Armistice Centenary at Helensville



Kaipara Memorial RSA will be commemorating the 100th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice that ended World War One on Sunday the 11th of November at 1100 hours. The club will hold a parade that will form up at 1045 hours between Countdown and the RSA and

march to the Helensville War Memorial Hall Cenotaph. The service will commemorate the signing which took place 100 years ago at 1100 hours on the 11th day of the 11th month. The commemoration service will include laying of wreaths and, as proclaimed by King George V, two minutes silence will be observed in memory of the 16,700 New Zealanders who died for their country in World War One, including the 35 soldiers from our district and who are remembered on the Cenotaphs at Parakai, Helensville and Kaukapakapa. (There are several names missing for some unknown reason).

The KMRSA holds dossiers on most of the men who are remembered on these Cenotaphs, with details of their name, number, rank, medals awarded, theatre of war, service records and home addresses prior to enlisting. Any relatives or people interested in viewing these dossiers should visit the KMRSA museum during opening hours at 49 Commercial Road, Helensville.

Families are encouraged to wear their relatives medals on their right chest and join the parade, Poppies will be available at the RSA. Medals should be worn by Service and ex-service personnel.

The club will be open for lunch and refreshments after the ceremony, the museum will be open and a video "ANZAC War Horses" will be playing.

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Some first timers at ARTS IN THE VILLE

There's not long to go before Helensville's Labour Weekend art festival ARTS IN THE VILLE kicks off, on Saturday 20 October, with a return of many of the old favourites and the introduction of several new artists and events.

Every artist has a story to tell about their journey. If you've ever wondered about the childhood influences of Helensville's internationally renowned sculptor Jeff Thomson, look no further than his father Tiger, whose well-stocked workshop provided the tools and space for making things when Jeff was a boy.

England-born Tiger loves boats, spending years at sea with the British Merchant Navy, then the New Zealand Union Steamship Company, before his last job on the Auckland waterfront, so it was only natural that a man with a talent for making beautiful things would turn his attention to model boats as retirement neared. Self-taught, Tiger has now made 20-odd exquisite models, with each component, including people and sails, designed by him and taking around a year to make. Most are sailing boats, but in his collection there's also a dinghy, a motorboat, a paddle boat and a tug, as well as a beautiful windmill and a perfect gypsy caravan.

Up until his recent ill-health, Tiger spent many hours sailing the boats by remote control. It's been a great hobby, both for the pleasures of building and sailing and for the friendships formed in the process. For the first time, some of Tiger's boats are to be exhibited during ARTS IN THE VILLE. They'll be on show throughout the weekend in the War Memorial Hall, Commercial Road.

You can celebrate Labour Day, Monday 22 October, by watching or taking part in a new event, THE HAT WALK, where from 11 – 11.30am event director Myra Lloyd, from Marmalade Hats, will invite members of the public to join local models to be part of an exhibition and celebration of her wonderful hats at the War Memorial Hall.

The former Art Stop café at the top of Commercial Road has been a popular venue since the festival began four years ago. This year it'll be fantastic to see the work of five new and emerging artists in an exhibition of painting, sculpture, photography and video, curated by Hannah Rose Arnold.

In another first, Kaipara Coast Sculpture Garden tickets during ARTS IN THE VILLE are to be sold at two for the price of one.

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SECURITY LIGHTING

If you expect to see a lawyer, need to be aware of the changes

Comments from Ivan Vodanovich, Director, Vodanovich Law.

Thank you for your enquiry and for highlighting to the public what I personally consider to be such draconian legislation which has placed significant obligations on lawyers (as well as many other businesses) and as you point out will result in increased costs to the public when using legal services.

In my view this legislation has come about as a result of pressure from the United States of America which is upsetting as it questions to a point our sovereignty.

I also question how effective it will be. I wonder how many arrests will result from it compared to the massive inconvenience it will cause the NZ Public. I suspect that there will be very few successful prosecutions as the high level criminals are generally a step ahead of the authorities.

From the point of view of a lawyer I am horrified that under this legislation Client legal privilege has been eroded as we are under an obligation to report anything we consider suspicious in respect of our clients to the DIA. We are not even entitled to question our client about what we find suspicious. We simply have an obligation to report it. This goes against what we have been taught as lawyers as a cornerstone of our profession-the confidential nature of the Lawyer client relationship.

