Putting together a book fair is an all-round team effort and we would not be able to cope without the assistance we receive from our community. Kaipara College: We have Pride

In 1999, US president Bill Clinton declared that in honour of the stonewall riots, every June in America would become "Gay and Lesbian Pride Month". In 2011, US President Barack Obama expanded Pride month to include the entire LGBTQ+ community. Pride month has since been adopted by many countries around the world, including New Zealand.

For several years now, one week in June has been dedicated to being *Pride in Schools Week*. This year, that week was celebrated nationwide between the 12th and 16th of June, and was organised across the country by our school's PSSP (Peer Sexuality Support Programme) teams.

Pride in Schools Week, facilitated by the organisation Inside OUT, aims to encourage students and teachers who are part of the rainbow community to embrace who they are and celebrate diversity in order to create a sense of belonging. One of the most important parts of Pride in Schools Week is education; Inside OUT facilitates many activities and celebrations which are not only fun, but also encourage the sharing of resources and information. For example, on Wednesday the 14th, many students across all year levels gathered in the school library during our lunch break to enjoy a Pride themed book club. We discussed books which incorporated queer characters and relationships, gender diversity, as well as books written by queer authors.

On Thursday the 15th, the PSSP team hosted a short film festival. During this, they showed films such as *Coming Out*, *Kustom Kar Kommandos*, *ifé*, and *Kiss of the Rabbit God*. This festival was put together by PSSP member Kingston Dean. When asked the purpose of this film festival, Kingston said "I put this collection of films together as a form of education on media that has been born from the struggle and oppression of the past 150 years. Having a better understanding of this media lets us both comprehend the current struggle as well as the history and culture of this community."

To finish the week off, Friday was deemed to be a non uniform day. In exchange for a gold coin donation, students were able to ditch their uniforms for the day and were then encouraged to dress in their brightest colours! To accompany this, during lunch time the PSSP team were selling baked goods such as M&M cookies and cupcakes topped with colourful swirled icing.

The donations for the non uniform day came to approximately \$450, all of which will be donated to charity organisation Rainbow Youth. The bake sale also raised around \$250, which will go towards the PSSP team's budget to fund future activities within the school.

This encouragement and enthusiasm to support the rainbow community and share queer media is something which us students, and our community, should be thankful for. If we take a look at a place such as Florida, their controversial "Don't Say Gay" bill

aims to prohibit students talking about sexual orientation or gender diversity within the walls their schools. However, at Kaipara College, and throughout most of New Zealand, these discussions are not only supported, but also encouraged. This, in turn, creates a safer and happier environment for our students which aims to include everyone.

From the Kaipara College Principal's Desk:

Kaipara College is part of a K.hui Ako or community of learning. K.hui Ako o Kaipara is made up of schools in the local area and is formed around our students' education pathways. The schools work together to help our students achieve their full potential. Sharing our teachers expertise and capability ensures we support our young people's learning pathways, improving their transition through the education system. Moving from primary school to college is a time of great change in our rangatahi's lives and can therefore be challenging and frightening.

In order to make the move more comfortable, Kaipara College involves itself in the lives of younger students in the area on a regular basis. We run the primary technology programme here at the College in which our K.hui Ako Year 7 and Year 8 students experience learning technology at the big

kid's school, utilising the specialized teaching spaces, equipment and teaching expertise. We also run primary school sports competitions, and catch up for K.hui Ako Kapa Haka workshops and special transition days.

The transition days are led by our students, who visit each primary school and run workshops with the Year 7 and Year 8 students. The students hear about the experience of moving from primary school to college and what life is like at College. They hear about the challenges, the opportunities and the learning, not only about different subjects but about themselves as people. The primary school students get an opportunity to work with and talk to the secondary school students, ask questions and have fun as they do it.

The transition visits are followed by the Kaipara College Open Night which is on Thursday the 20th of July this year. This is when we open the doors of our school to the community and showcase the very best of what we offer. We encourage all local Year 8 students to come along with their whanau to see the school in action, take part in the activities, ask lots of questions and get to know our staff and students. The benefits of attending your local college should not be underestimated. We know and value your students already through our K.hui Ako connections, surroundings are familiar, engaging teaching and learning programmes are the norm, siblings and whanau are here, many sporting and other opportunities are available and great teachers with high expectations are here ready to support your young person to be the best they can be.






Te Awaroa Helensville Museum AGM, 2023

With the uphill battles of pest invasion action and Covid closures happily things of the past, a report prepared for the 2023 Te Awaroa Helensville Museum AGM, held on June 24, recorded how the organisation has preserved, celebrated, and showcased the rich history of Te Awaroa Helensville and its surrounding areas in the past year.

