

Briefing Note - Helensville Solar Farm:

The purpose of this Briefing Note is to raise awareness and to address some myths relating to the proposed installation of a solar farm in the Helensville catchment.

For context, the Google Maps view below shows the proposed construction area, and its relative size and proximity to the Helensville Township. (Other aerial photos are on the Helensville Community News website.)



Due to the position of the site in a valley and proximity to the township, the limited planting proposed will offer little or no screening and the outlook will be changed from rural to industrial.

This proposal requires change of resource consent from Council under the Resource Management Act and this process is underway. Originally submitted as limited notification, it was publicly notified in September and public submissions have now closed. Council have since requested additional information from the applicants as a result of the submissions. Next steps are a Council determination and in all likelihood a Hearing at which submitters wishing to, may be heard and present evidence. The timing of these are not yet known.

As current guardians of the land for future generations, the establishment of sustainable energy production is a no brainer for most, but it needs to be undertaken ethically, truly sustainable and should not come at a cost to the environment in which it is constructed.

SO WHAT ARE THE CONCERNS?

It is understood that there were some 65 submissions made to Council, 55 of which were largely against the application. This is not nimby-ism but genuine concern that the application is inadequate and full of inconsistencies. Insufficient information and evidence has been provided, there are a number of issues that are unknown and unquantified making it impossible to make an **informed** decision as to its construction.

Key areas of concern which remain to be addressed sufficiently by the applicants are:

 Assessments not yet provided, and therefore commentary on these is at best anecdotal or heresay and not the appropriate basis for considered decision making, include:

- Ecological Effects potential ecological effects (for better or worse) are unknown
- Noise/Acoustic amplifying effects from its situation in a natural ampitheatre
- Heat solar farms alter the way incoming energy is reflected back into the atmosphere
- Electromagnetic Fields and therefore it is impossible to determine whether the standards required of the relevant International Commission or World Health Organisation are met
- Inappropriate use of highly productive land (the practicallitites of the proposal to graze sheep on the land is unsubstantiated and it is contended that, being on a flood plain, will not be viable)
- Flood flow and stormwater and effects from the disruption of the natural flood plain impacting downstream and upstream flooding
- Effects on Rural Character and Amenity Values
- Landscape and Visual Effects a large firm of Landscape Architects turned down an approach by HES to work on this due to the issues around the flood plan and natural character – a huge red flag
- Inadequate assessment of glint and glare effects on all receptors
- Cultural assessment
- The site has a Natural Resources overlay, namely 'Quality Sensitive Aquifer Management Areas Overlay [rp] Kaipara Sand Aquifer' this serves a number of bores at properties in the vicinity, no assessment has been undertaken on any impact of the construction on the aquifer

Solar Farm breifing..

- With a loophole around the lack of council regulation on solar farms there are many such proposals coming into NZ at the moment – NZ is easy pickings for substandard installations
- Many applications are being sent back to drawing board and some being declined (in NZ and abroad) often around proximity to towns or villages

As can be seen there's a lot more to it than the impact of views.

TO DISPEL SOME MYTHS

- Cheaper power it is the applicants intent to sell the power generated to the national grid at spot rates, the volume is such that it is highly unlikely to have any impact on the national power prices and certainly unlikely to mean cheaper electricity for Helensville homes
- Additional jobs generated the site will be operated remotely on a day to day basis, so it is very possible that less labour will be required than for the current farming activities
- My property won't be impacted we don't know that yet, it might be, directly or indirectly:
 - o **Temperature change** not assessed and therefore unknown
 - Noise these panels move with the position of the sun, there are 8 substations around the site, will the acoustics of the valley mean the town will hear a constant mechanical noise - not assessed and therefore unknown

THE RESPONSE

In response to the concerns and with a daunting path ahead, a group of some 30+ people from Helensville and surrounding areas have formed an Incorporated Society. With the background that the design is poor and not the best that can be done the potential is for a sub standard installation to be imposed on the community. The Incorporated Society's Purpose is to represent its membership, to identify and mobilise the necessary methods to meet what is coming with sound body of evidence and to ensure the Group is appropriately prepared for the Hearing and any longer term hurdles ahead.

The Incorporated society made a very broad submission which will enable it to raise issues and request more information, be heard at any Hearing and Environment Court if it comes to that. Its first tasks will be to raise the money needed to appoint appropriately qualified experts to support the processes (funding may be available if it proceeds to the Environment Court).

Gateway at Kaipara College

For a young person today, it feels as if there are millions of careers just waiting to be explored. But in a world with an endless and ever-expanding number of job opportunities, it feels almost impossible to know which path may be the one for you. Many secondary schools around New Zealand partake in the Tertiary Education Commission's Gateway Programme. This is a programme that is designed to give senior secondary school students the chance to experience a workspace in a professional capacity, learn new skills, and make connections with people. This year, Kaipara College had 52 students across Years 12 and 13 complete a 'Gateway placement' of their choice. I was fortunate enough to be one of those students.

At Kaipara College, we have a diverse student body, with people coming from many different areas and backgrounds. This meant that we had a vast array of career paths explored, from things such as beauty, fashion, drama, architecture, and early-childhood care to engineering, marine biology, physiotherapy, farming, and piloting. Before entering any workplace, all 52 students had to complete courses in first aid as well as workplace health and safety. Both of these gave students important skills which were not only used throughout their placements, but also in everyday life.