You are correct in your article that clients/customers will need to be patient and be prepared for legal costs to increase.

We are having to sight original proof of address and ID information and have to undertake what is known as CDD (Client due diligence) whenever there is money involved. Lawyers are required to decide what level of CDD needs to be undertaken depending on the facts of each case. This is onerous for the lawyer and annoying and costly for the client the majority of which in my opinion are decent law abiding citizens.

JP's -View Point

Justices of the Peace (JP's) are regularly asked to certify copies of documents as being "true copies of the documents". In fact, this is the most common request of all JP's and until recently, it did not even require the owner of the documents to be party to the process.

However, that is rapidly changing due to the scourge called "Money Laundering" and JP's nationally, are being upskilled to do their work with great vigilance. In particular

- 1. To establish, at the outset, if the documents relate to a financial institution.
- 2. If so, also establish clearly and accurately the prescribed wording required exclusively for that financial entity.
- 3. Then verify the identity of the client who must be on hand for the 'signing process'.

In summary, these are the rules and conditions, which JP's are bound to observe.

In my view, it is needlessly cumbersome. The finance sector (Banks and other lenders) have been asked to standardise their official wording for 'certifying copies', but so far no joy.

As committed Justices of the Peace, we are hoping to prove, in the long term, that 'crime doesn't pay'.

visit a JP or buy or sell a house, you taking place - AML/CFT Act Pt 2

Real Estate Agents' Perspective -

(Coming into force 1/1/2019)

Under Phase 2 of The Anti-Money Laundering and Countering Financing of Terrorism Act 2009 real estate agents are required to conduct due diligence on all sellers before the agent enters into a listing with the seller. For purchasers that process will be carried out by their lawyer.

In general terms there will be a number of steps that the agent and the seller will be required to go through.

Client due diligence (CDD) -

The agent must establish the full legal name(s) of the 'beneficial owner(s)/real person(s)' selling the property.

If the property is being sold by a Trust, then all of the Trustees are considered to be 'beneficial owner(s)/real person(s)' If the sale is by a Company the 'beneficial owner(s)/real person(s)', those who own a 25% or greater share, must be identified.

Sellers can expect to be asked by their agent to provide documentation (Trust Deeds/Company Registration Certificates) to assist in the identification process.

Proof of Identity - 'Beneficial owner/real person'

Once the agent has established who the 'beneficial owner(s)/ real person(s)' are, those persons will be required to provide documentation to prove their identity. There are 3 identifications options that can be used.

Option 1 is photographic identification – some examples are a passport, a travel document a firearms licence. The photographic identification must contain the name, date of birth, a photograph, and the signature of the named person.

Option 2 is non-photographic identification – some examples are a birth certificate or a citizenship certificate. For this option supporting identification that includes a photograph of the person named on the non-photographic documentation in the form of a drivers licence, an 18+ card, or an international driver's license must also be provided.

Option 3 is a NZ drivers licence supported by a bank card, a gold card, or an IRD letter.

Verification of documentation - 'Beneficial owner/real person'

When the proof of identity documentation has been obtained further steps to verify that the documentation belongs to that person are required. This can be through a face to face process; or for NZ based persons a certificate of verification from a Trusted Referee; or for overseas based persons a certificate of verification from a person authorised in that country to take a statutory declaration.

Nature & purpose

The final step in the process is for the seller to advise the agent why they are selling the property; if they have sold or purchased other properties in the last 5 years, and what they intend to do with the proceeds from this particular sale. The agent must also make a personal assessment of the vendor/seller and decide if further investigations for the reasons for the sale are necessary.

Document recording

The agent must then record all of that information in a database system that can be available for the 'supervisor' (The Ministry of Internal Affairs) to audit and review.

Clearly this is all going to impose additional responsibility of the agent, but equally clearly it will impose a far greater level of disclosure for sellers and there will need to be an understanding that whereas a lot of the information required could previously have been seen as personal and private to the seller, that will no longer be the situation.

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Yvonne Hilton

Anyone who's been in the area for a while knows Hilty, either because they were taught by her, had her as a sports' coach, bought some sorts' gear from her shop or have seen her out and about working hard in the community.

