Letter to the Editor Your opinion matters



Three Waters

I write in response to the recent opinion piece by the Labour list MP, Marja Lubeck about the government's controversial "Three Waters" proposals.

The first point to note is that no-one is claiming that water management is perfect in this country. We know there is work that needs to be done. Whilst underinvestment in water management has resulted in burst pipes and dirty water flowing into our rivers, in some parts of New Zealand, that doesn't follow that this Three Waters format is the right answer.

A key objective of Three Waters proposal is an antidemocratic asset grab in the name of centralisation. Transferring the control of drinking water, waste water and storm water away from councils is the aim of that game, handing it over to unelected, unaccountable co-governed entities. We must not allow the handover of the strategic resource that is water to bodies over which most Kiwis will have no control

The controversial Three Waters reforms have attracted wide-spread backlash, with a petition from the Taxpayers Union against the reform receiving almost 88,000 signatures, as well as 60 of the 67 councils around the country opposing the reforms as introduced. The Prime Minister, along with Minister Nanaia Mahuta, initially assured local councils that the scheme would be voluntary, only to later backtrack and announce that it will be forced on them. The National Party says the government must listen to the opposition of its people and put democracy back on the table.

Proponents of Three Waters are claiming that these reforms will save New Zealanders money, up to thousands per year. We know this is doubtful at best because the Government's own peer review debunked any alleged savings due to the financial implications of co-governance not being taken into account. Furthermore, under a co-governance reform, the controlling groups could charge for water usage and there would be no requirement for councils to cut their rates to reflect the fact they will cease to supply water services.

It's clear that New Zealanders are rejecting the Three Waters reform and this cannot be ignored. The fierce public disapproval sends a clear message: set aside Three Waters and go back to the drawing board. At a time when the Government needs to tighten their spending belt, the government needs to deliver a responsible solution for our water that preserves the democracy of its citizens and offers value-for-money for taxpayers.

Floods a warning of deeper problems

How can we grow a healthier communities and a healthy economy when floods causing so much damage to homes and businesses on such a regular basis?

In March 2017 the "Tasman Tempest" was a "once in a century" rainfall event, according to Mayor Phil Goff at the time.

Heavy rain on 30 August last year delivered the second wettest day in Kumeu since records began. Families were forced to evacuate terrified children and pets, if only they could find them in the early morning darkness.

Kaipara and Auckland's North West were hit by severe flooding again on 21 March 2022 the second time in less than a year, and described as the worst in living memory by locals.

I called a friend in Waimauku to ask whether his home was affected. While fortunate to be above the high-water mark, he was concerned about building materials stored at his yard.

If flood waters damaged stock it could take months to replace, which equals months with no work. With roads closed, he was stuck at home powerless to do anything about it.

The latest storm sparked calls for a flood warning system for Kumeu. While a siren might be needed in the short term, it is merely a band aid over the deeper problem – a massive infrastructure deficit making the effects of flooding much worse.

The recent Treasury Investment Statement lays this out for the Government, in advance of the 2022 Budget coming up in May. They cite the Infrastructure Commission's recent estimate that there is an "infrastructure gap" - the value of what New Zealand should have built but has not - of \$104 billion.

This is despite all the money contributed by local people for infrastructure through property rates, development contributions and the 15% GST on new builds which goes to central Government.

Culverts, bridges, drainage channels and stop banks should have been upgraded as land use intensified in the district over the past 30 years, but they were not.

ACT believes this problem can be solved quite simply with better incentives for councils to invest in high priority infrastructure, as well as better funding and financing tools.

We propose that central Government share half the GST on all new builds with local government, to cashflow the long list of infrastructure projects which are not currently funded. That would also incentivise councils to issue resource and building consents much more quickly so they could collect the money from central Government.

To make sure that the money gets to where it is needed, ACT proposes a system of 30-year infrastructure partnerships between regional and central government. The regional partnerships would prioritise the projects and have control of the budgets.

