In a time when travelling any great distance was difficult, there was a need to make your own fun closer to home, and make fun they did. Gatherings took place which were as much about socialising as exercising and competing - a way to keep up with the news of

In 1885 the Kaukapakapa Jockey Club was formed and the first race meeting held which was attended by over 300 people. School swimming was a 'boys only' affair, which involved stripping off behind a hawthorn hedge, swimming naked and then running up and down the paddock to dry off. That's until the girls wanted in...... Next came a tennis club with courts marked out at the school, the Kaukapakapa Rifle Club in 1914, the Bowling Green in 1929 and the school pool in 1953. Add to this rugby, croquet, horse riding, hockey and cricket to name a few, and you can conjure up an image of a thriving active community.





# \* From Penk's Pen

This time it's different. As I write, Auckland is about to cross the threshold of the previous longest lockdown, albeit intended, advertised and certainly hoped to be "short and sharp".

18 months ago, the novelty of covid19 restrictions outweighed the burden of restrictions as far as many Kiwis were concerned. Stuffed toys adorned the windows. This time around, it's not just the teddy bears that are stuffed.

The mood of my constituents has changed significantly lately, as an entirely predictable state of affairs has come to pass. With vaccine rollout having been so slow, it was only a matter of time until a variant that's been around for some months would escape from the ad hoc MIQ facilities – barely modified hotels – in New Zealand's largest and most densely populated city.

In early 2020 I could see the effect that the very first lockdown was already having on some constituents. And even though I would cop some criticism for calling for a more nuanced approach (for instance, that butchers, greengrocers and bakers should be allowed to trade during Level 4, provided they could do so safely), I stand by my advocacy to this day.

Since that time, as your local MP I have become all the more aware of various other adverse effects that lockdowns can have. These aren't always reported in the nightly news, possibly because they are so personal to the individuals concerned and are "slow burn" problems by their nature.

A key category of difficulty is education, for example, with those already on the margins inevitably becoming marginalised further. Irregular, unpredictable and therefore stressful situations arise during lockdowns particularly for those with special learning needs. And "learning from home" is not easy when you're living in a rural or remote area that still has poor internet connectivity. Even more to the point, such stresses and strains don't end when the lockdowns do. I've sat with these families, so I know.

I fear for many people in this area and can only hope that we soon see an end to the restrictions. That way, we can start trying to rebuild all the local lifestyles and livelihoods affected in this way. Please follow public health advice to keep yourselves and your loved ones safe.

As I type, we're in Level 3 – with lots of discussions going on about how the library and service centre will look and serve you at Level 2.

As it's a case of moving goalposts, it is hard to predict EXACTLY how things will look and work.

What we do know is:

- Numbers in the building including the library will be limited. We have a small space, so trying to maintain a 2-metre distance between us all will be tricky.
- If you are unwell please stay home.
- If you need to return library items and restock and don't
  feel comfortable out in public / in a public space we may be
  able to organise a homebound service for the duration. This is
  not limited by age, however our older customers are our priority
  in this instance.
- Please wear a mask while in public including in our building.
- Signing in: as well as many QR code posters in the building, we will have 'ballot box' type slips for you to manually sign in.
   These will be kept securely in date bundles. These will be what the Covid tracing team will use to contact you, if necessary. Once they are not needed, they will be disposed of securely.

# Let's take the politics out of infrastructure

When I think of the north west, I think of cafés, butchers, fresh fruit and veges, wineries, surf beaches, hot pools, horses, calf clubs and pet lambs.

Mountain bike and motor-cross parks are among the best in New Zealand. Cropping and livestock farming are still important businesses. And new housing developments.

Living in north west Auckland is a dream come true for first home buyers, families and life stylers. It should be a good place to run a small business, because there is plenty of business land close to where people live, and close to State Highway 16 connecting Auckland and Northland.

The region was identified as a high growth area in council plans going back decades, and in the 2015 Auckland Unitary Plan, so we rightly assume when a council zones land for housing and for business, roads and infrastructure will be provided in a timely fashion.

But local roads constructed over 100 years ago for bullock carts now carry 10-15,000 vehicles per day, and over 36,000 per day on State Highway 16 through Kumeu and Huapai.

Local roads are not only unsafe, but they are also so poorly maintained that an enterprising local lad has taken to spray painting explicit content around potholes to troll Auckland Transport into fixing them.

Flooding a few weeks ago revealed that drainage networks are totally inadequate for growth that has already occurred, let alone for the next 30 years and thousands more homes and businesses.

For decades, successive councils and governments ducked their responsibilities to this high growth area, while taking development contributions, taking fuel excise duty and road user charges, and taking GST on new building and local business turnover.

The long awaited SH16 Kumeu-Huapai bypass has no start date, the project is still in a planning phase. Plans to extend the shiny AT electric trains even to Kumeu are also years away. Old bridges and undersized culverts cause flood water to back up into businesses and homes.

So, we rightly ask, why is our community treated this way, while Government proudly announces a \$780 million cycle bridge across the Waitemata, a multi-billion dollar light rail to the airport, and Auckland Council insists on painting town centres blue, while taking out precious parking?

congestion in the North West, the Minister of Transport belatedly confirmed NZTA would extend an express bus service as far as Westgate, kindly described as "a little bit better" by the Greater Auckland advocacy group.

