

John Perry, a work of art?

John Perry was a regular customer of Copy & Print in Helensville. He was always very particular in his instructions to us, knowing exactly what he wanted the copies, typing or printing to look like. He had a quaint habit of always carrying small change with him in a small container to pay for his purchases. A quiet unassuming man, living in the old movie theatre at the bottom of town, along with what has recently been shown to be a veritable treasure trove of artworks.

I, for one, never knew how respected he was in the artworld, but behind the boarded up windows and doors of his 'home' he was hiding some 10,000 or more pieces of art, many of which have now been shown to be, both valuable as artworks, as well as being worth significant sums of money. Below is an article from the Rotorua Daily Post of February 10 this year which provides more insight into the man I never really knew. *Brian Hale*.

The first auction of former Rotorua Museum art director John Perry's art collection has been a roaring success - a white glove sale, meaning every piece on the lot sold.

Perry, known for his great artistic mind, spent 20 years curating and directing the museum.

He died in June 2021, aged 77. Since Perry's death, Webb's auction house has been working with his family to sort through thousands of lots, which will go to auction over the next few years.

The first auction took place on February 2 with many pieces selling well past their high estimates, including a series of paintings by New Zealand artist Dick Lyne.

His 1955 work, Mt. Ngauru, which depicts an exploding volcano, reached a price of \$8750, far exceeding its pre-auction high estimate of \$2500. Another painting, Newtown by Selwyn Muru, also attracted fierce bidding. It reached \$11,704 - crushing its high estimate of \$4000.

The sale included many Oceanic art forms and handcrafted pieces which were also met with strong buyer interest. A large model waka by Alex Coates sold for \$7315 against a high estimate of \$2000.

Webb's Director of Decorative Arts, Ben Erren, said it was an amazing night.

"I'm sure John would have been chuffed to see his collection achieve a white glove auction.

"Some of the items that achieved really strong prices were by artists and craftspeople that John picked up on before anyone else in the collecting world did. These results are a testament to his sharp eye and strong sense of quality.

"John was an incredible individual and a big influence on many. It's great to celebrate his legacy like this," Erren said.

Erren said Perry was always "a fountain of knowledge about everything". "He was really informative and helped me early on in my career in terms of always offering knowledge and always



encouraging robust debate around anything in terms of taonga or repatriation or the origin of certain objects.

"And the conversation was never finished. He just wanted to talk and it was never condescending. It was educational."

Erren said Webb's was "privileged" to hold Perry's memorial service, with more than 600 people attending.

"He was incredibly well-respected."

Proceeds from the auctions will go to Perry's family. Auctions will then occur fortnightly for the next three to five years.



A Stormy Start to the Year

Approximately 4 years ago, just over 200 little, round-faced 12 and 13 year olds began their high schooling journey at Kaipara College. Some, like me, were shy and scared to talk to new people, others were busy establishing their status as the "class clown," and most were simply eager to begin the next stage in their lives. Now that those very same kids are the seniors of the school - the year 13s - many of us have elected to take part in the Peer Support Programme. The Peer Support Programme is one which has been established all over New Zealand, and focuses on creating a safe, comfortable and fun environment for new students transitioning from primary or intermediate school to high school.

On January the 26th and 27th, almost 30 year 13 students travelled up to Higham Beach in South Head to take part in Peer Support training. This involved us participating in a series of team building activities, talking about what leadership means to us, and having a discussion with our principal, Ms Sullivan. Of course, there was also plenty of time for simply having fun together and eating large amounts of burgers and hot dogs.

Unlike the peer support groups of the past few years, the 2023 Peer Support Leaders had an added element of group bonding and team building. This came in the shape of a storm. The one which unfortunately left much of our local area flooded toward the end of January. So on top of activities such as "crocodile river," where we had to move our teams from one side of the "river" to the other with just a few small platforms; or "human knots," which involved all of us forming a circle, joining hands with someone opposite us and then without letting go untangling the circle, we also worked together to repair tents, provide alternate sleeping arrangements for some, and then mop up and ring out all the water in the morning which managed to creep its way into our tents overnight.

