ANZAC Day 2023

This year the Kaipara Memorial RSA will be holding a Dawn Parade at the Parakai Cenotaph, Veterans and Service organisations to fall-in 0550 hours outside the Parakai Springs, 150 Parkhurst Road. Parade Commander Peter Mills will march you to the Cenotaph for an ANZAC service starting at 0600 hours. All other attendees can gather in the carpark in front of the Cenotaph.

This service will be followed by a wreath laying Ceremony at the Helensville Service Cemetery at 0700 hours. An Anzac breakfast will be held at the Helensville Bowling Club at 0730.

Kaipara Memorial RSA President Rex Keane says that due to the closure of the Helensville War Memorial Hall and the RSA clubrooms, there will be no Helensville street parade or service this year. Rex also stresses that Medals should be worn, if wearing your relative's medals, wear them on your right side and wear them with pride.

There will be an opportunity for any Service or Civic organisations to lay a wreath at the Dawn Parade.

If wanting to lay a wreath at the Dawn Parade you need to register by emailing kaipararsa@xtra.co.nz, one week prior to ANZAC Day.

This year in addition to the white crosses with a Poppy being place on every Veterans plaque in the Helensville Service Cemetery, the Kaipara Memorial RSA with the help of the Remembrance Army will be placing wooden crosses, with a Poppy on all 22 of the Veterans graves scattered throughout the Helensville public cemetery, some dating back to the Boer War, most from World War One and others from World War Two and some Contemporary Veterans. Crosses will be erected the weekend before ANZAC Day and the RSA asks the Helensville community to visit the gravesites in the public area and the Service Cemetery and pay your respects to Veterans who fought for our freedom. The KMRSA will be laying a wreath at the Helensville Service Cemetery after the Dawn parade.

The Helensville Museum will be open from 1-3pm on ANZAC Day with a display of the Helensville RSA memorabilia.

On Tuesday, during our "whanau class" time, the PSSP team made their way into every class, sporting red balloons and little woven baskets full of chocolates. Many students, and a few teachers, received chocolate hearts from their partners, friends or even themselves - because a little self love is important too!! Small, personalised notes were given out with these chocolates as well. I can personally say that it is so special to watch the faces of my friends and classmates light up after receiving such a simple gift.

From the Kaipara College Principal's Desk:

Teenagers these days sometimes get a bad rap. I can assure you there are many, many great teenagers living,

learning and contributing in the Helensville Community. At Kaipara College we have a fabulous team of student leaders, who very ably lead their peers in many aspects of school life and who serve as great role models both within and outside the school. The impact of the positive work of our great team of student leaders is beginning to be felt in and beyond the school. Some student leaders (the head and deputy head students) accompanied me to talk to the Helensville branch of U3A (University for the 3rd Age). The branch wanted to learn about the school and what young people were like these days. I felt very proud of the exemplary behaviour of the student leaders and even more so of the way they shared their hopes, aspirations, interests, and sources of inspiration with the audience. They were also able to answer questions with intelligence, flair and empathy. The U3A members felt our young people were kind and thoughtful and they had renewed their faith in a hopeful future for New Zealand.

The team of student leaders are working on a number of initiatives at school. They successfully raised money through a non-uniform day which is being split up and donated to each of our cyclone affected Muriwai families.

They also lead their own student assemblies where they address issues of interest that are relevant to our students and also issues of national and global importance. Other initiatives our student leaders have been working on include discussing how they can take action to help our students feel safe at school and working on getting our Student Council up and running in Term 2, to afford other students leadership opportunities in the school. Our peer support programme continues with our Year 13 Peer Support Leaders working with our Year 9 students. The leaders have attended a two day training camp and work with the Year 9 students on a weekly basis leading wh.naungatanga activities, helping students starting at the College to build self-confidence and resilience, and developing their own leadership qualities in the process.

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Dear all



My office has been in touch with the Supporting Growth team since August 2022 seeking information and assurances that the flooding risk for the area has been adequately planned for and addressed.

I remain deeply concerned on behalf of the local community about the potential impact further development will have on flood prone land, homes and commercial properties in the area. I am therefore seeking an urgent hold on all plans for growth and development until the flooding issue has been meaningfully acknowledged and adequately addressed by the Council.

Background

I am not sure if you are aware, but a number of properties in Kumeu and Huapai have flooded several times in the last 18 months. One home that I am aware of was repaired following the August 2021 floods (at a cost of \$179,000), only to now be "red stickered" following flooding in January this year. Its owners are in limbo for the foreseeable future. My constituents are completely exhausted and traumatised from these events.

Email 9 March 2023

My office received an email from Supporting Growth on 9 March 2023, in response to requests for formal analysis/reports from a hydraulic engineer (or similar) regarding the impact various proposals and plans from Supporting Growth would have on the flood plain/prone areas of north west Auckland.

Below are the key points from that email that I consider need addressing:

1. Quote from email:

"It is unlikely that newer developments in Kumeu have contributed materially to recent flood events. This is due to the large upstream catchment for the Kumeu waterways, located to the south of urban Kumeu. The catchment covers largely rural areas and these are the main source of the floodwater."

