

# Auckland Council introduces friendly fungus to combat invasive weed

It's the weed Auckland gardeners love to hate! Tradescantia, better known as "wandering willie".



Arguably the most notorious pest weed to have escaped into the wild, it causes considerable damage to the natural environment, spreading along streams by water

movement, infesting waterways and smothering native species.

Community groups working in the Roy Clements Treeway, Mt Albert and Oakley Creek, New Windsor local parks requested council support in battling the pest plant. Auckland Council is for the first time organising the release of a fungal pathogen biocontrol in an urban environment to help control the weed.

Auckland Council's Senior Regional Advisor Pest Plants, Holly Cox says the council is excited about the long-awaited release of this biocontrol agent.

"Tradescantia is very difficult to control and despite the best efforts of volunteers to manage the weed, they've been unable to make inroads.

"The yellow leaf spot fungus is an ideal control as it disperses itself with water movement and humid air movement spreading to other infestations both inside and outside the stream reserve," adds Holly.

The plants, infected with the yellow spot fungus (**Kordyana brasiliensis**), will be planted in the waterway and together with



the tradescantia leaf beetle already present, it is hoped the fungus will further reduce the impact on the ecosystem.

The fungal pathogen, native to Brazil, is host-specific meaning it only impacts tradescantia and is no risk to other species.

Tradescantia is identified as a pest plant in the Auckland Regional Pest Management Plan 2020-2030, and eradication is tackled under a whole of region sustained control programme which aims to reduce the spread and impact of the pest plant.

## Te Poari o Kaipatiki ki Kaipara -ANZAC 2023 celebration success

With ANZAC day 2023 completed Te Poari o Kaipatiki ki Kaipara want to acknowledge whanau, the military forces, and other district Returned Services Associations (RSA).

This year the alternative approach to hold the entire Kaipara Memorial Returned Serviceman Association's dawn service at Kaipatiki Reserve Cenotaph, due to the Helensville War Memorial closure for seismic strengthening was in support of the Kaipara Memorial RSA. Many thanks to Rex Keane, Steve Wilson, and the team at the Kaipara Memorial RSA.

Starting at 5.50 am over 500 people arrived on the brisk ANZAC morning to honour those that had gone offshore to battles over the years. As many as thirty wreaths were laid at the Cenotaph in remembrance, among them, the Maori Battalion, Kaukapakapa RSA, local organisations, and Te Poari o Kaipatiki ki Kaipara, with Te Poari wreath laid by Chair, Tamaki Mercer, and Deputy-Chair Guy Wishart.



The crowd then relocated to the RSA Service Cemetery in Helensville to lay further wreaths in honour of the fallen soldiers. The ANZAC morning concluded with a well-attended breakfast hosted by the Helensville Bowling Club.





## Murder on the Nile, performed by Kaipara College

This year's annual Kaipara College production is *Murder on the Nile*. This production will follow the story of Kay Ridgeway. Kay has lived a charmed life, blessed with beauty, enormous wealth and a new husband, she embarks on a honeymoon voyage down the Nile. Fatal circumstances await when the idyllic surroundings are shattered by a shocking and brutal murder. Under scrutiny is a multitude of memorable passengers, all with a motive to kill. The tension and claustrophobia builds on the vessel as a shocking and audacious conspiracy is laid bare. This production is based on the 1937 novel, and 1944 play by Agatha Christie. This narrative has recently become more popular following the 2022 film adaptation "Death on the Nile" which stars Kenneth Branagh.

Our production at Kaipara College is performed by 2 all-ages casts, with students ranging from years 9 to 13. There is no doubt that we have an insurmountable level of talent here at Kaipara College, especially when it comes to the arts. With this stage production incorporating drama, dance and music, as well as the amazing sound and lighting skills from many of our performing arts technology students, it is sure to be astounding. We see many of our senior students, some of whom have been in our productions for the last 3 or 4 years, bringing a more experienced element to the show. We also have many younger students who are taking their first steps into live performances.

Last year's annual production, *Dracula*, was nominated in 9 categories at the Auckland Showdown Awards, where drama teacher and production director, Stephen Lunt, deservingly walked away with the "Best Director" award.

As you can imagine, putting together an entire production is not a small feat. Set design, music, lighting, costume, dance lessons, and of course countless hours and days of rehearsals, all go into making this production everything it deserves to be. This year, we are incredibly grateful to our sponsor *ITM building* and to Louise Wilkie from studio 246 who donated her time teaching dance to our cast. The performance would not be possible without them.

Murder on the Nile will take place over 4 nights in June: Tuesday 20th, Wednesday 21st, Thursday 22nd, and Friday 23rd. All shows begin at 7pm and last the duration of 2.5 hours.

Because we have such a large number of passionate drama students, this year, we have 2 full casts. This means that the Tuesday and Thursday shows will be performed by the "Scarab" cast, and the Wednesday and Friday shows will be performed by the "Lotus" cast.