So, after a very strong team of Peer Support Leaders formed, we returned to an already disrupted school year on February 7th, and it has very quickly become evident how important this leadership role is for these year 9s who have already had a 'stormy' beginning to their high school journey. We spent two days with these new students, encouraging them to work together and get to know their peers and teachers before transitioning into a more regimented class schedule. From here, us Peer Support leaders spend one class a week working with our designated group of students. We build a close relationship with these students and endeavour to become both a friend and mentor to them for the rest of the year.

Kaipara korero

From the Kaipara College Principal's Desk:

Since the last issue we have had two serious weather events hit us! Both these events have impacted on different parts of our community in different ways. No one however has escaped the impact entirely. Our thoughts and best wishes are with those members of our community who have been hardest hit by the carnage wreaked by Cyclone Gabrielle. Some families have lost homes, others incurred wind and water damage to property, pets and livestock, had prolonged power and water outages, severe flooding, or become isolated with no access and suffered loss of communication.

The wonderful neighbours that make up our Kaipara College community have rallied around, with support for those affected coming from family, friends, neighbours and community groups. Such is the support and connection felt across this community, especially in times of crisis.

Students have returned to school having experienced wideranging impacts. Some have lost everything, others have seen the worst effects only on television and social media. Traumatic events such as we have endured over the last month will affect students differently. Some return to school happy to see their friends and easily go back to school routines, others are nervous and anxious, hyper-alert wondering what will happen next, while still others will be withdrawn and quiet. Some will seem fine only to suffer the effects of trauma much later.

Kaipara College welcomed our students back with open arms after four days of closure. Reconnecting with peers, friends and teachers, rebuilding relationships and a return to routine and familiarity helped students regain a sense of security and safety. Many students were keen and ready to get straight back into learning and our staff were on-hand to provide support where it is needed, checking in with individual students. Schools play a major and often unrecognised and unacknowledged role in helping students process traumatic events, in this case two wild weather experiences, helping them to settle them back into a space where they can learn.

Kaipara College is also aware of the need to look forward, to be hopeful and positive for the future. We provide students with opportunities to problem solve, help others and plan for a positive future by asking them questions such as: What can be learned from these recent events? What have we learnt about ourselves? Our community? How can we manage events such as these or similar, better in the future? This kind of exercise enables us to channel anxiety and stress into empowerment by encouraging conversations around what can be done to help in the situation and what is already happening. We can explore how our students coped with challenging situations or helped others in the past, to draw out and focus on their strengths.

Kaipara College, in times of crisis has shown itself to be a place of stability for our young people, order amongst the chaos, routine, structure, safety, care, support, fun, friends as well as learning!

We are all looking forward to a positive, fun and learning-filled year!

Looming funding cuts won't spell doom and gloom for Citizens Advice Bureau Helensville.

Clients are still being looked after and cared for whether at its office at 16 Commercial Rd, online or by phone.

A petition is proving there's ample public support for the popular community organisation with more than 4000 people signing so far.

Auckland Council's proposed funding cuts or removal from CABs in Auckland in its budget for 2023/24 could spell the end of its helping hand after serving Tamaki Makaurau for over 50 years.

"The real question is what will happen if CAB's don't exist?" says manager Rani Timoti.

"Will staff on councils and agencies in central government have or take the time to listen non-judgementally to stressed out and overwhelmed people? Fill out forms if people don't know how to do so? Patiently go through the details and provide options for their clients?"

Encouraged by the public positive outcry so far for Auckland's 32 CABs, Rani says their "amazing army" of volunteers help anyone with everyday stuff to more complex issues, mainly speak for the vulnerable, disadvantaged or those who have to understand or access information they haven't come across yet.

