
appears to be unachievable before the end of the year.

Across NZ, an on-line presence is also the natural trend with CAB's national website gaining increasing usage to 250,000 hits each month.

The website's simple and clear directions even gained recognition in this year's Plain English Awards as the Best Organisation-Plain English Champion.

"It is an acknowledgement of the work of our 2,500 volunteers across Aotearoa who deliver our service to clients in a way that is both easy for them to understand, and that also includes empathy and respect for those clients," says Dr. Andrew Hubbard, Citizens Advice Bureau Acting Chief Executive.



Maori Medium Education Class celebrations

Maori Medium Class at Te Awaroa Celebrates 2 Years On Friday 4th November the tamariki at Te Kura Tuatahi o Te Awaroa with their kaiako Jess Rutherford celebrated the two year anniversary of their Maori Medium Education class. As part of the celebrations the tamariki shared how the class came to be with whanau and visitors Te Whare Kakano, the Maori Medium Education class from Parakai. They recalled their memories of the struggle whanau had trying to find a kaiako, the dawn karakia on the first day and the momentous day the table and chairs arrived.

Two years down the track the class has a roll of 15 students in Years 2-4, and is looking to grow. The tamariki went on to share their dreams and aspirations for the future of the kaupapa, many of them wanting to see more Maori classes at Helensville, a whare nui built on school grounds and Te Reo Maori strong and alive in their daily lives.

The whanau and tamariki planted a kowhai tree to signify the special day, knowing that when the kowhai tree flowers the anniversary of the class is coming up. Displayed with the rakau were the dreams and aspirations of the tamariki for the future. As the weather washes the words from the bamboo stakes, eventually they will fall to the base of the tree and return back to the earth. The thoughts the tamariki have for the future of the kaupapa will grow up with the tree and blossom.

A whakatauki that could be heard repeated in many of the korero was 'ko te piko o te mahuri, ko tera te tupu o te rakau' -the bend in the sapling determines how the tree will grow.

From the Principal's Desk - Light at the end of the tunnel

School has looked very different for our students and teachers during Term 4 at Kaipara College. Although challenging due to the very short notice, when Minister Hipkins gave us the go ahead to open school up, initially for our seniors and then more recently for our junior students we considered all our options. The question we asked ourselves was how can we best meet the needs of all of our students and our Kaipara College community? We were given direction from the Government: Each school "should self-assess their ability to operate safely at Alert Level 3. This includes thinking about how you are going to manage risks and protect staff, students and whânau under Alert Level 3."

We considered the vaccination rates for our local community and balanced that with the learning and well-being needs of our students and their families. In the end, for our senior students, we decided the best use of all our resources and to balance the health considerations and the learning needs, we would target specific students who needed to be on site to complete work and also complete work in subjects that are more difficult to complete at home. In this way we were also able to support other students to continue to complete their work on-line at home or come to school to be supervised to do so. In this way we were able to provide choice for individual students and their families, while ensuring all students continued to learn.

We supported our senior students one on one through Google meets and phone calls to set individual achievement goals through their Personalised Pathways Plan and students had regular check -ins with their whânau teachers throughout the process. This process has definitely paid off for our senior students as we tracked their progress and celebrated each small and large milestone success. Teaching and learning is definitely more difficult on-line and research tells us that students learn less and more slowly. Also we have certainly seen the critical importance that human connection makes to our well being, ability to learn and to experience success. All our students, when they returned, were excited to see their peers and their teachers. Mask wearing is mandatory and takes a bit of getting used to but our students have been happy to comply, as they are with physical distancing. What a brilliant group of young people we have here at Kaipara College and I would like to commend all our students for the efforts they and their families have made in this most unusual time. I am also grateful to have a diligent, conscientious staff, many of whom have gone above and beyond to stay connected with our students and supported all our young people to achieve their very best in a most difficult circumstance.

I am very much looking forward to welcoming everyone back to school next year, for an exciting year of fun and learning. The traffic light system tells us that schools will not lockdown again, we will mitigate the risk of transfer and manage COVID if or when it arises. Life marches on and happily there is light at the end of the tunnel. At Kaipara College our sense of purpose is clear and our priorities and commitment remain strong: to do the very best for our young people, to support them all to be the best they can be. Collectively we do this and continue to strive to do it better, in partnership with our parents, whânau and wider community.

I hope everyone has a safe and happy holiday and I look forward to seeing you all in the new year.

High tax at the pump, but for what?

For every litre of regular old 91 at the petrol station, the Government clips the ticket for around about \$1.29. That might not sound like a lot for one litre, but it builds up quickly.

For an average family with a Toyota Corolla, filling up a 50-litre tank ends up costing you over \$60 just in taxes. This is comparable when it comes to diesel for utes, vans and trucking as well. It all stacks up over a year and ends up stinging everyday Kiwis in the pocket. It's especially bad now, following three years of annual tax hikes and a new Regional Fuel Tax in Auckland.

Now, the beauty of the fuel tax system is that, in theory, all the money we pay in fuel tax goes into building and maintaining the roads we drive our cars and trucks on. So, there's a fairness to what we pay. But two things have changed recently that make this a little harder to swallow.

First, the current Government has been doing a lot less investing in roading. We have seen a whole bunch of roads rescoped, delayed, or cancelled to make room for a behemoth Auckland light rail project that looks like it might begin construction sometime this decade if we are very lucky. That's a lot of tax to pay for little return right now.

More immediately for many families though, they will be feeling the sting of increased costs as the cost of living goes up across the board under this Government. Inflation has been hitting record levels recently while the Government has been looking for more ways to pile on costs and compliance.