As we close in on the end of our financial

year we can look back and see how much has happened across our business area, and we sure have been busy. ## Sayers lays the ground work



In spite of the Auckland Council needing to make significant cuts to spending in order to plug a \$325 million budget deficit there is some good news looming for rural ratepayers.

In June the Auckland Council will vote to approve its new spending budgets. Included in the budget is a proposal to more than double the amount Auckland Transport is spending in maintaining unsealed roads.

In figures secured by Cr. Sayers the unsealed road maintenance program budget is set to increase from \$2.4 million to \$5.1 million per annum representing a 113% increase.

According to Sayers this would allow for the number of grading crews to be increased from three to five, which would mean more roads being graded more frequently.

More money would also be available to purchase greater quantities of metal to use on the roads, as well as to ensure culverts were properly maintained and cleared of blockages.

If approved in June the new budget would be effective from July 1, 2023.

"This is extremely good news for rural ratepayers who have been short changed for far too long," said Cr. Sayers.

"Even though this is a difficult financial time for Auckland Council I will continue to push for a fair share of spending back into Rodney."

"Although the maintenance budgets are set to increase, I remain concerned that the sealing budgets are not."

"The sealing budget is currently \$4 million a year, but the required level of funding to seal roads to cope with increased traffic growth is \$12 million a year."

Cr. Sayers says the gains made to the maintenance budget were due to the combined efforts of many ratepayers making helpful submissions to the Mayors proposed budget, the Rodney Local Board advocating for better rural roading, and Mayor Brown's leadership in recognising the poor state of Auckland's unsealed roads.

"By working collaboratively we have been able to achieve this substantial increase, when in many other areas of Council spending is being reduced," said Sayers.

"Road maintenance is a core Council function."

"Mayor Brown also wants to see a better standards in the way



the unsealed roads are physically worked on."

For the first time since the formation of the Super City the Mayor has given a statutory letter of expectation to the Board of Auckland Transport with specific wording mandating improvements to unsealed roads.

The wording of the directive says; "Ensure the road maintenance and renewal program is adequate and supports the whole region, including rural roads. This includes improvements to the rural road maintenance and sealing program, and targets to ensure prompt completion of simple road repairs".

Cr. Sayers says he had been working closely with Mayor Wayne Brown since the beginning of the year to achieve a fairer allocation of the general rates collected from rural ratepayers to be spent back for rural ratepayers.

### Do you know the Citizens Advice Bureau? Like really?

Hundreds of thousands of people around Aotearoa New Zealand know the Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB). They know it well, because they have been helped by this long-standing, respected organisation that provides core social infrastructure and improved access to justice in communities around the motu. They know they can come to the CAB, no matter their circumstances or question and they will be responded to with care and kindness by our diverse team of CAB volunteers. Volunteers who are trained and skilled in listening, unpacking issues, and empowering people with options for moving forward.

For those who maybe don't know us so well. Let us introduce you to our service and some of our amazing people.

#### The power and mana of the CAB service

Citizens Advice Bureau was started in New Zealand over 52 years ago by social workers, lawyers and activists who recognised that justice was not equally accessible to everyone. These people understood the importance of empowering communities with knowledge and understanding of their rights and responsibilities and that access to justice should not be restricted to society's

 elite. It could and should be made available to all people through a model of civic participation and service – the CAB service.

This passion for social justice and service to communities continues to motivate over 2,000 people who volunteer for CABs around the motu today. "Here at CAB Helensville we have 13 volunteers dedicated to serving our local community," says Rani Timoti, manager.

#### The diversity of our CAB people

Across our organisation we are diverse in gender, age, ethnicity, culture, religion, work experience, and even cardigan preferences.

"Our volunteers include many who wear different community hats in the South Kaipara area, often belonging to other groups and organisations representing their interests and areas of talent," says Rani. "We have a young mum wanting to give back to her community, a former social worker, a former nurse and others from the educational and business world. But they all have something in common- a heart for their people. Our volunteers, at different ages and stages of life, all bring empathy and aroha to their mahi."

#### Mana wahine

People tend to think of CAB volunteers as invariably being women. Some even refer to us as 'little old ladies in comfy cardigans'. It is true that there are plenty of women in our midst – the community and voluntary sector is brimming with amazing wahine. Some of these women are in their retirement years, but reducing them to 'little and old' diminishes their mana.

"For myself, volunteering for the CAB was an opportunity to grab when my circumstances changed. After nearly 30 years as a community newspaper journalist and writing many articles about this 'worthy community organisation', I decided to become a volunteer. Seven years later, I'm now the manager."

All of the women who contribute to their communities through the CAB are dedicated to their mahi and bring skills, expertise and empathy.

### Celebrating culture and language

## Fiscal discipline should guide us.

I hope that everyone is coping OK now that winter has truly come. Obviously it wasn't much of a summer, or even autumn for that matter, with all the heavy rain. Even on the occasions that this didn't cause catastrophic flooding, it seemed to have an unfortunate effect of making many of us (yes, myself included!) feel less "sunny" in disposition.