A vast array of local issues like neighbourhood problems are part of CAB Helensville's service, which would normally be dealt with by council.

"Sometimes people don't know about us because they don't need us. But one day they may and we hope to give them the information and reassurance they need."

That day came for many first-time users with the weather bombs which rocked Auckland.

Volunteers helped them with issues like using CAB phones or the Internet as they had no power, accessing fresh water and wanting to know how to donate. Some clients were referred from council or anxious about approaching council and government agencies for support.

And support is one of CAB's strong points, reflected in its Maori translation of its name as pou and its Maori Manaia as the kaupapa (set of principles) for commitment to Maori.

Meanwhile, the organisation hosts its national awareness week from March 20 to 26 supporting diverse communities and celebrating multiculturalism within the CAB whanau.

The continual theme of helping clients in languages other than English, limited literacy, numeracy and digital literacy issues and a range of communities is the purpose of this week.

*Auckland CABs help people with information and advice and connect them with the support they need. Last year our dedicated volunteers in Auckland CABs helped more than 160,000 people. There are nearly 1,000 volunteers in Auckland, operating out of 32 CABs from Wellsford to Papakura.

What an extraordinary start to 2023.

With flooding events and Cyclone Gabrielle disrupting life hugely, I'm in awe of so many of you coming together to help others during a time of real need.

There are too many to name here individually but you know who you are. And so do we. As always, we think particularly of those who place themselves in physical danger in service of the community. It's appropriate to make special heartfelt acknowledgement of the loss of life suffered by the volunteers of Muriwai fire station.

As northwest Auckland attempts to move itself into a mediumterm recovery stage, serious answers are needed here (and plenty of other parts of the North Island, to be fair). I've recently written to the Mayorhighlighting the history of this area: a lack of planning frameworks, ad hoc development enabled by that shortcoming and a lack of supporting infrastructure.

It's abundantly clear that, in addition to the lack of investment in pipes (to go with shortcomings in transport, comms networks and school capacity), there is another major problem.

Those who have been around much longer than me recall that stormwater infrastructure was regularly maintained, once upon a time. I'm told that the guy whose sole job was to go around clearing drains and culverts was known to all and sundry by name.

By contrast, local government seems now to concern itself with far too many things that are "nice to have" at best. At the risk of striking an unwelcome political note, it's the sad reality that some in central government favour a much broader remit for councils than I'm personally comfortable with. It's a mistake to enable local government to get in the business of duplicating social services provided more efficiently in the community (or inefficiently by central government!). Meeting tangible needs such as drain clearance may not be glamorous but it's utterly vital.

Expansion of the purpose section of the Local Government Act a few years ago feels like a significant misstep, in this context.

Let's hope for a much better year than most readers of this fine publication have experienced so far. If we're to seek a silver lining in some very dark clouds, it must be the needs of this area finally being taken seriously. That will mean asking the hard questions and – more importantly – demanding the right answers. There's too much at stake not to do that.

How did Te Awaroa Helensville Museum fare?

While the effects of the January floods were devastating for many, in good news Te Awaroa Helensville Museum came through them unscathed, despite the buildings being sited on a flood plain on a former rubbish dump beside the Kaipara River.

Vice President Leigh Bosch explained she and other museum volunteers made fixing water issues a priority when working to restore the precious buildings, archives and artefacts after the discovery in 2019 that the collection was endangered by borer and other pests, and the heritage buildings were in urgent need of repair.

"When we started, as well as tell-tale puddles of water there was a pervasive smell of mould and you couldn't see where it was coming from, "said Leigh. Thanks to roofs, ceilings, walls, floors, windows, spaces underneath floors and drainage being checked and water-proofed in the restoration, the museum and its collection now have a much better chance when severe weather events like the January storms hit.

