

Helensville Museum progress

Totting up the wins and losses over the last couple of months, Helensville Museum is definitely on the plus side of the ledger.

Along with a generous donation from Kaipara Classic Car Club, the Museum was blessed with a fence fairy who quietly and anonymously repaired all the broken pickets. President Leigh Bosch and Vice President Robyn Stewart would love to thank the fence fairy in person, but the perpetrator of the good deed has yet to materialise.

A theft at the end of November saw items stolen when padlocks were cut on a storage container.

Police were notified at the time and Forensics attended the scene. While the act itself was upsetting, nothing of value was stored there and, on the upside, the theft had the effect of exposing the weak spots in the security system. Global Security came up with solutions whereby the shipping containers and tool sheds are now protected by the new, state-of-the art alarm system, as is the rest of the site. When the thieves returned in December, this time breaking into the container, two sheds and the barn, the

alarm system swung into action and the thieves scarpered, leaving behind crowbars, bolt cutters and a bag of loot.

The painstaking work on pest eradication

continues, with as many hours spent methodically researching solutions as are spent acting on expert advice received. Along with the material artefacts and historical documents, the buildings are also being given much-needed attention. In the annexe, for example, the pervasive musty smell was found to be caused by living black mould. Robyn has taken on the mammoth task of rebuilding the annexe, which involves treating and rebuilding it from the ground up with some help from Leigh and committee member Toni Walmsley, whose main focus is on preparing archival material for freezing.

"We're basically a team of three, with some very welcome help from other volunteers," says Leigh. "Every day there's something new and we're learning so much. We'll keep going through January and hopefully will be able to open Hedley House around February/March, then we'll do the courthouse, then the schoolhouse, then the Sunshine Block. This is our area's history, and once the stories are gone, they're gone, so whatever happens we're not giving up. We're setting it up to survive."

Volunteering is a great way to pay forward to the community. A big shout out to Kim and Sam McNamara who have been very busy in many ways volunteering in different roles in our

community over the years. Recently Sam was recognised by St John's for 200 hours volunteer hours. Kim is a medical responder for the local fire station. Thank you Kim and Sam for your efforts in our community.



Heather Steadman

Initially buying a bach at Shelly Beach Aotea in 2011, Heather Steadman moved permanently to South with Head her husband Chris and daughter Lily in 2016 and has already had a considerable impact on our local arts scene. After serving as a volunteer on the Art Centre Board she was appointed to the

position of Art Centre manager and exhibition curator in 2019. Last year she also started The Shoppe, an invited collective of artists and crafters, based at the railway station. Heather's work includes woven flax products including flowers, koha kete, and kono and waikawa baskets. She brings to her roles an enormous, positive energy and a wealth of life experience, much of it in the arts and community work.

Born in Maungawhau/Mt Eden and raised in Lynfield, near the shores of the Manukau Harbour, Heather was the youngest of four daughters. At 17 she left Lynfield College to work in the accounts department at Radio I. From there, she travelled widely and has embraced many roles. Her love of the sea was strengthened when she moved to Waiheke Island in the late 70's, lived off the ocean, with fishing and diving for kaimoana her main food source, and had her first encounters with sailing, hippies and house truckers. Living in Perth, Western Australia, Heather began keeler yacht racing at the East Fremantle Yacht Club, becoming a soughtafter mainsheet hand. After selling her house, she moved to a liveaboard community in Challenger Harbour Fremantle. Despite almost dying in a white-water kayaking incident, she gained the maritime qualification Coxswain, followed by Master Class V, worked in the inshore maritime industry with TAFE (education), then did tall ship sail training on the Leeuwin, a sail training ship similar to the Spirit of NZ. Returning to Aotearoa in 2000, she first volunteered then gained employment at the National Maritime Museum, where she was skipper and voluntary crew coordinator of the replica scow Ted Ashby. She held a position on the first Trust tasked with the restoration of the scow Jane Gifford and skippered her across the Manukau. Other maritime roles included

running freight to Great Barrier Island with Stella Shipping and the physically demanding job of workingas 1st/2nd Mate on Spirit of Adventure.

