early on I was either going to have to be a 'yesman' to Goff in order to receive a few crumbs, or be a strong advocate for Rodney, fighting for a full and fair deal for the ratepayers who elected me. I chose the latter," says Sayers.

"It has been myself working with a focused group of highly principled councillors who collaboratively have had the backbone to consistently call Council to account exposing the troublesome trends about the organisation.

"Council should be identifying all the wasteful overspending, and channelling that money back into core services – which would include money to help fund Rodney's future infrastructure and to lift the standards of general maintenance to acceptable levels.

"By being a persistent voice for Rodney I have gained many wins including over \$1.3 billion of approved funding voted through to build the infrastructure Rodney so desperately needs to catch up with the rest of Auckland. These improvements are currently underway with Rodney being far better off now than when I started.

"Building on this momentum the next goal is to get a further \$1.2 billion. This will include investment for the unsealed roading networks' maintenance and sealing, storm water and sewage upgrades, SH16 traffic improvements, more parks and sportsfields, a bypass road for Kumeu, financing the Hill Street fix, money for environmental protection and enforcement of noncompliance, building new infrastructure in advance of building new housing, as well as lifting the maintenance standards for Rodney.

"Having worked cooperatively with many Local Board members I believe it is essential local boards receive greater financial resources to allow them to use local contractors, local community volunteers and community groups to deliver community projects in a far more affordable way.

"The money Rodney needs will be found from within Auckland Council, by it simply

being far more prudent with its financial management. It is not necessary to keep digging deeper and deeper into ratepayers' pockets.

"Most rural ratepayers are outraged that the challenger – Ms Houlbrooke designed and voted in a Rodney specific additional 7.1 per cent annual rates increase on top of Goff's 3.5 per cent annual general rate increases.

"Rural communities, who pay around \$23 million towards her additional tax, are furious that they do not receive a cent for any roading improvements from it. It was, and remains, outrageous.

"Like Phil Goff, Ms Houlbrooke is a tax, borrow and spend politician who has not challenged Council's spending priorities.

"Her voting to introduce a compulsory new tax, only to be paid by Rodney's ratepayers, completely let Phil Goff off the hook to re-direct more money back into Rodney.

Just answer this simple question for yourself; why would a Mayor even need to consider my requests for re-directing more funding into Rodney if the candidate is happy to raise more money via syphoning new taxes out of her own ratepayers' pockets?

"Beth Houlbrooke will need to stand on her record as a local board member who has been complicit in enabling Phil Goff's political agendas.

"I struggle to see how this challenger can be proud of her voting record. I cannot understand her convictions, as exemplified by voting in favour of all Goff's rate increases, including the fuel tax, the illegal bed taxes, Goff's many targeted rates, as well as initiating a Rodney specific targeted tax when families are struggling in the midst of a cost-of-living crisis.

"It's easy to spend other people's money. It is not as easy to fight for what is right.

"Rodney voters now have a choice - between someone who will spend and borrow more by creating new taxes and rates, versus a councillor who has a proven track record of fighting to get Rodney's rates spent back locally.

"No matter how tough, I have never faltered in representing what the majority of the people of Rodney, and Auckland, have overwhelmingly told me they expect.

When the new Mayor wants to get Council back to delivering core business, wants to put a stop to all the nice-to-have spending, and will focus fairly on all communities including Rodney, I will support them 100 per cent.

"Needless to say I have already proactively met with the five top polling mayoral candidates - meeting each at a Rodney township – getting in early to further the cause for Rodney and convince them why additional investment is needed.







# Dracula: A Kaipara College production by Georgia Shivnan, Year 13 Student

Kaipara College

Dracula's final scream echoes through the silent hall as a wooden stake is driven through his heart, and his lifeless body falls to the ground. Holy wafers litter the surrounding floor, forming an impenetrable barrier between the monster and his killers. Cloaks billow, sets move about the stage, and the sunrise is projected over Seward's asylum. It is the final act of Kaipara College's Dracula: a two-hour show written by Steven Dietz – based on Bram Stoker's classic novel – performed and (largely) produced by students. The show – set in 1897 and performed in 2022 – is a visual showcase of the innumerable hours invested by students, teachers, and community members in the drama, music, and performing arts technology (PAT) departments.

This year's production has been a long time in the making. Auditions were held during Term 1, and cast members received their scripts for the show in mid-April. PAT students have also been working on producing the sound and lighting for Dracula since returning to school in February. Students involved in the show (whether as a cast or crew member) received credits for their work from relevant NCEA standards. Rehearsals for Dracula started after the school holidays in May and in the following eight weeks, students and teachers worked tirelessly during and outside school hours to fine-tune the performance and its logistics. In the final

weeks before the performances, students spent both Saturday and Sunday rehearsing the show for upwards of eight hours each day, in addition to their existing practice schedule.

Dracula's cast – an ensemble of 22 students – was split in two for this year's production to ease pressure caused by illness-related absences. The Coven Cast performed on Tuesday and Thursday evening of Term 3's Week 9, while the Clan Cast performed on Wednesday and Friday. Many cast members also took up roles in the production's crew, where a further 33 students, teachers, and community members were involved. Everything from Dracula's set, lighting, sound, special effects, costuming, and props were designed and produced within Kaipara College. The school's productions are held annually. Previous shows include Jack and the Beanstalk (another take on a classic story), Level Up, Avenue Q, and Rock of Ages, which have seen their audiences immersed into worlds of futuristic video games, musicals, and puppets.