The statement above appears to disregard, or at the very least minimise, the fact that significant flooding has occurred in the industrial and urban areas of Kumeu and north of Kumeu (Huapai).

There has been significant development on, and adjacent to, known floodplains in the Kumeu-Huapai area in the last decade. The new developments have been built on raised platforms to avoid flooding for themselves. However, the homes and commercial properties that sit adjacent to these developments, and were built decades ago, have experienced significant flooding at a never-before-seen intensity and frequency (four times in the last 18 months, with three of those times in the space of a month).

Flood damaged property owners who are adjacent to developments on raised platforms would argue that the newer developments have contributed materially to their situation.

What evidence is available to support the claim that newer developments (e.g. Huapai North) are unlikely to have contributed materially to the recent flooding in neighbouring Rheingold Place/Pinotage Place for example?

- 2. There are a number of statements contained in the email which indicate any future development will appropriately manage stormwater effects to avoid flooding on adjacent land. Similar statements were made in the District Plans for various developments in Kumeu/Huapai (e.g. Huapai North and Kumeu Central). Yet, the experience for constituents over the last 18 months has been that the stormwater has not been effectively managed. The river, waterways and stormwater infrastructure in its current state clearly cannot cope with the volume of stormwater run-off in periods of heavy rain in the region. This is obvious from the flooding of homes and commercial properties three or four times in the last 18 months.
- 3. Auckland Council District Plan (Rodney Section) 2011 Chapter 5 Natural Hazards 5.4.1 Policies (attached) states: "In areas prone to natural events caused by the weather, earth, water, or sea ... sensitive activities should, where possible, be avoided. New subdivision, use and development should be located and designed so that the need for hazard protection works is avoided. Where this is not possible, activities should ensure that any risk of loss of life or injury or environmental damage is minimised through appropriate mitigation measures [...] Wherever possible the approach to the management of natural hazards should be to avoid development and subdivision in hazard prone areas, such as floodplains [...] Recently, technical work has highlighted the complex interplay of coastal geometry, bathymetry, tidal effects and climate change and other physical phenomena which requires Councils to take a cautious and prudent approach to new development and mitigation of existing risk." [Emphasis added]

Despite this policy, developments have continued to be built on, and adjacent to, floodplains and flood prone areas with devastating effects on neighbouring land, and with little/no attempt to mitigate the effects of increased stormwater run-off. For example, the Kumeu Town Centre Zone was constructed on the basis/expectation that the floodway project would be completed:

"The section of Kumeu River at Kumeu is prone to flooding and implemented mitigation works (Stages 1 and 2 of the Kumeu River floodway) together with the Council's proposed works to complete the floodway (Stages 3 and 4 of the floodway project) will combine to reduce the impact of flooding over time [...] Following completion of the initial floodway works, much of the Special 34 Zone falls within the 100 year ARI flood plain. This is an interim state pending completion by the Council of the



final two stages of the floodway works, and residential development within the flood plain will be considered on a case by case basis prior to completion of those works." [Auckland Council District Plan (Rodney Section) 2011 Special 34 (Kumeu Town Centre) Zone: Chapter 12.8.34.1.1.4 – attached]

The floodway was not completed but development was permitted to continue.

In addition, it is known and documented (in the Kaipara-Kumeu Catchment Management Plan – Hydraulic Modelling – Chapter 5.5) that the floodway project would adversely impact on residential properties in Pinotage Place/Rheingold Place and therefore certain measures would need to be taken in order to protect them from flooding (in particular, the embankment would need to be raised and vegetation would need to be controlled and maintained). Despite this, part of the floodway project was completed without any of the additional measures taken to protect those properties in Pinotage Place/Rheingold Place, and they are now paying a huge price for that omission (financially, emotionally and physically).

Concerns

Naturally, in light of the above points, the local community have no faith that the flood modelling being relied upon is accurate, or that stormwater management plans will be effective (or will even been implemented - given their experience with the floodway project).

Despite warnings for decades about climate change and the land being a floodplain/flood prone, development has continued apace. At the same time, the Kumeu floodway project has stalled; the river, drains and culverts have not been cleared out or maintained to handle the extra volume of stormwater; the embankment has not been raised to protect Rheingold Place and Pinotage Place. This is all despite the Council knowing that these areas were at increased risk of flooding.

It is not good enough for a lack of available funding to be cited as a reason not to complete the floodway and maintain the waterways (and so on) yet still go ahead and permit developments, reckless as to whether they will further exacerbate the flooding risk to the local properties and roads.

It is unconscionable to proceed on this basis. New development plans must halt to prevent still further damage to property or, even worse, the loss of life. The entire strategic plan for the area (to the extent that there is such a thing) needs a major rethink, not based on models alone but on what has actually been happening on the ground over the last 18 months.

Meeting request

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Cyclone recovery.

There are many reasons that people get involved in politics. One is the chance to advocate on behalf of a local area, as I've been fortunate enough to do for the Helensville and then "Kaipara ki Mahurangi" electorates these past 6 years.