My personal experience with the Gateway programme was something that I will forever be grateful for. Through connections of my own, I was able to spend six days working at Jasmax - a well-established architecture firm in Parnell. Every Thursday, instead of heading to school on the bus, I hopped on the train and spent my 40-minute journey reading my book or keeping up with the school work I would be missing out on that day. Once I reached Parnell, it was just a short walk from the train station to the office, which I would reach at around 9:30 am. For the next eight hours, my day was filled with nothing but paint colours, carpet samples, floor plans and building designs – all of which brought me much joy. I spent my lunchtimes in the staff room and attended several talks with the other members of the office. I enjoyed learning new

skills and meeting new people in a space where I was not treated as a student, but instead as a colleague.

The Gateway programme is fully funded for all students who take part. This means that students who may typically miss out on school outings and experiences are still able to put themselves out there and learn new skills, meet new people and develop the confidence they need in their chosen career to enter the workforce or tertiary education after high school.

Our Government has a very clear vision for New Zealand's future. It's one where our economy provides security and opportunities for every New Zealander and their family. We're upgrading hospitals and health centres and training more nurses and doctors. We've put in place more mental health support, boosted Pharmac's funding, and extended free GP visits to all children under 14, and lots more.

We've also made tackling climate change a priority, and thanks to the actions that we've taken since 2017, such as passing the Zero Carbon Act and supporting businesses to switch to cleaner energy, New Zealand is on track to bend the curve of our emissions downwards for the first time in history.

It can sometimes be easy to forget just how far we've come since 2017, particularly as we've all faced a global pandemic and economic shock.

After three years of closures and lockdowns it is time to reengage with the community and again share our district's history.

Supporting local businesses

In the past couple of years we've talked quite a bit about supporting local businesses. During the covid lockdowns, this became a near necessity as well as feeling like the right thing to do.

Switching the focus to the decisions that we all make as consumers, at an individual level, the choices made by government are also important.

From the perspective of policy makers, supporting local businesses should look like enabling the family firms and other small outfits to get a fair go. When it comes to rules and regulations, often the big end of town is better placed to weather a storm of red tape, simply due to scale. A larger firm (for example a multinational operating an office in New Zealand) will usually have a broader workforce – so can hire a dedicated "health and safety" officer, for example – in a way that Mumand-Dad businesses simply doesn't. And then of course there's a question of having a big balance sheet backed my many shareholders, compared with the small start-up reliant on borrowing against the family home.

Recently I had the privilege of visiting Wharehine Construction Contractors, a multi-service civil construction, quarrying & transport business. They're based in Wellsford but operate across both the Auckland and Northland regions. What stood out to me was not only their reputation of employing locals but additionally that they are built on a foundation of family values and a family culture. They're a seriously impressive and credible organisation, as can be seen in the infrastructure projects they're completing in our area, such as Matakana Link Road. Importantly, though, they are part of the community and are literally invested in the success of this area.

I give the example of Wharehines to illustrate the bigger point that we all need to play our part, including Wellington, to support local businesses both big and small.



Getting nowhere fast in the North West

On a recent Saturday morning I hooked up my trailer and headed to the Cypress Sawmill to pick up a load of garden mulch. Before I left home I checked traffic on my route from Te Atatu to Waitoki.

The map showed me the fastest route would be 45km via State Highway 1, rather than the 37km through Kumeu on State Highway 16.

What possible reason could there be for a journey 25% longer taking less time?

State Highway 16 route is heavily congested and mostly two lanes, as the four-laning ends just after Westgate. The State Highway One route is a modern four to six lane highway, with a 100kmh speed limit, and generally free flowing traffic on a Saturday morning.

There is a huge volume of traffic, up to 37,000 vehicles per day on the SH16 section South of the Coatesville Riverhead highway, on what is essentially a two-lane rural road at that point. That is similar to the number of vehicles recorded passing daily through the six lane Takanini interchange when the data was collected in 2019.

Yet the growth in traffic volumes over the last ten years on these two very different parts of the network is similar, around 10,000 extra vehicles per day.

How is it that in one part of the city, the transport agency has built additional capacity to allow for growth, yet in the North West, we are totally ignored?

Under nine years of a National Government when the Prime Minister was the local MP, nothing was done. Under the last five years of a Labour government, it got even worse as major roading projects around the region were cancelled when bike bridges and light rail became new priorities. It feels like the North-West is simply not a priority for either major party. So, what do we have to do to get a road built around here?

Central and local government plans for growth need to be coordinated. It is no good having councils rezone large areas for housing and commercial development, which are totally ignored by governments and politicians when it comes to delivering the needed infrastructure at scale.

The Auckland Future Land Supply Strategy, when it was published in 2017, estimated that around 12,000 additional homes had been added to the North West in the previous decade. That's around 30,000 extra people wanting to go places every day.

The growth is set to continue over the next three decades at a similar rate. We are all familiar with the cycle of politicians announcing projects which they run out of money to deliver, or projects which are simply cancelled following a change of Government.

ACT would instead establish 30-year infrastructure plans to be agreed between central and local governments for each region.

Local government has a much better idea where growth is going to occur and would know which projects are needed to provide for that growth. Central government has the size and scale to design and procure major projects.

Under a government involving ACT, local needs like building roads for tens of thousands of new residents would become the priority for government, not bike bridges and light rail fantasies.

We would also use New Zealand's independent Infrastructure Commission as the auditor to make sure that the 30-year plans deliver the necessary benefits, within acceptable times frames.

This Government might be allergic to long-term decision making, but ACT is not.