As Dracula's final act finishes and the actors take a sweeping bow, the hushed audience breaks into applause. The actors' faces dissolve from a maddened Renfield, a malicious Dracula, and a bubbly Mina – to a collection of broad smiles: those we sit next to in classes and see around campus. A group of undeniably talented and driven young actors doing what they love. Once the applause dwindles, Renfield delivers his final line, "A fear once rooted in your mind is yours forever."

## The effect of the RMA

Traveling between Napier and Auckland a few weeks ago I met a machinery parts supplier who has plans to expand warehouse capacity to meet customer demand.

When I asked about plans to build, he told me there is no land available at a reasonable price in Auckland, and even if there was, the resource consents could take years.

As a result, their business is going to relocate the main distribution centre from Auckland to Christchurch where land is cheaper, and consenting is less restrictive.

But it is not just warehouses in Auckland. Every region has a story about a road, a port, or a dam held up by the RMA.

The East West Link in Auckland is still working through RMA appeals five years after the project was meant to start. The Ports of Tauranga have recently been kicked out of the fast-track consenting process by the Environment Minister David Parker who told them that more people might want to object, so go to court and try your luck there.

Infrastructure providers spend almost \$1.3 billion every year on consenting. That's just for the consents, without building anything. For the average smaller project, like fixing a dangerous road, consenting costs account for almost 16 per cent of the total budget.

And the problem is getting worse: The cost of consenting infrastructure has increased by 70 per cent since 2014, while authorities now take 50 per cent longer to make a decision than in 2014/15.

The length of the RMA itself has increased by 31 per cent since 2014.

It makes no sense to use the same law that protects Fiordland's natural wonders to decide whether a paddock in Henderson can become a subdivision. It is a burdensome and costly piece of legislation that makes consenting a nightmare and has led to infrastructure that is outdated and not fit for purpose.

Fundamental changes to our planning rules are long overdue. The 900-page RMA is the single biggest obstacle to building the infrastructure for a better New Zealand.

Last year in 2021 I sat on the Environment Committee through hearings on the Labour Government's RMA replacement, the Natural and Built Environments Bill. That's the first of three new laws proposed by Minister David Parker.

The feedback from industry was it is way too complicated, has too many new terms and definitions that will take years to litigate, and conflicting objectives which will make it even harder for developers to navigate.

ACT believes New Zealand needs to build its way out of the cost of living crisis, but in order to do that we need to scrap the Resource Management Act (RMA) and replace it with a fit-forpurpose set of environmental and urban development laws.

The Government's reforms to the RMA repeat many of the mistakes of the past. They are not clear about who has the right to do what on their land and who has the right to object. That means projects will still be held up by years of hearings, appeals, consultants' reports, and iwi consultations.

ACT's replacement for the RMA would make it much easier to get building. We would:

- Restrict the right to object to neighbours who are directly affected by the project
- Allow neighbourhoods to vote to exempt themselves from some planning rules
- Create a new Planning Tribunal to determine compensation for affected neighbours who hold out from negotiations to loosen planning rules
- Reduce the need for consents when infrastructure projects use a Code of Practice to manage environmental effects, saving billions of dollars and reducing years of delay.

This would work alongside ACT's policy to incentivise and resource councils to provide infrastructure for new homes by sharing half of the GST levied on new housing construction in their regions with them.

Our economic potential will only be realised by reducing government interference in our lives. ACT would enable New Zealanders to build and develop without being bound by the shackles of bureaucracy.

# From Penk's Pen CHRIS PENK-MP

I recently held a public Education meeting with National MP Erica Stanford, Spokesperson for Education. We talked about the immense pressure that our teachers are facing right now and how they feel they are at breaking point – due to Covid-19, the stress of managing children who haven't been at school on a regular basis as well as trying to manage students who are undertaking at-home learning. On top of this, our teachers believe the curriculum is too vague and say they need more concrete detail and direction on what they're what they're actually supposed to be delivering.

Literacy and numeracy rates are dropping every year, not to mention our truancy rates which are now at an appalling 40%. The consistent messaging we're hearing from school visits is that the single biggest factor of success is ensuring children are present at school. A high number of Principals across the country believe there needs to be an expectation that children are at school, and if not, students should expect to receive a knock on the door asking why they aren't there.

It's clear that the Labour government are failing our children. National says we need to be more prescriptive with our school curriculum, providing better resources for teachers that builds their confidence to teach, including implementation of weekly teaching plans to support their development. We also need higher ambitions for attendance. We believe that the government's target to improve regular attendance to 70 per cent by 2024 is not ambitious enough. National believes that every day counts and so we should aspire to every child being present at school, which means we need higher expectations for when they are absent. We also need better teacher training, which includes attracting the best and brightest teachers, but this is challenging when the pay is currently so low. We need better incentives for teachers by remunerating them higher salaries as well as covering the costs of their training.

You can expect to see a strong feature on education in National's election manifesto, which will outline what we want to do and how we want to set our children up for their futures. We will also ensure that we have competent ministers who take accountability instead of making excuses. We need a relentless focus on attendance throughout the education system because we know that education is the strongest tool we have to ensure every child has an equal chance in life to be successful.