The Infrastructure Commission, on behalf of central Government, would monitor their performance against agreed metrics, like reducing flood damage within a certain time frame.

A similar approach matching Government funding with local knowledge is currently paying dividends in Auckland through the Auckland Transport Alignment Plan, so we would expect similar results for water infrastructure.

ACT believes our plan will help fix the infrastructure deficit faster, and deliver a healthier community and a healthy economy.

Dissatisfaction rampant citywide

The level of dissatisfaction being expressed by ratepayers about Auckland Council's planning processes has prompted Rodney Councillor Greg Sayers to suggest that they need a flame-thrower taken to them.



Cr Sayers says he regularly receives criticism about Council's planning department, particularly regarding resource consenting.

Primary concerns are about the time it takes to get a resource consent and the cost in Council fees. They come from across the board, whether people are adding a veranda, building a simple shed or planning multi-million dollar developments.

Cr Sayers says an independent commissioner could be appointed to fix the internal processes.

But adds that such an extreme intervention would have to be initiated by the Government.

"Our processes could be benchmarked against other councils, otherwise, staff will continue to leave and customer dissatisfaction will continue to prevail."

He says this isn't just a Rodney problem, but is happening across the whole of Auckland.

"Many people say that Auckland's processes are too pedantic compared to other councils.

"I would like to see the planners empowered to work in a more streamlined system, along with more direct accountability to the customer.

"Compounding the problem is experienced staff are leaving for lucrative government salaries with Kainga Ora (Housing New Zealand), but the internal council processes have not adapted to cope. Inexperienced staff are left under enormous pressure.

"At the same time, resource applications are skyrocketing due to housing demand. Also Government legislative changes, which require a response from Council staff, are draining the diminished staff resources."



From Chip Packet to **Emergency Blanket**

The contents of a potato chip packet are consumed in a matter of minutes, yet it takes upwards of eight decades for them to break down in landfills. And with every New Zealander contributing an average of 60 kilograms of plastic to our 327 landfill sites every year, it is evident that we need to be doing more to reduce the amount of waste we produce.



The beginnings of an emergency blanket from chip packets

The Chip Packet Project (CPPNZ) was founded in New Zealand in late 2021 and turns empty chip packets - and other foil packaging – into emergency blankets for those who need them. Creating these blankets is relatively simple: the chip packets are washed and cut open to form a single foil sheet. Then, using the heat from a household iron, they are fused together to form one large panel. Often, they are ironed onto a plastic lining to provide further reinforcement. Small holes are created in the sheet to prevent the accumulation of condensation. The blankets typically take the shape of a sleeping bag and mimic the qualities of a standard emergency blanket, reducing heat loss by reflecting the body's generated heat back to the wearer because of their foil lining. Because of plastic's durability, these emergency blankets are resistant to weather and are long-lasting.

Ms Kapa, the Business and Innovation teacher at Kaipara College, and her Year 11 whanau class are involved in this project. They are currently in the process of collecting chip packets from our students, teachers, and parents and are establishing a system of producing these emergency blankets at school. Their vision is to be able to create and provide these blankets to members of our community who would benefit from them, either directly or through local organisations such as food banks. This project provides an interactive and inexpensive way for students to help our community while simultaneously recycling materials that would otherwise contribute to landfills: a win-win situation, as Ms Kapa described.

CPPNZ currently has 16 collection points across the country where clean foil packaging can be delivered to and recycled into emergency blankets; either for those living on the streets in New Zealand or for those who cannot avoid warm living conditions.

Our closest drop-off point is currently on the North Shore, though additional locations are added regularly as the organisation expands.

This result is also a testament to the commitment, expertise and tireless support from our staff. Congratulations also to all our hardworking students who do not receive these accolades but quietly go about achieving their own personal level of improvement and success.

This year we remain positive in a difficult climate and focus on our core business of teaching and learning and having some fun along the way, staying safe, helping each other and supporting our students to be the best they can be.
