

Arts in the Ville treasures

Arts in the Ville has grown from 22 artists in the first year to 76 this year, with 26 venues booked. The festival continues to have excellent support from North West District Business Association and the local Rodney Board. Agenerous donation from Burmester Realty has allowed organisers to pay for advertising for the first time.

In excellent news, this Labour Weekend arts festival is the setting for another treasure hunt. You'll remember the excitement of last year's, when the prospect of the prize of a beautiful Jeff Thomson sculpture spurred so many to take part. In that competition, punters found red painted corrugated iron alphabet letters around town. The event is the Art Centre's contribution to Arts in the Ville, and this year the theme is art-inspired-by-music. The prize will again be a Jeff Thomson artwork.

Jeff has two Art Centre hats, as an Art Kaipara Board member and as a contributing artist. Wearing the second hat he ran a handson workshop for Art Kaipara members, helped by his worker Alan and others, the result of which produced a range of work from paintings to relief work to 3D sculpture.

These pieces are scheduled to appear, along with other music-themed works, in an Art Centre exhibition open for three weeks before the Arts in the Ville festival. This exhibition is open to anyone with a \$5.00 entry for each artwork. A3 images of these works will form the basis of the treasure hunt. "There will be around 26 pieces. Some will be printed on aluminium, some will be nailed to trees or the sides of buildings, or tied to lampposts, whatever," says Jeff. "They will survive beautifully outside."

In other Arts in the Ville treasures, flash new flags will point the way to exhibition sites, Helensville Community Recycling Centre is co-ordinating another of its popular upcycling exhibitions, which this year will be at the Men's Centre beside Jeff Thomson's studio in Awaroa Road, and there will be face painting, sure to be a favourite with the kids.

Christmas Parade Survives

Helensville's Christmas Parade was in danger of cancellation, but thanks to the efforts of a few, funds have been raised to see it through this year. But ongoing – future years?

The real issue is lack of a local Helensville business association. The first parade was in 1959, when a business association was formed. Across all the years the business community oversaw the organising and funding of the event.

In 2013 the association was absorbed into what is now North West Country Business Improvement District (BID). This includes all commercially zoned properties (owners and tenants) through Riverhead, Kumeu, Huapai, Waimauku, Helensville,

Parakai and Kaukapakapa. It does not include Woodhill or Muriwai and many of the wineries/hospitality providers, yet the tourism promotional spend favours those operators. Also excluded from full membership benefits are home based businesses and any businesses located on non-commercially zoned property.

Under the BID, properties are subject to a targeted rate – BID levy – minimum \$250, with some properties charged \$1,000's. This is compulsory, yet membership is only formalised by completing paperwork which many 'members' are not aware of.

Around \$60,000 is extracted from Helensville (including Parakai and Continued on page 2............

Kaukapakapa) in BID levies. Some of this in fact goes straight into Auckland Council coffers. The BID is 'controlled' by Auckland Council, with Rodney Local Board having an integral role. Yet the deputy chair of the local board is also the BID manager, paid \$85,000 annually. Conflict of interest? Almost half of the \$180,000 in levies passed to the BID annually goes on management/ administration.

What does Helensville get out of this? \$60,000 worth? If we were able to return to having our own locally focussed business association, we could do so much. 100 members at \$100 membership each would provide for the Christmas Parade, light pole flags?, Christmas lights?, etc. And businesses would have the current compulsory levy to spend as they choose to improve their business.

Helensville business – we need our own local voice.

Melody sings with Don

In September, Year 13 Kaipara College singer/ songwriter Melody Gray-Hohepa (Ngâti Whatua, Ngâti Kahungunu) joined over 200 high school-aged singers and well-known local musicians performing in a concert at Vodafone Events Centre, Mangere. Held to raise money for Play It Strange, a trust providing pathways for young songwriters to record and perform their songs, the concert was attended by rock music legends Sir Bob Geldof and Mick Fleetwood,



who selected the songs performed from among their favourites.

Melody's selection to perform two pieces with acclaimed NZ musician Don McGlashan came on the back of her winning the Junior Maioha Award for Best Song in Te Reo Mâori at this year's Play It Strange Lion Foundation Songwriting Competition. The concert experience began with rehearsals in the previous week, where Melody, Don and the band brought together for the gig spent time practising The Rolling Stones' 'Wild Horses' and The Kinks' 'Waterloo Sunset'. Melody, who normally finds the harmony herself when she's learning a song, says it was great being guided by a professional. "At first I was quite nervous, but when Don started breaking the song down, I thought, Oh, it's just another person who likes music."

The day of the concert began with a Q&A, held at Neil Finn's Roundhead Studios and organised by former Split Enz member and Play it Strange CEO Mike Chunn, where NZ artists Anna Coddington and Kings, followed by Geldof and Fleetwood, talked candidly with 15 invited student songwriters. Melody was particularly impressed by Geldof's strong presence and by the fact that he wanted to know about the students. "I was too scared to ask Bob Geldof a question, but most of the time he was asking us questions – Why are you doing music? Who do you write for? What do you write for? If you want it, why aren't you going after it? - and it gave me a lot to think about as a musician."