The wrongly named Clean Car Discount and Clean Car Standard kick in on April Fool's Day 2022, and will add between \$4000 to \$8000 to the price of every brand new low-emissions petrol and diesel vehicle, and in a knock on effect, will add around \$1500 to used vehicles from 2023.

The problem, then, with the Government's approach to piling on taxes is that it creates a price floor where, even if costs were to come down, they can only come down so far while taxes stay up.

That's the opposition stuff. The good news is that there is a way through this, ACT has a plan. We proposed back in May our Battlers Budget for Middle New Zealand that would deliver tax relief to Kiwis who need a break.

ACT would make two changes to our tax system to battle the cost of living. First, we would deliver a middle-class tax cut by abolishing the 30 percent tax rate on income between \$48,000 and \$70,000. This would deliver up to \$2000 a year back to working New Zealanders to help them get ahead of the cost of living.

Second, we would abolish the new 39 percent envy tax introduced by Labour. We need more people who want to bring their skills and invest in New Zealand, not less. The more productive and high skilled we get as a country, the more we see those economic benefits flow through the economy and help us all.





Starting at Kaipara College in the midst of the Pandemic

As the penultimate year of my time at Kaipara College draws to a close, I find myself thinking back to my experience of Year 9. The backpack crammed full of books and stationery. Many rich and diverse friendships. An end of year prize-giving. The exposure to a multitude of sporting and extracurricular activities. A profound connection to a community of people and a purpose that is far greater than myself.

But I also find myself thinking about the Year 9s of 2021 and their experiences. The 63 days of school that they have missed due to national and regional lockdowns. The six days that they spent at Kaipara College before the Auckland region went into its first lockdown of 2021.

The cancelled prize-givings, sporting events, and extracurricular activities. The sense of belonging to the Kaipara College community that some students have struggled to find due to such extensive disruptions.

On November 17th, less than four weeks before their final day of the year, our Year 9 and 10 students were able to return to site for the first time in 13 weeks. This new normal looks very different from what schooling was like before lockdown. Masks are worn by staff and students.

Social distancing and ventilation in classrooms is required. Students complete their on-line learning in a single classroom with supervision from their kaiarahi.

When I asked the students of class 9WEKA, they noted that this change came with both advantages and disadvantages. Students were happy to be able to reconnect with their friends and classmates face-to-face again and found that the classroom environment provided them with the sustained focus necessary to complete their remaining schoolwork. Many students also said that they found the transition from isolation to the comparatively busier classroom environment stressful, given the potential risk of transmission of the virus.

I also asked students whether they felt prepared to transition into Year 10 next year: socially, academically, and psychologically. While most students planned to continue their schooling at Kaipara College, some planned to move out of the region to other schools in the country and abroad. For these students, their peers will have had more in-class learning opportunities, increasing the difficulty of this transition for students. The overwhelming majority of students said that they felt unprepared in response to this question due to the setbacks and disruptions of lockdown, but were also confident in their own ability to make this transition.

When I spoke to our Year 9 students, I was expecting them to have viewed their year through a negative lens considering their perceived and overwhelming adversities. Instead, I was greeted by a group of students with unwavering positivity and evident adaptability towards their experiences this year and looking forward to their future. I came to learn that these students are resilient. Despite so many setbacks and uncertainties during this crucial year of their schooling lives, they have learned to take these challenges in their stride and achieve their own personal excellence nevertheless.



Appetite for change for local food bank

Every Tuesday morning there's a hive of activity at Te Whare Oranga o Parakai, the home of the Kai Collective Te Awaroa food bank.

Masked and gloved volunteers are busy packing paper bags with an array of fresh produce, meat, cheese, milk, cereal, rice and pasta and to go with them, a recipe card with instructions to turn the ingredients into three nutritious meals for a family of four.

Behind the scenes are the many advocates from the various community organisations who refer their clients to the food bank for support and who have been collectively running the Kai Collective since it started in the first Level 4 lockdown in March 2020.

Those agencies include Kindred Family Services, Te Ha Oranga, Outwest Youth, Parent Aid Northwest, South Kaipara Men's Centre, Kaipara College, the Helensville District Health Trust and the Angel Fund.

But as the community demand for food parcels has grown, so too has the operational needs of running the food bank. As such, the Kai Collective Te Awaroa is now transitioning away from the collective of social service agencies to operate as its own Charitable Trust.

The South Kaipara Good Food Trust will be focused not only on providing emergency food to those in need through the Kai Collective, but also on networking and initiating other projects focused on food, with the view that no-one in South Kaipara should need to worry about where to get their next meal.

Ana Christmas, the Executive Director of Kindred Family Services which has acted as the fund and contract holder for the Kai Collective says, "to have a team of dedicated volunteers and staff solely focused on addressing the complex and challenging issues around food security will be hugely beneficial for our community."



Mike Bridgman, Chairman of the new South Kaipara Good Food Trust says many might remember being part of discussions in the first half of the year when a community consultation was carried out asking people what good food means to them and what the barriers are to accessing it.

"That consultation resulted in the creation of a South Kaipara Food Plan, "he says, "and as we activate the ideas that came from that plan- things like an urban food forest, or a central food hub for people to meet, share and learn, we should, in time, see the demand for emergency food parcels come down as people learn to grow their own food security."

In the meantime, the Kai Collective Te Awaroa will continue to provide its much-needed service, which has seen demand spike over the recent weeks of lockdown in Auckland.

In the first week of August the Kai Collective distributed 52 parcels, but during the busiest week of Level 4 lockdown 92 parcels were given out to those in need, an increase of 76%.

Mike Bridgman says those involved in taking the Kai Collective Te Awaroa to its next stage recognise the contribution made by Kindred Family Services and all the other community partners which he says, "has been out standing and exemplary, particularly within a COVID-19 environment."