Alongside her maritime adventures, Heather has had years of experience working with community organisations. In her first Not for Profit role she ran the Waiheke Community Crêche. In Singapore she discovered the richness of multiculturalism, volunteering at a Buddhist Monastery home for the aged, where she taught handcrafts, including macramé. She also volunteered at a refugee camp for Vietnamese boat people, teaching children the basics of the English language. In Perth she worked in the disability community access field for Activ Foundation and in a youthwork arena service with street kids, advocating and organizing bush camps. Somewhere in the mix she spent three months in Meekathara, where she worked voluntarily in the Aboriginal community alongside the community health nurse and as the Meals on Wheels coordinator, a position she gained on her third day in town.

Heather has never been far from the arts. In Fremantle she surrounded herself with art, theatre, music and dance, for example working for renowned potter Joan Campbell in her gallery and assisting in her workspace. At WINTEC in Waikato Heather gained a certificate in Te Aho Tapu – the Sacred Thread, after studying traditional flax weaving (raranga) practices. She then initiated a monthly art market in Laingholm and was appointed to the position of Coordinator at the Titirangi Community Arts Council "Upstairs Gallery" in Lopdell House. After two and a half years she left to have her daughter Lily, whom she calls her "greatest creation". More study followed, and while living in Te Atatu Peninsula Heather finished qualifications in Not for Profit Management (GradDip) and Social Practice/Community Development (PostGradDip). She ran Mainly Music, a playgroup and a coffee group with other parents and ran Our Amazing Place Treasure Hunts as a volunteer. She undertook contract work in the community development organisation Violence Free Waitakere. Following this she worked for Plunket as a Pepe coordinator facilitating parenting education, then for Cherish Trust (Post Natal Distress Network) as a peer support group facilitator.

All this experience makes Heather an excellent fit for her current Art Centre role. To realise the Art Kaipara vision "to build capacity through enhancing the social and cultural wellbeing of people in the community through inclusivity and participation in the creative arts", for example, she is planning to expand the educational program to include regular classes and interest groups.

After moving to South Head Heather has been engaged with Lily's school as a parent helper with the usual transporting, tree planting, camp attending and helping at events and has played at markets in a duo, Pheather, with school bus driver Peter Borthwick. "Living here there are a few things I don't like -dust season on the gravel roads, lack of access to a really good long bush walk, idiots on the cutout to the beach on Wilson Road and at the Prawn Farm leaving their rubbish – but a lot that I do. It's great to be spoiled for choice - Woodhill Forest for the off-road motorbike park, Parakai pools, Lake Rototoa for a cool dip in summer and Te Rau Puriri regional park for a hike to the beach and a night walk listening for bats. School camps at Highams Beach and Muriwai. Family events at Shelly Beach with its café and environmental improvements. South Kaipara Landcare looking after the environment and the SKRRA (ratepayers association) looking after roading issues. The Kewpie Two river excursions, Arts in the Ville, the Kaipara Coast Sculpture Trail, Mataia Homestead walks and kiwi on the land there. I also like the wide-open spaces, the sky at night and the ever-changing views of the harbour."

The future of our **Christmas Parade**

A huge thank you to all who turned out as volunteers to facilitate the biggest and best parade ever proceeding. A number of floats evidenced time, imagination and effort contributed, with the overall standard much improved against earlier years. The business community was lacking in representation, something to work on for next year?

Whilst there is significant interest in participating in the parade, and the spectator crowd was greater than last year, the reluctance of the community to volunteer remains a problem. We were again short of necessary numbers, straining the capacity of a dedicated few. Additional to a core group of leaders, we need at least 70 volunteers including 30 marshals. Those who take leading roles year after year are getting older (we lost 2 key people from the parade start area less than a week before the event, due to ill health). Fit younger people are desperately needed to learn and commit to key roles.