In just one example, one taonga in the collection that is safe and dry is a beautiful embroidered velvet cushion made by Janet Drinnan, who brought it with her when she and her husband William immigrated to Aotearoa in 1860. As a hotel, shop and landowner Janet became one of Kaukapakapa's leading lights. Known as "the Mother of Kaukapakapa", she has many descendants in the wider district. The cushion was unearthed recently by textile specialist Jo Dixey, who is working with fellow specialist Katriona Main to restore and re-catalogue the museum's textiles after they have been through the pest extermination process.








Ceramics Course

Adversity and disaster brings out the best in neighbours and strangers.

The storm and flood events which smashed the North Island in January and February reveal the best aspects of Kiwi character. People opening their homes to strangers in the dead of night, giving shelter to those who had lost everything in a terrifying torrent

In West Auckland, the hardy folks in Piha and Karekare helped each other recover treasured possessions and pump out the mucky water from homes fortunate enough to be salvageable

The talk has now turned to what we should do in response to natural hazards like floods and slips, and man-made hazards like inadequate infrastructure. That's because some of the places people assumed were safe to live turned out not to be.

Now this Government in a crisis response is again talking about passing laws to fix long-term problems - laws that are likely to make it harder to rebuild and recover. Central government passed laws setting up a special agency to plan the Christchurch rebuild after the February 2011 earthquake. As a result, much of central Christchurch remained a parking lot for the last twelve years. Businesses and home owners who could, moved on long ago to new suburbs, or out of town.

At Piha on a decent summer's day, around 15,000 visitors from the Auckland region brave the hot black sand to get to the surf, walk to the Piha waterfall, visit the bowler or the RSA for lunch and a pint.

Visitors and 700 residents also brave the notorious Piha road, subject to many slips and washouts over the years. Loose rock on the road is an ever-present reminder of the risk from volcanic cliffs above. The road surface is often slick with rain and has odd geometry which can fool unsuspecting drivers, leading to serious crashes. That geometry and poor drainage reflects the original gravel road cut through the bush in the early 20th century, over a hundred years ago.

For weeks after the January and February storms this road is down to one lane, where it is even safe to traverse the multiple under slips. Children who would normally travel to West Auckland schools have missed weeks of education. For residents, getting to work and appointments has meant a long detour through Bethell's Road, itself badly affected by slips and washouts from the same storm.

Visitors are banned until the road is repaired, and as a result local businesses are missing out on peak season revenue.

In 2018 Auckland Transport proposed a major upgrade to the Piha included concrete drainage, pathways and retaining walls. Protected pôhutukawa trees would be cut back.

Most Aucklanders wouldn't think twice if AT offered your community an upgraded road, drainage and footpaths. They would be breaking out the cold ones and firing up the BBQs in celebration.

Local heritage activists vetoed the upgrade, claiming that "the proposal for Piha is so over-engineered and under thought-out", and, that AT ignored its own guidelines to "maintain the overall informal character of the road" for the heritage area. The RMA allows for heritage to be a deciding factor when it comes to consenting infrastructure.

The heritage types might be regretting that now. On Friday 28 January the road failed in places where the risk of slips was known. Drainage installed decades ago could not cope. Culverts washed out and water poured from the road, over cliffs, taking masses of rock ad soil through properties and threatening lives.

Last year the independent Infrastructure Commission stated that "Project design has become a consenting issue, with many firms often not choosing the optimal design for their project but choosing designs that will provide a 'path of least resistance' through the consenting process. Consenting costs are 10 times higher for projects that require a public hearing." The Piha Road is yet another example of how that path leads to a bad place.

In November 2022 we released ACT's solutions for building New Zealand and conserving nature - a much better alternative to the existing RMA, and to Labours proposed reforms, the Natural and Built Environments Bill.

ACT would change the focus under an EPA to how to deliver infrastructure, not whether a project should be able to obtain consents. ACT would not let heritage concerns trump the need to protect lives, property and maintain lifeline routes such as the Piha Road.
