



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Citizens Advice Bureau Budgeting Te Pou Whakawhirinaki o Aotearoa

Who hasn't at some time of life recognised the following symptoms; a nagging feeling of dread, a hollow in the pit of the stomach, not wanting to think about the coming week? Sound familiar? The most common reason is usually fear about money, or more specifically a lack of it. Uncertainty can be crippling, but one thing is certain, unless this all-too-common problem is addressed it is certain to get worse.

We can all think of times we have been hit with sudden extra expenses. Maybe a new tyre, a failed water cylinder, a pet needing to be rushed to the vet, but time and negotiation will usually get us through. A far deeper issue is when what we need to spend remains stubbornly more than the regular income we can rely on. This is a quicksand, from which it is very difficult to escape. The desire to keep it to ourselves, to reassure ourselves it will eventually "come right" and to hide the problem from a partner can overwhelm our common-sense, and in doing so block us from solving the very issue that is driving us deeper and deeper into trouble.

Happily there is a solution, and it can work every time. If you recognise yourself in this little story only one thing is required of you, to face up to the situation and ask for help. Where to go to get it? Easi-peasi, your local Helensville Citizen's Advice Bureau. The CAB has a budget service which is capable of assisting with your issues. We can, for example negotiate to get what you need to pay regularly reduced, we can supply a work-sheet to identify the trouble-spot and walk you through the exercise, we can assist in employment issues or consumer matters if that is the problem

The main thing is to know you are not alone with your problem and a solution could be close at hand. As the old saying has it, "A problem shared is a problem halved". We're here to help you to help yourself. Call 09-4207162, or just call in and speak to one of our trained volunteers. We re-open Monday 18th January 2021, 10am to 3pm.

I have contacted (or am about to) schools and ECEs to schedule visits for the next few months. If your school or ECE hasn't heard from me, please get in touch.



Naming Helensville reviewed by Brian Hale

In our April 2018 issue we ran an article by Helen Martin concerning the naming of Helensville. While her article concludes that "the town was undoubtedly named after Helen McLeod" it raises the question about whether the "ville" came from the house that John McLeod built or the French word for town. The article concludes "Was our town named after a person or a house?"

The Editor has recently received the following information from a reader seeking to clarify this question, from details drawn from "A History of Helensville and Kaipara by Charles Staniland West". In this book Charles Staniland West recounts his verbal history through family dynamics and events. Published in 1952 (It is believed) the book notes Charles Staniland West lived in the district from 1884 and on page 37 he states Helensville is derived from 'Helen' and 'ville'. Helen being the wife of John McLeod and 'ville' is for small town or settlement.

Our reader believes that original house that John McLeod built in Nelson Street no longer exists.

"It is well known early settlers were brothers John McLeod and Isaac McLeod. John was married to Helen and they had a single story house in Nelson Street. That house was pulled down though by Daniel Stewart and replaced by the current two storied house. So any claim of that actual house being the house after which Helensville is named is totally false. I believe Daniel Stewart was another strong name in the history of Helensville though." she writes.

The brothers John and Isaac McLeod appear to have had a property at each end of Helensville- 'Northend' associated with John and Helen and 'Southend' associated with Isaac and his wife

As examples of how other names came about West then goes on to say 'Kai' is the Maori word for food and 'Para' is the name of a big strong fern that grew plentiful in the kauri bush of North Auckland and was used by Maori for food. 'Parakai' is a transposition of the two words.

When a name was wanted for a post office it was found that the name 'Kaipara' could not be used as it was previously taken by Kaipara Flats so the name "Parakai" was coined to be used for the new Post Office.

Our reader, who recently moved into the area got Charles Staniland West's book from the library. "It is a small dated looking book and amusing to read as it refers to families and properties as being next to trees, buildings or bridges that were there at the time of writing (1950s) but without actual address locality. Much can be made sense of and could possibly be easier with a visit to the local museum." she says.

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
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Kid's Fishing Competition

The 23rd January was slightly windy, but sunny, perfect for the Kaipara Cruising & Sportfishing Club Annual Kid's Fishing Competition.

The club was established in the 1940s and the annual fishing competitions are a great way of attracting new members.

Competition organiser, Sheena

Johnson has grown up in the KCSC, and has participated in all the fishing competitions for many years. She is now organising the events while her own family participate. "Over the years I know I caught some pretty big Snapper," she said "but I just remember it being a really fun day". The club enjoys the help of many supporters and volunteers like Jean who has been on the bar at KCSC for 17 years.

The competition has been running for more than 20 years, and has been growing in size each year. This year, the KCSC had 83 children registered for the competition. "Back in the day we would only have 15 kids registered. Some kids are very keen, and it's a 50/50 mix of club member's children and children from the community" Sheena says.

There were five main categories; Snapper, Kahawai, Gurnard, Travelly and King Fish. Children are aiming for First, Second or Third in each of those categories, however every child that participates leaves with a prize. The prizes were all sponsored by businesses or families in the community. This year the prize pool was valued at \$1500 and the major sponsors for this event were the very generous local business Water FX and Burnsco, West Haven.

The competition started at 6am, just before sunrise at 6.30am and high tide 6.50am, and all fish caught had to be brought to the club at Mill Road Helensville for weighing by 4pm. By then the club was a hive of activity with many excited children lined up to have their fish weighed. There was talk of a King Fish being caught, which was the first in many years and it did not disappoint. Many children, not engrossed in the weighing in had fun jumping on the bouncy castle, and playing with swing ball sets that the club members had supplied and set up on the grass area outside the clubrooms. After a meal and something to drink it was time for prize giving.