For 2020 volunteer registration will be available from early September. If the required numbers are not in place by end October, there will be no parade.

Vector were simply intransigent, completely failing to register any concern. Mountainside FM broadcast messages critical of Vector over their unacceptable plan, to no avail.

In desperation our MP Chris Penk was called to action. Within a day Vector advised the earlier notification was an error (!!!), and that generation would be provided, with just one hour outages at 6.30am and 5.30pm.

So Christmas business in Helensville survives, with Penk bells on. Did any of the affected businesses contact their local BID representatives? Did the BID manager even know about it? Where is our advocacy?

Tell that responsible person details like the number of people on board, your boat name, type, colour and a radio call sign. Remember to take two forms of communication that is waterproof or in a waterproof bag. Each person needs to have a life jacket on.

Our crew have been busy in the water training hard. We train every Tuesday night from 7pm to increase our skill level. When training on the water we make scenarios as real as possible so we understand what we need to do when a real emergency situation is unfolding.

We are busy making plans and fundraising for our new Coastguard building. This new building will comfortably fit our boats, equipment and give us a training room. The new building will also be near the water at the end of Springs Road in Parakai.

Given that South Kaipara boasts so many different and varied gardens it's great to see them attracting outside interest.

A summer trip to Helensville of the Hibiscus Coast Garden Club on a gloriously sunny day began with a visit to the Railway Museum, where museum volunteers entertained the group with stories about the place and its history.

The first garden they visited was Bron Smith's. "I told the organiser, Marion McCracken, that Ruth's Gardens is really just a working vegetable patch, but she said they go to all sorts of gardens and they were keen to come," says Bron. As well as providing her 48 guests with morning tea ("I put my catering hat on") Bron, who has run microgreen growing workshops but for whom this visit from the public was a first, gave a formal talk explaining her permaculture, organic and biodiversity principles then walked round her three-acre Manuka Grove garden with the guests, showing them her trees, beehives and edible plants and answering their many questions. "It was quite delightful. I think I take for granted how beautiful it is where we live and lots of them were very keen to chat to me."

After spending an hour and a half at Bron's the garden club visitors were bussed to the Rogan Ave home of Raywin and Wayne Cruikshank for lunch. Greenlaw Bed and Breakfast, named after a Cruikshank family property in England, has a beautiful cottage garden on its acre of land, and the owners enjoy sharing it with the public. "When we came here 30 years ago, we chopped out the only two trees that were here and then I proceeded to plant the garden out," says Raywin. "Then about 10 years ago we set up as a B and B. People come because they love the peace and quiet and listening to the birds." After lunching at Greenlaw, wandering around the garden and admiring Raywin's paintings, the group got back on the bus for their last stop, the Mahoenui gardens in Coatesville.

Raywin describes the experience of opening up her garden to the public as a real pleasure. "It's lovely to share what you do because there's a common interest. In a humble way, it's knowing people enjoy it as much as I do."

End of an era for Ron

After 13 years volunteering as a maintenance man at Helensville Museum, Ron Isles is hanging up his hammer and saw and looking forward to new projects.

Ron, a retired builder, now 85 years old, moved to Helensville from Waitakere with his wife Alice when he was around 70 and soon found his way to the Helensville Museum. "I've always been a collector, for example my milk bottle Ron Isles stands on the steps collection started when my dad used to work for the Ambury's co-operative in Epsom, so when Glenyss Blackshaw put an

advert in the newspaper for museum volunteers I wandered in and said I was interested in gardening. When she found out I was a builder I didn't get to do any gardening. I started by building eight outdoor seats, which are still in use, and replaced a balustrade."