Yvonne Ritchie was born in the Waikato, then moved with her family to Auckland, where she attended Auckland Girls Grammar, in her leisure time playing cricket, badminton, hockey and netball. After training as a teacher, she landed her second teaching position at Woodhill School, arriving there in February 1963, just two days after the tragic Brynderwyn bus crash that killed several locals, some of whom had children at Woodhill School - a very hard time for everyone.

She has lived in South Kaipara ever since. While in that job she met her future husband Kevin Hilton, a local man whose family had been in the district for many years. The move to Waimauku Primary, marriage and pregnancy followed, then tragedy struck when, after the couple had been together four years, Kevin was accidentally electrocuted and killed. Looking back on this, Hilty is philosophical. "Life takes some drastic turns, but I had this unborn child I needed to honour, and despite having to do it as a solo mother, it was with pleasure that I brought Neil up."

Mother and son moved to Helensville in 1975 and, when Neil started school, Hilty took on a relieving job at Kaipara College teaching phys-ed. "I was given the name Hilty while I was at the college, and it stuck. I was there for 13 years and I loved it – for a sports nut it was a dream come true. I got a lot of pleasure out of coaching kids and I became very involved with secondary school athletics – I'm very proud that I've had students who've achieved national status."

She became very involved with the Helensville Rugby Club, managing and fitness-training the senior club side for several years. "That was a first for North Harbour, who had just established the North Harbour Rugby Union. I was told I was the first woman in New Zealand to manage a senior club side - rugby was then very much a man's world." Evidence of Hilty's passion is her large library of books about sports men and women, many of them autographed or first editions.

To have a break from teaching she opened a sports goods shop in Commercial Rd (where the Turkish café is now), naming it Hilty's Sports Store. But it didn't last. "I discovered after five years that I wasn't a retailer, I was a school teacher, so I went to Kaukapakapa Primary and was there for 12 years until I retired. I loved it."

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As well as work and motherhood commitments, over the years Hilty travelled the world – her extensive wall-mounted collection of teaspoons bought in faraway places is a reminder of her journeys. At home she became involved in several community activities. Blessed with a big voice, for 24 years she was the announcer at the annual Helensville A&P Show, for 30 years she was the Christmas Parade announcer. "I did it for the children," she says. "I love to see the looks on the kiddies' faces when those floats go through." She has now retired from this position and is keen for someone to take her place, promising she'll advise and



guide them as they settle into the role.

Perhaps Hilty's most significant contribution has been to the Helensville Lions, which she joined over 20 years ago and where she is still an active member. "I was one of the two first women to join and I've done two terms as President. It's a fabulous group to be part of, there are people from all walks of life and everybody's on an equal footing. As well as being a wonderful social thing, you're not compelled, so your involvement is as you wish it to be. We raise funds, which go into a trust fund, and are then shared out to the community to help people. We've helped St John's Ambulance, the schools, various individuals. We put the community building on Rautawhiri Park. We do our telephone directory and book fairs. At the moment our focus is on financing the stations at the fitness trail around Rautawhiri Park." Because she's 'slowing down', Hilty is hoping the Lions will attract some new members. "We're all getting older, we need some young blood to carry on," she says.

Life now for Hilty still includes a big involvement with the Lions, she loves her garden and her cats, spends time with Neil and his family (there are the activities of three grandchildren to keep up with), avidly watches live and televised sport (especially cricket and rugby) and loves going to line dancing in the local hall every week. For the past few years she has knitted children's jerseys – brightly coloured and beautifully patterned – which she gives to the Salvation Army to distribute to needy families.

"So, that's what the old girl does," she says. "I love the small community in Helensville. I love the people and being part of a small town. If something happens, the community pull in behind and assist where they can. It can be a bit Coronation Street at times, but in a caring sort of way. I've been here over forty years now, so I think I'm local."

Waka Ama - Hawaii trip



28 Kaipara College students spent 20 months planning, fundraising and training to prepare to compete in the world's largest long-distance outrigger canoe race, fondly known as The Queen Lili'uokalani Canoe Race. The students needed to raise \$4300 each. Fundraising and sponsorship contributed towards making the trip affordable for all students.

On 29 August, 28 Kaipara College students along with six staff left New Zealand for Kona in Hawaii. Distances in the competition ranged from a 1km sprint, to the main event, which saw 120 teams from all over the Pacific paddling 26km up and down the coast of Kona. This was followed the following day with a series of 7km age group races.