In terms of things we can control, it's been an interesting time to reflect on the need for good decision making in politics. Just going back briefly to the subject of storms and floods, it's been very obvious that the short-term sugar hit of spending on interesting "nice to have" projects should never have been allowed priority over stormwater infrastructure. Activities as mundane as clearing culverts are among the most important duties of government, whether local or central, and I really hope these lessons have been learned.

Thinking about short-termism has put me in mind of the recent Budget presented in Parliament. While there are lots of little things that will please certain sectors of society – for example, the online gaming industry being granted subsidies – the overall picture is important across generations. Increasing the nation's debt levels in the way we've seen in the past few years is risky at best.

The heightened possibility of a credit downgrade for New Zealand might sound like something that should concern only economists (and unusually dismal ones at that!). In reality, though, we'll all lose out if overseas lenders take a dim view of what's happening with book-keeping in the Beehive.

The rising interest rates many local households and businesses are getting whacked with, by their own banks, are a direct result of the Reserve Bank putting up the Official Cash Rate. And of course that in turn has been happening because too much money has been pumped into an economy that remains relatively unproductive, causing inflation.

It's sometimes not easy to sell "fiscal discipline" as a philosophy that should guide political decision making and therefore it's easy to criticise those who urge caution. Politicians aren't doing anyone any favours, however, if they pretend we can have it all.

And why does any of this matter? Astute readers already instinctively know the answer: if we don't worry about the pennies today then the pounds will not take care of themselves tomorrow, to use the old proverb. We must not let the young people of this area get saddled with disastrous levels of debt for the country to repay or constrain the choices they want to make.

That's my slightly bleak message this wintry month but I promise a brighter one in the next edition!



## Infrastructure to alleviate flooding needed urgently.

Despite declaring a climate emergency in 2020, the Labour Government has failed to do anything to improve flood resilience and prepare us for weather-related disasters.

The devastating flood events that occurred in January and February have exposed the poor response and inadequate preparedness of both central government and Auckland Council. The lack of maintenance in roadside catchpits and neglect of urban streams, coupled with delayed decisions and a lack of leadership, have left affected residents in a state of uncertainty and anxiety. As winter approaches, urgent action is required to address the infrastructure issues and provide support to the affected communities.

The West Auckland Is Flooding group (WAIF) has rightly called for the Government's extended support for insured homeowners who cannot return to their homes due to the ongoing risks associated with the existing land use. The decisions regarding which properties can be reoccupied and which should be redzoned have been far too delayed and insufficient, leaving residents in limbo. This lack of action and compassion demonstrates a preference for listening to officials rather than the people who are in desperate need of help.

It is not just the residents of Muriwai and North West Auckland who have suffered from the poor response to the flood events. The residents of Hawkes Bay and South Auckland have faced similar challenges. This lack of leadership and compassion is evident in the Government's approach, as it fails to prioritise the needs of the affected communities. The uncertainty and anxiety faced by these people are heavy burdens that need immediate attention and resolution.

With the approach of winter, there is a heightened risk of heavy rains, exacerbating the existing problems caused by the flood events. It is imperative for the Government and Auckland Council to suspend the Resource Management Act so urgent action can be taken to address the infrastructure issues. This includes clearing slips blocking streams, removing debris, and improving the maintenance of catchpits and urban streams. The lack of adequate governance in allowing building without providing sufficient infrastructure has contributed to the severity of the situation

The stories of flood victims paint a grim picture of their struggles. Some residents, reliant on their flatmates' support, are struggling to pay their mortgages while they wait for decisions on the future of their properties. Their insurance coverage for alternative accommodations is about to expire. This financial burden, coupled with ongoing mortgage rates and insurance payments, further highlights the need for immediate action and support from the Government and Auckland Council.

ACT believes that to provide certainty for homeowners, the Government and council must prioritise the rebuilding of infrastructure to protect flood-prone areas. Rebuilding in flood-prone areas, where this is safe to do so, requires significant investment, and it is essential to allocate funding accordingly. This may require reprioritising resources from other programmes to support the local infrastructure rebuild. Additionally, there is a need for the Government to act swiftly and propose solutions

that take into account the environmental impact and long-term sustainability.

One solution to address the recurring flood events is managed retreat. The Government must respond quickly to implement measures that support managed retreat and commit to funding the necessary infrastructure improvements to protect communities which can stay in place. This includes removing barriers posed by the RMA.

To alleviate the financial burden on affected residents, rates relief must be provided in the interim. This will help ease the immediate financial strain while the Government and Auckland Council work on long-term solutions. It is crucial to provide immediate support and reassurance to the affected communities during this challenging time.

And the Government must not further delay decisions about who can return and rebuild, and where it is unsafe to do so.