On 27 July 2021 there was a photo opportunity with Ministers, the Mayor and allied councillors holding shiny new spades, although they haven't secured the land for the bus stations, they don't have the consents, and construction has still not started anywhere on the bus route.

The token bus service won't reach the rapidly growing communities in Kumeu, Huapai, Waimauku and Helensville, or provide capacity to connect Riverhead and Hobsonville. Nor will it address the most important issue - there is simply not enough road capacity, enough lanes, for traffic and freight, a situation which has got steadily worse for the past 20 years.

That's because announcements about what to build, and decisions about what infrastructure to ignore, are based on political calculations, not on what is needed. The Minister of Transport confirmed to ACT that only 27% of NZTA funds will be allocated to roads between 2021 and 2024, although 100% of the revenue comes from road users.

Over 70% of NZTA funds will be allocated to maritime and rail projects, increasing to nearly 80% in the 2024 to 2027 period. This does nothing to solve the current congestion and growth problems, but it does help the Government meet their self-imposed climate targets.

This will only change when decision making is taken away from politicians.

ACT proposes a system of 30-year infrastructure partnerships between regional and central government. These partnerships would leverage the advantages of local and central government. Councils have the local knowledge to design and prioritise infrastructure intelligently. They are directly accountable to local voters and understand the needs of their constituencies.

Meanwhile, central government, through the Infrastructure Commission, would be responsible for assessing the performance of these partnerships against pre-determined and agreed metrics, like population growth, road fatality rates, and congestion levels.

The Government would also be entitled to withhold funding from councils which consistently failed to meet road safety targets or congestion reduction goals.

They also set town plans which guide how growth will happen. However, they are limited by inflexible funding rules, which make them heavily reliant on property rates and reduce their ability to cope with growth.

By contrast, the Government has access to cheaper debt funding and the ability to spread risk across a larger balance sheet. By matching Government funding with local knowledge, we can get more and better infrastructure built.

Also, the long-term nature of these plans will insulate infrastructure from political pressures. Infrastructure, with its very long-time horizons, is profoundly unsuited to decision-making by political leaders, beset by three-year tunnel vision. By setting plans decades in advance, we can avoid the on-again, off-again uncertainty created by the political cycle which deters councils and private infrastructure investors from undertaking ambitious projects.

New Zealand's pioneering spirit has not changed since the 1970s. We have simply suffocated it under layer upon layer of government regulation and intervention in the name of 'sensible' town planning and other well-intentioned, but ultimately foolhardy attempts at social engineering.

We need fundamental reform in our regulatory settings to allow building and attract investment. We need sensible apolitical management of local and central government infrastructure assets. That is what ACT's strategy for housing and infrastructure will deliver.



# Its tough times, Three Waters, off street parking and more by Cr Greg

New Zealand continues to go through difficult and unprecedented times with the outbreak of the delta variant. I know many of our people in Rodney may be feeling overwhelmed at the moment

In addition, many families in the Kumeu area have the additional pressure of having had to deal with the aftermath of flooding.

I am not happy with how Central government is overriding Auckland Council and it's ratepayers by not allowing consultation on important matters. "This is unconstitutional" says Cr Greg Sayers.

I would like to bring your attention to a growing concern around the lack of public consultation with Aucklanders regarding major changes impacting Auckland Council and its ratepayers.

The first is the government's proposal to radically change Auckland Council's ownership of its drinking, wastsewater and storm water services - called the "Three Waters Reform".

The "Three Waters Reform" proposes amalgamating all of Auckland's water services with the Far North, Whangarei and Kaipara District Councils (all of Northland) to create a new regional corporation which will take over all of the water services.

It is concerning the government is not seeking public consultation with Aucklanders. Auckland Council is being asked if it wishes to "opt in" or "opt-out". This lacks open and democratic processes, weakening transparency by ultimately circumnavigating the ratepayers who have paid for, and own, all of Auckland's water infrastructure.

Surreptitiously, the government has retained the right to make this amalgamation compulsory, with the ability force the new water corporation on councils regardless of 'opting in or out'.

It all seems to be bit of a sham – they can still strip Auckland of its water assets regardless of public sentiment.

The government has also created a rule banning a referendum on this proposal. This lack of engagement with Auckland's residents and ratepayers is of great concern.

Another huge concern is the government's announcement to force Auckland Council to remove a minimum numbers of off-street parking without any public consultation with residents and ratepayers by 20 February 2022 from its Unitary Plan.

This is unconstitutional – residents and ratepayers are being removed from having their say. This includes all townships and suburbs across the entire Auckland region. (i.e.: Warkworth, Matakana, Kumeu, and Riverhead)

The Government's solution to leave it up to developers to provide off-street parking - essentially means the provision of parking is now market-led by entrepreneurs, not by Council rules.

Aucklanders already have a glimpse into the future of what will happen to our public streets. Have you seen the width of the roads in new suburbs like Millwater or Milldale north of Auckland?

Imagine the houses having no off-street parking. Developers make more money from adding another bedroom than providing off-street parking and garaging.