Kaipara College Students featured four teams of 6-man waka in the main event, winning three medals in their category:

- Kaipara Under 19 Boys completed the course in 2hrs 22min 47sec to win silver
- Kaipara Under 19 Girls completed the course in 2hrs 46min 33sec to win bronze
- Kaipara Open Mixed Team completed the course in 2hrs 24min 57sec to win bronze

In the shorter 7km event Kaipara Under 16 Boys 1 and Under 16 Girls both won gold in their category. Kaipara Under 19 Girls won silver, Kaipara Under 16 Boys 2 won silver, as did Kaipara Open Mixed Double Hull.

All students entered the relay races, which consisted of eight paddlers and a 4-man waka. Kaipara Under 19 Mixed Team wonbronze in this event.

All competitors gathered for 'International Paddlers Night, where the Kaipara College students performed the school haka Nga Taniwha o Kaipara with pride and passion.

During their time in Hawaii the students had the opportunity to see from helicopters the recent damage caused by the erupting volcano, to make a humbling visit to Pearl Harbour, and to experience swimming with turtles at Carlsmith Beach Park in Hilo.

Hofangahau College - 'Eua

Outwest Youth Community Trust is approaching youth work in a unique wayby taking 12 local Kaipara College students to Tonga in July 2019 to share their knowledge and skills with a high school on the small island of 'Eua. While there they will be teaching the students Ki o rahi as well as other traditional Mâori games, and will donate musical instruments and art supplies to the school.

Before the trip of a lifetime they are spending time every week with Youth Coach Chrissy Young learning life skills, personal development, goal setting, and team building. As well as their weekly meeting they meet every term for a wananga to develop these skills further and to fund raise the \$45,000 needed for the trip. Coming up they have some great plans, including a day spent with Hako Brown teaching traditional games. This knowledge will then be shared in the community as the students

hold workshops for local primary children.

This type of youth work is not the usual approach. in that it is a long-term project using a successbased business model. more like life coaching. The advantages are that it teaches students that no matter where they come Car wash fund raising from or what they are facing



they all have something significant to offer their whanau, the community and the world. This year is about spending time discovering the skills of the group as a collective and as individuals. Already they are seeing growth in the students' self-esteem, leadership skills and goalsetting.

To fund this project, Outwest Youth is asking for community support. You will see them around Helensville, offering to wash cars, having bake sales, planting trees on local farms, sausage sizzles and cooking a great hangi. They also would love to get involved in community work. The kaupapa for fundraising is 'no man left behind' so it is up to the group to support each otherin their fundraising efforts.

Budget advice for locals in National Money Week

When government-initiated National Money Week was held in the second week of September, manager Frances Swann and her team at Helensville and Waimauku Family Budgeting Service came up with the idea of making themselves available to talk about money and budgeting for three days at the Helensville library. Anita at Copy and Print produced posters and Frances distributed them around town and organised a Facebook post.

Frances reports it went very well, with 10 and 12 and people dropping in each day, most of whom were new to the service. "People asked about mortgages, how to pay bills and which credit agencies have the cheapest rates," she says. "I also got some new clients and inquiries to see if I could run more Money Life Skills courses."

The service has a broad clientele, servicing people from Riverhead, Kumeu and Muriwai up to Hoteo River. It is open Monday to Friday and if needed people can book an appointment for a Saturday. It offers one-off budgeting but prefers to book people for a few sessions. "The emphasis is now on mentoring, we no longer just write budgets," says Frances. "We'll also negotiate for people with government departments like IRD and WINZ."

Another activity is management of the food bank, which is funded from donations and private trusts. Those wanting a parcel ring 420 7725. The first parcel is provided with no questions asked, any further parcels require recipients to have some budget mentoring.

Frances is grateful to the knitting group who meet at Parakai each week and knit baby clothes and blankets, which they give to her to distribute. "It's a great help to our families," she says.


Over 100 players from local clubs took part in the event, with players coming from as far away as South Auckland to take part on what turned out to be a pleasant day for golf.

Home to around 200 cattle, for six days the normally silent hills were alive with the shrieks, grunts and laughter of thousands of competitors from around New Zealand slogging through water and mud, negotiating the many obstacles, man-made and natural, that made up the course.