Because it is seen as important to nurture a love of history, including in our younger generations, over the year active engagement with schools, community groups and tourists has increased. Outreach programs have included guided tours, educational presentations, and collaborations with local schools to provide valuable resources for educators. This activity has been



aided by the fact that gaining funding for an administration assistant has freed up time for the dedicated museum volunteers to better interact with the wider community. Work is ongoing to foster partnerships with local businesses, community leaders and organisations such as U3A, Lions Club, the Kaipatiki Board, and Northwest Businesses.

The museum buildings are mostly now available and open for business, providing venues for successful events which have helped bring local history to life. These included hosting tin-type photographer Adrian Cook during Arts in the Ville, hosting the Haunted Auckland team, running Halloween Night, and holding embroidery and weaving classes. Arina Bosch gave a popular a series of talks to help teachers with the history aspects of the new Aotearoa curriculum.

Volunteers are crucial. The gardening team continue to delight visitors with the beautifully presented grounds. The preservation and care of the extensive collection remains paramount, and the dedicated collections team has made significant progress in cataloguing and digitising archives and artifacts, ensuring their accessibility for both researchers and visitors, while other volunteers have done excellent work preserving the textiles in the collection. The IT volunteer keeps the computers going, while others keep the museum in the public eye with articles in local publications, a lively Facebook page and an up-to-date webpage. Of course, there are plenty more things to do, and anyone thinking about volunteering is very welcome to join the happy team.

With the goal of creating an immersive and inclusive space that showcases the diverse history of the Helensville District while inspiring future generations to appreciate and preserve the local heritage, future plans include enhancing the museum's facilities, developing new exhibitions, and broadening community outreach efforts.

Wonderful news that broke after the report was written was that a \$21,500 grant had just been received and would be used to pay for many of the upgrades sorely needed. This grant is thanks to the hard work of outgoing President, Toni Walmsley, who was thanked for the effort and energy she has put into the leadership role.

Sorry to be the bearer of bad news but northwest Auckland residents whose homes suffered damage from Cyclone Gabrielle and other recent flood events are now facing fresh delays.

It's been frustrating to observe, as your local MP, that vague announcements about flooded and cyclone-ruined areas still haven't yet been followed up with meaningful detail.

Owners are wanting to know if they will have to rebuild or relocate are yet to have this information provided, more than 4 months after Cyclone Gabrielle. And of course it's been even longer since the Auckland Anniversary floods that beset Kumeu and surrounding areas.

Earlier this month we'd heard that on 12 June property owners would hear from Auckland Council about the broad categories those properties may be in. This would determine whether they could rebuild as before, rebuild differently or face moving permanently.

In fact all that's happened is that homeowners are now being contacted to ask their view on whether their properties can be rebuilt (etc.), with a decision about their futures not to be made until sometime "later in the year".

I cannot understand why this process of asking property owners for their views didn't start months ago. The delays mean more heartbreak for those affected.

Constituents have been calling my electorate office to let me know that they're living in temporary or damaged accommodation, under huge financial strain and unable to make decisions about whether and how to rebuild.

It's all very well to advise them what's available, in terms of government assistance, but what's really needed most is certainty about the way ahead.

In the meantime, I'll keep seeking this on your behalf but I'm starting to feel pessimistic that any kind of deal will be reached between central and local government to fund a buyout programme.

Wish me luck.

"Shot Bro – Confessions of a depressed bullet"



New yellow dog tags will be sent out by post within 10 working days of payment.

Manage your dog's info online with myAUCKLAND

Use our online portal on <u>myAUCKLAND</u> to renew your registrations and update yours or your dog(s) information.

Why register your dog?

Helps us reunite lost dogs with their owners and keep dogs safe. All dogs need to be registered by three months old and reregistered every year.

After 1 August owners will be required to pay the standard fee; de-sexing also lowers the dog's annual registration fee.

Dog registration fees help us:

Funding from dog registrations provides vital animal management services, including a 24-hour a day response to dog incidents and attacks, patrols, animal shelters and adoptions, dog-safety education and reuniting lost dogs with their owners.

Microchipping

Dog owners must also <u>microchip</u> their dogs within two months of registration.

"It's a simple, lifelong way to identify dogs and link them to their owner, and results in the speedier return of lost, stolen, or injured pooches."

For only \$30, Aucklanders can have their dog's microchipped at one of Auckland Council's animal shelters; details are then entered into the National Dog Database.
