We want to make a big shout out to the staff at Helensville Museum for being welcoming and accommodating of the Art Centre at this time.


Combined exhibition at Kumeu Arts



From the Kaipara College Principal's Desk:

Looking back to last February's column I reflect on how much things have changed in a year. This time last year we were working our way through the onslaught of Omicron in New Zealand, back to isolating, physical distancing and the wearing of masks. Thankfully not so this year. Although these physical restrictions are no longer constraints, across the globe the impact on students and their learning is still with us and will be for some time to come.

Sculpture Gardens Guided Walk Wednesday 22nd February 0930 to 1130

David will chat about the origins and establishment of the gardens, the history of the property plus conservation measures we have in place as well as answer any questions you may have.

Kaipara Coast Sculpture Gardens and its associated nature trail is located within some of the most stunning countryside in Auckland.



There are approximately

40 works of art along the 1km sculpture pathway, which are changed each November. The 2.5km nature trail meanders through long established as well as newly planted areas of native flora and with a real focus on regeneration and sustaining the ecological diversity and integrity of the area. There are also some amazing rural and harbour views.



The gardens were established in 1994 by the local Bayly family who still own and run it and are now a 4 star NZ Gardens trust nominee.

There are also games areas and many ideal locations to sit and enjoy

a picnic as well as our cute little coffee shop in which to relax once you have completed the walk.

Please ensure that you wear suitable walking footwear and bring a drink (plus a rain jacket if the weather looks unsettled).

The walk will take approx. 2 hours and will be around 5km in length.

Road Repair Recklessness

There's a fine line between an excuse and a reason. Whose fault is X? When did Y begin?

When it comes to the state of our rural roads, your vehicle doesn't understand the difference. Put more precisely: your wheels don't know and your axle doesn't care.

I'm much more interested in talking to someone (anyone!) who can help change the situation. But, in order to do that, it's important to highlight the issue so that we're all starting on common ground about what's needed.

At least half the calls and emails received by my electorate office in the opening weeks of January (and most of the social media interactions!) have been about the state of road in north and northwest Auckland. Naturally I respond by making this my priority in terms of lobbying for change.

I've written a letter setting out the situation and appealing for assistance. That's gone to everyone in the central government world of transport policy from the Minister down. And in the local government space I've included various key figures, with elected representatives and Auckland Transport among them.

The priority going forward should be an effective, timely management maintain and repair the roads, culverts, potholes and ruts. In other words, we need a maintenance programme that works. Instead of pouring money into the cracks like so much "hot mix" that lasts just days or weeks, we need to invest properly.

We also need to move past the culture of excuse-making that points to the fact that it rains lots in Auckland (no kidding), that more funding would be helpful (wouldn't it always), there are still issues related to covid19 (seriously?) and the prioritisation of other projects (now we're getting warm: think that infamous bike bridge proposed for the Harbour Bridge).

The big debate in relation to central and local government shouldn't be in the nitty gritty of funding percentages. We must be honest about what we expect council agencies to do: get the basics right and leave the fluffy stuff well alone.

I'm pleased that National remains firmly of the view that the Local Government Act should be amended back to mandating councils to do the basics. The expansionist aims of the current government need to be reversed, so that ratepayer revenue can be spent where it counts. Like on the roads.

CAB Helensville manager Rani Timoti says it has been a busy start to the year with client enquiries so far including help with a CV and digital literacy support; dealing with neighbours; relationship and marital issues; business and financial struggles; immigration matters and complaints about banks, companies and organisations.

"It's wonderful to have our volunteers listen, support and help clients professionally with such a wide range of issues. Our face-to-face, online and phone enquiries have all been quickly actioned after our holiday break and we expect some traditional patterns, including the after-effects of Covid cautiousness, to reveal themselves in the next few months."

Our strong relationship with our JPs, who are often also CAB interviewers, has seen an influx of clients being looked after with their specific needs.

"So don't feel like you're the only one going through something- we may have the torch for the light at the end of the tunnel," Rani says.


groups, the all-powerful pharmaceutical industry is helping to widen the very definitions of disease, in order to expand markets for its drugs.

Government has broken the contract with our community

A few weeks ago, I asked a friend who lives near South Head what were her major concerns going into 2023? Her response was all about transport, roads, and infrastructure, with possibly a few swear words for emphasis.

She mentioned the state of the local roads in rural areas. The traffic queues at Kumeu "while Westgate and Kumeu are being developed with zero supporting infrastructure" for existing growth.

And, she told me, "They won't even chuck a train on because electric trains can't go through the tunnel, despite the fact they could use a diesel connection."

Auckland Transport and Waka Kotahi received similar feedback from the community in various rounds of consultation in 2020, 2021 and in June 2022. The local and central government alliance - Supporting Growth - reported in August 2022 on key themes arising from that most recent consultation in their 'Feedback Summary North West'.

When it comes to extending rail services to the North West, it says - "We heard in several pieces of feedback that people want passenger rail in the North West. We heard lots of good suggestions from people around station locations, train frequency, and run times."

On traffic congestion and travel time – "Many people emphasised to us the community's experience with traffic congestion and travel times. They would like to see construction brought forward."

And, on project timeframes - "We heard your concern over how far away construction of the project is, and that you would like a solution sooner rather than later."

Based on my friend's response, I can only imagine how many swear words had to be removed from the final consultation report.

On my recent visit to South Kaipara the unsealed roads look like riverbeds after only a brief rain shower. State Highway 16 has the same dangerous corners I remember from when I used to commute to work in the 1900s and 2000s.

The traffic congestion is however much worse because tens of thousands of people have moved to North West Auckland when it was opened up for subdivision and development over 20 years ago.

And, despite the North Auckland rail line running through Kumeu, Huapai and Helensville there is no passenger train service beyond Swanson. That is why I believe that Government has broken the contract with the North West community.

Local government collected development contributions when new subdivisions went in, and property taxes from land owners. These charges are meant to fund infrastructure and provide basic services like roads and public transport.

Central government collects petrol taxes, road user charges and takes money from general taxation to fund infrastructure. So why has the North West missed out?

When the local National MP was the Prime Minister, nothing was done to prepare for growth that was already occurring in our community. Under the last five years of a Labour government, they have shied away from investment in road capacity and public transport for the North West.

Their priorities area now-cancelled bike bridge, and an Auckland light rail project which will gobble hundreds of millions of taxpayer dollars before it too will no doubt be cancelled.

Endless rounds of consultation confirm we already know what infrastructure is needed for our community to thrive. We simply want the agencies responsible to get on with building and stop giving us the run around.

We are all familiar with the cycle of politicians announcing projects which they run out of money to deliver, or projects which are simply cancelled following a change of Government.

Under a government involving ACT, local needs like building roads for tens of thousands of new residents would become the priority for government agencies, not bike bridges and light rail fantasies.

This Government might be allergic to building infrastructure where it is needed, but ACT is not.