For the past 13 years Ron has spent two days a week at the Museum, helping with maintenance of the buildings and the growing machinery collection. "We gathered such a good collection of machinery we had a shed built and we filled it up in no time - small stuff like lights and old kerosene lanterns. We had to make a new room in the back of the courthouse, so we split that into three pieces and built a post office in front. For a two-year period, I had a gang of PD boys helping and they were very good." Ron remembers the time when the PD workers helped move around 30 metres of tarseal off the road. "We diverted three big truckloads from the dump and spread it on the drive. At the time there were three volunteers, Robin and Tom and me. All the tar melted in the sun till it was a solid blob of tarseal, so I stood at the top of the heap, broke it up and pushed it down the side and the others raked it onto the concrete path. It was a big job."

With more time on his hands, Ron now plans to make up a kitset a model of the Endeavour, a job he reckons will take him about two years. "This will be my second model boat. I built one about 20 years ago and it took me about three years."

Ron says he has thoroughly enjoyed it his time volunteering at the Museum and he wishes all those involved the best of luck with the improvements being made.

To thank Ron for his years of selfless service the Museum committee have named a shed in his honour.

Levia Aukino-uruamo (Te Taoû, Ngâti Whâtua): community health enthusiast

Born to a Mâori mother and a Cook Island father, Levia Aukino-uruamo loves working with others to help them live healthier lives. Until she was nine, she lived on Mâori-owned whenua at Reweti, one of five marae in South Kaipara, then moved between Reweti and her father's Massey home until she moved in with Edward Uruamo at 21, eventually marrying him and raising four children together. Steeped in both the cultures of her birth, she learned tikanga on the marae, te reo at Rutherford College and Cook Island Mâori from her Levia's energy and grandparents.



generosity characterise her community health work

Levia has always worked closely with communities. Her first job was as a cadet for the government department looking after Mâori and Pacific Island apprentices, after which she was an administrator for Training Opportunities Scheme (TOPS) courses for seven years. As a young woman she was a trustee on the Rewiti maraeBoard but is now on the marae committee because "working at that level is more real for me." When the children were young, she ran holiday programmes at Reweti Marae and organised a monthly market day to encourage whakawhanaungatanga.

As well as DJ-ing with Ed at private gigs, she teaches te reo at Woodhill, her former primary school, and helps Edward with the complicated business of a family land claim. She has also been involved in developing community health programmes for several years. "In 2003, while we were living at Woodhill, I used to walk with my cousins and one day when we were talking about what could make us better mums we decided it was about looking after yourself, that your own health and well-being should be your top priority."From there, with help from Te Hâ Oranga, a Ngâti Whâtua organisation providing health and wellbeing services, she developed her first health programme, a weight loss challenge. "We ran it at Reweti marae with aerobics, healthy-cooking classes, walking circuits, table tennis and basketball and about 50 people came. It worked really well - a lot of my aunties found out things about their health they didn't know." Eventually Levia was employed by the professionals' healthcare cooperative ProCare



to continue her whanau health and well-being programme, Toku Oranga PaiWhanau Ora (A New Me). This contract ended after seven years but, having seen so many successes from the work, she continues with her inspirational programme, basing it around Helensville.

After a time away from the market she and Edward have returned to run it, putting a lot of energy into the monthly community event, providing music and dance as well as a vibrant sense of community. Levia visits local marae to help out with their hâkinakina (sports). She leads a hikoi (walking group) three times a week and, as someone brought up on Cook Island dancing, has turned her love of dancing into a brilliant exercise practice that benefits many. As well as taking her boom box and her enthusiasm around marae and local events, getting people on their feet and moving, she runs regular weekly classes. She calls her popular day class 'groovy line dancing' although following choreographed patterns of steps to music is as close as it gets to the country and western dancing of that name. It's great exercise, great fun and the atmosphere is invariably accepting - anyone who attends is warmly welcomed and encouraged to keep going and keep smiling. The evening class, kanikani (pamper) is broader, with some line dancing but also a lot of pampering, with facials made from natural products, foot spas and healthy smoothies. "I'm keen on bringing families together and health is my priority," says Levia. "If exercise isn't fun it won't be long term. It's about doing things together and being able to share. We all need to look after ourselves."

There will be a range of talented young local musicians performing a selection of music with a broad spectrum of appeal.