Another is the chance to influence policy at a national level. Mostly this happens in Wellington through a series of select committee hearings, speeches in Parliament and discussions in caucus rooms. The government of the day has earned the right to put its policies into law, which is currently the other side of the aisle from where I sit.

Every now and again the planets of local advocacy and national level policy align.

I've recently been given such an opportunity with appointment as the National Party spokesperson for Cyclone Recovery.

The government response to flooding and other storm-related damage in areas like Helensville will be crucial to the long-term prospects of this area. When I say "government", of course I mean local government as well as central government. It probably goes without saying that liaising with other key players – such as insurers and banks – will be vital too.

My advocacy for northwest Auckland and my other areas will focus on getting a fair deal for those affected by recent extreme weather events, along with decision making for the future that avoids similar pain.

The key challenge for those affected by the extreme weather will be compensation for loss, where this isn't available via private insurance. Part of the issue is that policy terms usually don't compensate where there hasn't been property damage but the property as a whole isn't usable. That's the situation facing my constituents in areas like Muriwai and frequently flooded areas.

The rural lens will be important as well. Farmers in the Kaipara Hills area and elsewhere have been telling me about huge additional costs incurred where stock feed has been needed to replace grazing land. And then you have the EQC focus on land damage within a certain short distance from a dwelling, ignoring the rural reality that land owned by the farmer away from the house is just as valuable as that nearby.

We have our work cut out for us. We can only hope to succeed by facing these challenges together, staying in touch about what's needed and speaking clearly and loudly with one voice.

Let's make sure the North-West and surrounding areas are heard.

The response to the storms and flood events.

The slow motion response to the storms and flood events which wrecked homes and lives in January and February revealed the worst aspects of government. People understand they might need enough water and food for three or more days. What becomes harder to understand is how slow and incremental the government is with its response.

I visited homes damaged by flooding in West Auckland. Wall linings, kitchens and bathrooms have been removed, and the owners are ready for builders to start repairs. Yet no repairs can start until insurers decide whether they will insure again and at what cost. Councils need to decide whether to invest in hard infrastructure, and/or the blue-green infrastructure needed to hold water during future flood events.

Neither councils nor insurers are prepared to give the go ahead until the Government decides what it will do in response to the floods and storms.

Labours first attempt at emergency legislation on 14 March was almost six weeks after floods hit Auckland, and a month to the day from when a state of emergency was declared in response to Cyclone Gabrielle.

The Severe Weather Emergency Legislation included some sensible stuff, like allowing councils to meet over Zoom, and providing an extension of time for food businesses which need regular inspections in order to maintain their food safety licenses.

There was even a slight relaxation of the RMA rules, which mean that anyone doing emergency work can apply for consents that would normally be needed, between 2 and 6 months after work starts.

With one caveat of course – if there is a culturally significant site either on the land, or simply nearby. The new laws require a landowner or council to give 20 days' notice to what could be a large number of Mâori groups with an interest, and obtain written permission from all, before any work may start.

It is fair to assume that permission would be freely given. However instead of making this a simple requirement to consult, identify any wahi tapu or sacred sites to steer clear of, then get on with the job, Labour created a new opportunity for division.

The emergency laws also try to fix a problem caused by the 2022 Three Waters legislation. The Water Services Entities Act limited councils to only routine maintenance on their water networks. Floods and storms caused severe damage to three waters assets, which now need to be repaired and replaced. Some will need significant upgrades to withstand future storms.

Labour's less-than-urgent emergency laws amend the Three Waters legislation to permit councils to fix their broken water pipes, treatment plants and drinking water supplies.

However, any budget for repair or upgrade will need to be approved by the accountants at the Three Waters Transition Unit in Wellington, and only once approval is given can councils procure designers and contractors to do the work. That is likely to take months or longer.

This could be the plot of a black comedy about useless governments, but it is not at all funny to people without drinking

water and forced to use a portaloo for weeks and months.

ACT MPs are practical people who want to help the communities we represent. Before the rain had stopped, we were on the phone to people affected by flooding, to council staff and insurers, asking what could and should Government do?

On Friday 3rd of March ACT released our response to Cyclone Gabrielle - 15 urgent Ideas for recovery. These can apply equally to communities hit by Cyclone Hail and the severe weather on Auckland Anniversary weekend.

ACT believes that as a first principle, the Labour Government should reprioritise existing spending cutting unhealthy obsessions like Light Rail and the transport "mode shift" and put that money into rebuilding roads and bridges.

The second principle is for Government to get out of the way. The Christchurch rebuild and the COVID-19 recovery led to a permanent expansion of the big Wellington machine. The recovery from recent floods and storms should not be used as a further excuse to expand the size and reach of Government.

Instead of tinkering with the RMA, ACT asks that Government remove RMA requirements altogether so communities can get on with the rebuild, like after the Kaikoura earthquake. Clearing slips and vegetation, reforming streams and channels, and building much greater capacity into the stormwater system needs good design and agile contractors, not Wellington accountants holding the pen and a whip.

ACT offered our 15 ideas to Labour, but they were ignored. We will offer them again when Parliament resumes in late March to debate the next round of recovery legislation.

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












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
