

CAB: More Than Value For Money

What's a damaged casserole pot, a beat-up printer, busted car door and a cracked letterbox have in common?

"Nothing normally except for needing to be recycled but they became a public thought-provoker," says Rani Timoti, manager of Citizens Advice Bureau Helensville.

Citizens Advice Bureau Auckland branches, including Helensville, teamed up with TradeMe, to present a series of auctions which metaphorically represented the cost of free advice given by our volunteers throughout February.

The creative campaign featured a cracked letterbox worth \$34,350 (over 229 hours on tenancy advice), a damaged casserole pot worth \$33,450 (over 223 hours on consumer rights), a beat up printer worth \$30,750 (over 147 hours on employment dispute cases), a broken car part worth \$24,450 (on all vehicle advice).

Visitors to the auctions in March could also contact CABs as a forum to ask questions and seek advice.

ACABx, the board responsible for negotiating and administering funding with Auckland Council on behalf of the nine Auckland CABs with 33 branches, secured a timely Radio New Zealand slot to highlight the auctions.

National Radio host Jesse Mulligan started the interview by reading a text from a grateful CAB client before talking to John Farrell, CAB Orakei volunteer and a former CEO of some of the world's most renowned hotels.

John says despite his previous skills it was like starting again as he went through extensive CAB training to learn how to help clients. "We don't use our own opinion but point them in the right direction."

John estimates he's taken over 700 calls in his six years

acknowledging the accuracy and information from CABNET and support of fellow volunteers with expertise on certain subjects.

He says CAB is for everyone, not just those suffering deprivation, and volunteering is very satisfying to empower clients to receive genuine help and provide relief for them.

"There's a sense of learning and working with like-minded people," he says about his comradeship with his colleagues.

In illustrating the real-life impact of the CAB's work on individuals and communities, John articulated the significance of its mission and the collective effort required to sustain its vital

"I am also always surprised at how many Kiwis don't know about our services, that we can help them, for free in their time of need or to help solve the trickiest situations," he says. "This is our chance to remind New Zealanders of this extremely important service and the impact this advice can have on people's lives.'

Save the Bees

We all want to Save the Bees and by doing so help to save the planet, after all bees are the proverbial canary in the coalmine. Their demise would be the warning that we've gone too far. You've no doubt seen Einstein's quote — "If the bee disappeared off the surface of the globe, then man would only have four years of life left." But being a brilliant physicist doesn't make him an expert on apocalyticism and there is absolutely no proof that he said it.

When we think of Save the Bees, we naturally think of the honey bee rather than the over 20,000 other species of bees. There are only 6 species of honey bee worldwide, one of which was introduced to New Zealand, the Western Honey Bee (Apis mellifera). We have two races or sub-species - Carnolian and Linguistica here in Aotearoa. I'm often approached by people who want to become beekeepers in order to Save the Bees, they soon learn that it isn't as simple as that. I like to point out that saving the bees by becoming a beekeeper is like saving endangered birds by becoming a chicken farmer. It is true that there are many pests and diseases that will harm honey bees and we lose many colonies every year, this is an issue with all livestock and their management. We do rely on honey bees to pollinate a lot of our food, but they aren't the only pollinator. Bumble bees were introduced about 1885 for pollination, originally for clover but now they are essential for greenhouse crops and some orchard fruits. Plants are also pollinated by other bees, wasps, butterflies, birds and even moths. New Zealand has 28 native species of bees, 27 of which are not found anywhere else (Australia has over 1,500 species of native bee!). They are ground dwellers, they're much smaller than a honey bee and don't usually sting.



Getting closer to getting somewhere

If you live in northwest Auckland, you will be familiar with traffic jams. This is an obvious problem where the infrastructure has not kept up with the huge population growth over the past decade.

According to Bayleys Northwest general manager Brendan Graves, more than 300ha of land in Auckland's northwest has been identified for near-term development. Over the next two decades 30,000 new homes will be built within the Whenuapai and Redhills precinct. This will create 20,000 new jobs cementing the region's status as the city's most important commercial, industrial, and residential growth node.

This means that demand for safe and efficient transport connections is only going to increase. The Coalition Government has produced a draft General Policy Statement on Land Transport which sets out priorities for investment over the next three to ten years. The previous Labour government plan insisted on a "mode shift" away from cars to walking and cycling everywhere, and where cars were allowed, slowing the traffic down to a snail's pace. Apparently, that was going to make people want to catch the bus more. "On yer bike" said Kiwis to that lot.

Instead, the Coalition plan makes building major transport projects like the North West Alternative State Highway a priority. This is a proposed new connection between a new interchange at the current Brigham Creek roundabout and State Highway 16 to the west of Huapai.

According to the Supporting Growth Alliance set up to deliver the project, "It will move the existing state highway traffic out of the Kumeu-Huapai town centre and enable a wider range of travel choices for the growing number of people who will call the north west home over the next 30 years. In Kumeu-Huapai alone, the population is anticipated to grow from 3,400 residents to around 25,000."

It's not just four-lane roads – the Northwest Rapid Transit project is intended to run alongside SH16 from Brigham Creek to the city centre. According to NZTA, "Rapid transit is fast, frequent and reliable public transport that carries large numbers of people, on dedicated corridors separated from other traffic. This means it is unaffected by general traffic congestion – like the Northern Busway on the Northern Motorway (SH1)."

Knowing the growth is coming, and that roads and transit have to be built, the next problem to solve is how to pay for it.

In my role as Under Secretary to the Minister for Infrastructure, I am looking into infrastructure funding and financing tools, including use of public private partnerships, value capture, road tolls, lease backs and other potential new tools.

Taxpayers and ratepayers are feeling tapped out, so we have to look further away and further out to find the money. International investors still see New Zealand as a safe place to put their money, and Kiwis as reliable and hard workers who can afford to pay for good infrastructure over a decent length of time.

The Coalition government has committed to lowering the barriers to overseas investment on the basis that strict tests continue to keep out organised crime and other baddies. By signalling that New Zealand is open for business, we are a small step closer to getting somewhere when it comes to infrastructure.