Melody has always been a singer and has taken a leading role at Kaipara College in many concerts and national competitions. Always interested in Te Ao Mâori (the Mâori world view) and Te Reo Mâori, she began writing songs when she joined the music option at Kaipara College in Year 10. "Pamamae, the song that won the Junior Maioha Award, is about suicide, and trying to prevent it. I don't like writing songs about love or generic pop songs, almost all my songs are written as observations about social issues and life struggles," she says.

Before the concert, McGlashan had Melody and the rest of the band play a clapping game to focus them on the task ahead. "It was really cool. Mostly I sing by myself, so being part of all that, and performing with Don, was amazing. The audience loved it too. When we finished, people screamed out for an encore."

Kaipara College reunion: there will be stories

School reunions are all about people getting together and sharing memories and no doubt when people gather for the Kaipara College reunion this Labour Weekend many reminiscences will be about the school's role as a crucible for life partnerships.

Judith and Norm Greenall

Norm Greenall's grandparents William and Jane arrived in Kaukapakapa from Scotland in 1922 and took over Drinnan's Store, which later became Norm's family home. Norm was born at Malolo House in 1941, Judith was born there 17 days later (her father, Arnold Kessell White, was also born there). She lived in a two storied villa in Captain Street, Helensville. As a child her best friend was Jaqueline Keane, whose parents owned the popular boarding establishment, Hinemoa House.

From 1954 to 1957, Judith and Norm were classmates at Helensville District High, which had opened in 1924. By 1954 there were around 200 pupils, remembered by Judith as 'rather like an over-large family'. Mr Russell was Headmaster of both Helensville Primary and District High. They both loved going to school, where Judith studied Commercial subjects and Norm studied what was then known as 'Academic' and enjoyed the sport. Norm's memories of school include getting the strap from the art teacher every Friday 'in case I upset him the following week' and moving teachers' cars onto the tennis court. "I got six of the best for that," he says.

After leaving school Judith became a shorthand typist, married and had two daughters. Norm 'ran away and joined the Navy' where, among other adventures, he was sent to the Antarctic to help rebuild Scott's hut, married and had two sons. The pair came together when, both now 71 and single, they met again at a class reunion Judith had organised. She tells the story of a speech she gave at the next reunion. "There is a rumour going around that Judith White and Norman Greenall have been seen getting up to mischief in the shelter sheds at school. Well, it's true." Having later become engaged at a 3rd form class reunion, they married two years ago, when they were 76.Now living in Orewa, Judith and Norm keep in touch with their roots volunteering at Helensville Museum. With such long association with the area they're looking forward to catching up with old friends at the Kaipara College reunion.

Reunion organising committee members and former Kaipara College students Janet and Graeme McLeod are also looking forward to the Labour Weekend event. Graeme McLeod, who was born in Malolo House in 1951, has solid connections with Helensville as a great-great-great grandson of Isaac and Janet McLeod who, with Isaac's brother John and his wife Helen, emigrated from Nova Scotia in 1861 and later were the first Europeans to settle in Te Awaroa, which John later renamed 'Helensville' after his wife.

Janet Hawley, who came with her family to live in Helensville when she was eight, went to Helensville Primary, where Graeme are form at eight and the staying at the South Head McLeod home, which had been built by Graeme's grandfather Vivian McLeod. Janet recalls it wasn't until she was in the 5th form and after Graeme's return from a year as an American Field Scholar that they first went out together. Their first date was at Hinemoa House, where Janet waitressed before and after school.

Graeme and Janet remember hanging out in Commercial Rd milk bars and the rugby club in the weekend. Often there would be rugby club dances with live bands at the War Memorial Hall. At school they both enjoyed the academic work and the sport. Janet has strong memories of school uniform hassles – in the days of the miniskirt the regulation gym frock length was hard to take – and they both remember many of their teachers, particularly physics teacher Brian Dunphy, who would invite students home to socialise with him and his family, and Head of English Joan Ruzich, who took Graeme and Janet (who was underage) to see Clockwork Orange, and later asked Graeme and his cousin Helen to be her son David's godparents.

After marrying when Graeme was 24 and Janet was 20, the couple, after returning from a two-year OE, moved to the South Head McLeod family home, running the farm and raising three daughters. For the last 23 years Graeme has been working in real estate. Janet, after pursuing a career in finance, is now an arts therapist working from the Helensville Women and Family Centre.

They're both looking forward to catching up with people they haven't seen for a long time and hoping to see a lot of people from their year groups, particularly at the big party on the Saturday night.




October's Save Kiwi Month includes a national fundraising campaign led by Kiwis for kiwi.