Ollie White caught the only King Fish of the day at 6.105kg and walked away with a nice new Burnsco fishing rod and reel. The biggest Snapper went to Kingston Wihongi Johnson -4.020kg, biggest Kahawai went to Brylee Halliday – 2.235kg, biggest Travelly went to Ryan Kennedy – 2.230kg and the biggest Gurnard went to Indie Foreman – 0.740kg. Kaukapakapa library - Trainspotting


Sunday 21st February, 9.30am to 1pm

Since the first train came through Kaukapakapa in 1897, the railway has been an integral part of the settlement's creation and development. The Makarau tunnel, a few kms north of the village, was an engineering feat taking eight years to complete using bricks made on site.

Tracking forward, 2020 has been the year of the Northern upgrade from Auckland to Whangarei, with the railway reopening in early 2021 following significant modifications to the tunnel, the line from Helensville and the Punganui bridge.

The library will have on display existing historical and contemporary photos, along with a selection of articles and documents giving an insight into some of the challenges faced, both past and current. Site photography by Colin Lunt has helped us record the next chapter of our local rail system. Come along, there is once again light at the end of the tunnel!

Working with ability, having fun!

The title is the by-line for the Arts & Activities Programme run by Pauline Denton for L'Arche Mount Tabor Trust. Pauline was invited to set up the programme over ten years ago as the Trust's Community Leaders saw a need for it. Then, as now, there is no funding for this but there was a need to create worthwhile activities for people to engage in. Now, ten years later, that programme includes a 'Music & Sing-a-long' session, a choir, drama, painting and craft sessions, table games and a day-time disco. All of these sessions are open for people outside of the Trust to attend. As the property the art side of the programme is run from has been sold, new premises are being sought from early April. Preferably a large, accessible paint-friendly room with a sink, an accessible toilet and small room to store resources in at a reasonably low rent.

Many artists have emerged from the programme, including the late blind artist Francis Ritchie, who had displayed no interest in art prior to loosing his sight. "Working with someone who couldn't see what they were doing was, to put it mildly, problematic" says Pauline "but I came up with the idea of working on black canvases and getting Francis, who had a good colour memory, to pour colours of his choosing onto the canvas. I would then describe the amount of paint to him and he would move it around the canvas using a whisk or other kitchen item as a bit of a fun reference to Francis weight. It was an absolute privilege to watch the paintings take shape, especially as I knew Francis would never be able to see them. He seemed to instinctively know when to stop spreading the paint, except for one time when I remember telling him that his piece could sell for a couple of hundred dollars as he kept working on it and it began to resemble scrambled eggs". Francis was very proud to hold a solo exhibition entitled 'New Vision' before, sadly, passing away but some of his art will be included in the new exhibition.

Other artists have also emerged, including Kevin Widdowson, who was a finalist in the IHC Art Awards with his 'Rainey Dayz' painting, visually impaired photographer Rachael Clarke, and Thomas Hogan. If anyone has met Thomas they may have

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experienced him bounding towards them saying "Hello la la" (lady)


or "Hello man", a simple "Hello Tom" is all that is required back. Thomas state of anxiety is dispelled when he paints and is replaced with a very meditative state as he creates his works. Thomas is a member of Art Kaipara and won first place in their one and only art competition, judged by the then head of the Art Department at Kaipara College, Leah Wilson.

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In tough times what is Auckland Council's core business? by Cr Greg Sayers,

What has frustrated me the most as your Councillor has been many repeated attempts to have Council define what core business is in order to allow the debate to focus on trimming back on noncore Council services.

By way of example Aucklanders' rates are being used to pay for yoga classes, daycare centres, camping grounds, marinas, golf courses and a host of other services which should be being run by private enterprises.

Mayor Goff has says my comments are "rubbish". In fact, they are highly accurate and he has been given the evidence to fully support them. So whose comments are really rubbish?

Auckland Council cannot afford to be all things to all people right at this moment. It needs to cut its cloth to fit its revenue in what has been an unprecedented tough year. At the very least the Council needs to peel back services to prioritise the essentials that Helensville needs and to make the tough calls about what services are nice-to-haves in the CBD.

When the eight legacy Councils were amalgamated into the Super City ten years ago, with the promise of requiring fewer staff and having greater efficiencies, a crucial step was overlooked which needs to be corrected.

Each of the different Councils offered an array of different services but no filter was applied to determine if all of the services were appropriate to be provided by the newly formed Auckland Council. A cutting back to provide core services in a cost efficient-way never happened so the staff costs of providing all the services have remained entrenched. A chance was squandered.

What is required is for the Mayor's current self-sponsored internal cost saving working parties to be replaced by a "razor squad" of competent external people who have no allegiance to Auckland Council. They should be given the authority to go through all of councils operations and cut 10 per cent of unnecessary spending. This rules out elected officials, staff and any current or past consultants being part of such an exercise.

Auckland Council received \$129 million from the regional fuel tax but only spent \$89 million in the first year of collections on fixing traffic congestion – a core service.

Last year Auckland Council received \$148m and spent even less at \$79m, so what's happened to the unspent \$109 million?

Ratepayers may be shocked to learn the Council can in turn use the unspent transport money on its own daily operational expenses or for financing its ballooning debt.

I cannot emphasise enough the need for residents and ratepayers to submit between 22 February and 22 March on the Mayors proposed 5 percent rates about what core services you believe need to be supported by the spending of your rates in the Helensville, Parakai and wider local area.