Organiser Murray Fleming described it as "the toughest course in New Zealand, maybe in the world" because of the steepness of the hills, the depth of the mud pits and the sheer volume of mud caused by the amount of rain we've had this year. Some did it for fun, seen in the number of people dressed up in tutus and other costumes, for others, in particular athletes running around the 6k course twice in the hopes of becoming New Zealand Tough Guy or Gal Champion, it was serious business.

Hosting an event like this is great for the community, bringing people here who would normally not come to Helensville. All our local primary schools took part and Parakai Primary and Kaipara College students marshalled the event as a fundraiser.

Mike Daniel says there's a bit of work cleaning up afterwards, and for months he'll be picking up all manner of discarded clothing items like shoes, tutus and wigs. But he loves it. "We do it for the community," he says. "It's great seeing the smiles on their faces when they get back."

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Glenyss Blackshaw (1937 – 2018)



Helensville resident Glenyss Myrtle Blackshaw (nee Hodson) passed away in September 2018, aged 81. Glenyss and her husband Brian were involved in a wide range of businesses and organisations in the district and she will be sadly missed by many people. She was a much-loved member of the community, regarded as a treasure in the town for her unfailing helpfulness and years of commitment to local activities.

Glenyss was born in Hawera on 30 June 1937, the first child of sharemilkers Agnes and Don

Hodson. Sons Denzil and Byron followed. Because of the Hodson's work they moved often, and Glenyss attended several schools. In 1952 the family moved to Woodhill, buying a small block of land behind the school, and Trent was born in 1958. In 1960 tragedy came with Don's sudden passing. A few years later Agnes moved to Miro Street.

Glenyss first worked at Gandell's book shop in Helensville then moved to the Waitemata Power Board office in Commercial Road. She and Brian married in June 1968. They had two daughters, Rebecca and Briar. Glenyss and Brian ran a variety of businesses, ranging from forestry to garden and property maintenance to the Wool and Handcraft Shop.

They bought a property at Ohirangi Road, renovating and extending the home and gardens. From there, they moved to the former Bradly homestead on the corner of Bradly Road, where they again renovated the house and extended the garden and orchard, generously bartering or donating produce from their prolific plum trees. Brian ran a picture framing business and Glenyss ran the Wool and Handcraft shop for eight years, building it up to become a bustling little shop selling local crafts and pottery and holding classes in the holidays. In the 1990s Glenyss worked on Saturdays in the Oikumene shop.

The many community activities she was involved in included Girl Guides, the Berry Festivals, Country and Western music, Acclimatisation Society, Christmas parades, Woodhill Badminton, and various churches. She was a foundation member of the River Valley Baptist Church, where she became treasurer. The Historical Society was one of her main interests in her later years, and she held office as Treasurer and Vice-President. She and Brian were active in garden and grounds maintenance and Glenyss always took a personal interest in members, keeping in contact with birthday greetings and recognition of health needs, etc. She loved to put on her period costume for group visits, which she helped organise.

Brian and Glenyss opened their home to anyone passing by, always offering a cup of tea and something from the cake tin. Once the girls moved out they opened their home to students from Japan who were visiting Kaipara College for weeks or months at a time. They enjoyed taking the students to the forest and beaches to let them experience Kiwi life. Glenyss also enjoyed helping at Kaipara College during exam time.

Glenyss was proud of the three generations of their family and was very involved in their lives. Failing health meant a move for the Blackshaws to Crestwood Retirement Village in New Lynn to be nearer their daughters and families. Glenyss fitted into village life and made new friends quickly, while still enjoying visits and phone calls from Helensville friends.

A fall in May put Glenyss into Waitakere Hospital for nine weeks, after which she then needed hospital care at Selwyn Village in Pt Chevalier. Brian remained at Crestwood in rest-home care, but weekly visits and calls meant they weren't far from each other. They celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary in June surrounded by family.

Glenyss will be missed by many in the Helensville community. After her death people described her as "a true character and stalwart of the town", "a real community icon", "a wonderful lady who will be missed by everyone who knew her", and "a woman who enriched Helensville by all she did and contributed, leaving behind a wonderful legacy."

Glenyss is survived by her husband Brian, daughters Rebecca and Briar, sons-in-law Drayton and Graeme and grandchildren Maia, Aria, Huia and Charlotte. The family wish to thank everyone for their kind words and support during this time.