Dealing with debt

Several families are reducing debt thanks to our Helensville Citizens Advice Bureau.

Two successful cases have involved clients not understanding the loan they obtained.

This resulted in the finance companies writing off the loan as they may have failed to comply with the Responsible Lenders Code- not explaining the loan or the clients feeling pressured into taking out the loan.

Both clients were overwhelmingly relieved in having the debt removed so that the extra money could pay for other family needs.

Other clients have also been helped by our CAB in communicating with creditors to refinance over a longer period or reduce the amount owing to a win-win for both parties.

In some cases it can take several weeks to achieve a satisfactory outcome but our CAB's budget advisers can assist right through the process.

For one client the CAB worked for 8 months to reach a burden-lifting conclusion.

The free and confidential service is available for those needing to manage their debt or understand their finances and repayments.

Our budget advisers can also help with employment issues. This ranges from assisting employers who do not know what to put into an employment contract or employees who don't understand their contract or the pitfalls of not having a contract.

I always say that New Zealand is the best little country in the word and the Helensville electorate is the best within it. And I hope you feel the same!

If we're going to maintain a high standard of living, though, none of us can afford to be complacent.

I love a good "conversation" about wellbeing as much as the next person (unless the next person is Jacinda Ardern, because no one loves talking about it as much as she does) but there's more to public policy than that.

First and foremost, ensuring a strong economy means good jobs and the societal benefits brought by Kiwis who are able to work doing just that. It's well established that contributing to the community through employment is good for individuals' sense of self-worth, as well as the wider good.

Of course a strong economy also means an ability to provide better infrastructure, lower the cost of daily living and enables us to buy the kind of healthcare and education that we rightly expect. Our hospitals and schools are built on the backs of the hardworking Kiwis like you.

When writing a local column I usually focus on local issues but this time around thought I'd venture a slightly more political perspective.

If you've seen the latest statistics for GDP growth then you'll know that things have been slowing considerably. And the picture is the same for manufacturing, with stuttering stats in that sector too. An area of particular concern for Auckland's northwest can be found in the challenges of a squeezed seasonal migration market: this makes life very hard for our horticulture businesses, including strawberry growers and various or chards.

The country isn't quite in recession just yet but the downward trend on many fronts is ominous. Based on the anecdotal data of my many chats with locals, along with the official numbers, I'm calling it a "precession". I'd love to be proven wrong about where it's all headed but we shall see.

Joe Donohue

August 1948 - September 2019

Local identity Thomas John Naughton Donohue, known to everyone as Joe, was born in a little house behind the Power Board building in Helensville. When Joe's father won a ballot farm at South Head the family, including Joe, his sister Helen and their parents Paddy and Heather, moved there to a dairy farm. At the funeral Helen recalled an amazing childhood, with plenty of parties, dances, dress-up balls and card nights in community-spirited South Head. Summers were spent swimming in Lake Ototoa (now called Rototoa) and water skiing at Honeymoon Bay.


When he was 10 Joe began playing badminton and he and Helen became a formidable mixed doubles combination. Helen remembered that every week Bully and Edna Menzies would pile all the kids into their car and take them to play at Kumeu. Joe was a very good sportsman, also excelling at snooker, cricket and golf. At Waioneke school Joe and Helen were lucky to have Mr and Mrs Shanks as their teachers. On leaving school he moved to Auckland, then returned to his birthplace.

In 1975 he met Kath and her sons and together they had daughter Kim. He later married Marlene and was stepfather to her 9 children. His stepson spoke at the funeral, remembering him fondly as a good stepfather. He has two grandchildren, Alex and Aria.

Joe was generous and a hard worker, but not good with money. Helen said "In those days Mother bought him a fish and chip shop in Helensville and a boat, which was never used as he didn't have his skipper's licence. The mind boggles to think of Joe in charge of a fishing boat. He then bought a farm in Kaukapakapa – the less said about that, the better."

Stories told at Joe's funeral included that, as a curious child he would hop into the backseat of cars in the carpark and, on at least one occasion, had been driven to Orewa before he woke up and made his presence known. Helen remembered the numerous occasions she and Joe would hide calves in the back paddock in the hope that they wouldn't be found and taken to the works in the morning. "You can just imagine the war that occurred when the truck arrived," she said. "I wish there had been no smacking law in those days."

Helen also noted "How either of us survived our teenage years was a miracle, as Joe's driving left a lot to be desired." This was borne out by stories from Joe's long-time friend and co-conspirator Ted Phillips and others, like the time, worse for wear, he drove a VW up a tree, and the time he parked his car on a bowling green. Ted was very good to him when he became incapacitated and had to go into care. Locals will remember seeing Joe about town on his mobility scooter. Helen noted that for the past few years, as a result of not managing his diabetes, he lived in Craigweil House and that, because of his deteriorating health, his death was a happy release for him.
