South Kaipara Good Food (SKGF), a non-profit organisation based in Te Awaroa Helensville and focused on community food security, is going from strength to strength with its four programmes, which have evolved from the results of careful research - Kai Assist, Kai Grow, Kai Learn, and Kai Rescuerunning very smoothly. In September 2022,SKGF was honoured to win big at the local Business Awards, coming out on top in the categories Not for Profit/Social Enterprise, Best New Business (under 1 year of formal operations), Environmental Excellence, and, gratifyingly, the Supreme Award.

Through the Kai Assist programme volunteers deliver parcels of food and household items to people in immediate need. The aim of the Kai Grow programme is to promote locally grown healthy food to increase health and well-being through community, urban and school gardens. Kai Learn aims to increase self-sufficiency and community resilience through food sharing and gardening

knowledge, and through the Kai Rescue Programme SKGF acts as intermediary between suppliers and the community, collecting and distributing to those in need food that would otherwise end up in landfill.

Importantly, SKGF works alongside agencies like Te Ha Oranga, Parent Aid NorthWest, Outwest Youth, the Mental Health Team at the Helensville WDHB, South Kaipara Men's Centre, the Angel Fund, Guardians of Our Children, local schools, and Kindred Family Services, all of whom contribute to supporting the community's most vulnerable.

Since April 2020, volunteers have packed more than 35,560 bags and worked more than 9,118 hours. While funding provides some paid workers, volunteer engagement is one of the most important parts of SKGF, as without this group of dedicated individuals the preparation of kai packs, the community gardens and upkeep of the Kai Hub would be incredibly difficult. One hundred percent of the proceeds raised from the baked goods and chicken cuddling went to the Muriwai Fire Brigade. James says "donating the money to the Muriwai Fire Brigade came from wanting to help out after the cyclone," he went on to say that after scrolling through community facebook pages and knowing people personally who had lost their homes and belongings, it was clear that the cyclone had had a "devastating" impact on our local community. "Being able to donate the money we raised to the fire station means they will have extra funds to help people in future disasters, or for everyday callouts," he continued.

The total amount of money raised from this event was around \$700! This is no doubt a huge contribution to our local community which will likely make a massive impact for those in need. The collective effort put in by the Outwest Youth team, James Shaw and the many students who spent their time baking cupcakes, biscuits, rice bubble cakes and more, was nothing short of extraordinary. This event simultaneously brought fun and happiness to the students

and staff of Kaipara College while also massively contributing to our local community. While the main inspiration for this event was simple fun, it seems the symbolism of new life and beginnings often associated with Easter perfectly connects with the restoration and healing of our community after the hardships faced by many local families.

## Government elections - a need to include better funding for road maintenance. by Cr Greg

What is happening about the maintenance of our sealed and unsealed roads?

Roads are utilised by buses, cyclists, commercial and private vehicles. Everyone wants to use safe, good quality roads.

Yet the number of potholes, uncleared drains and blocked culverts are more abundant now than ever before. Repair costs to vehicles and safety for people are being compromised. Why?

The issue of roads "potholing" and poor road side drainage is being reported all across New Zealand and is not just isolated to Rodney's roads.

So why isn't Auckland Transport able to get on top of properly maintaining our roads?

The answer is relatively simple. For every dollar of ratepayer's money Auckland Transport gets it is subsidised another dollar from NZTA. That is how Auckland Transport is funded.

Those Government subsidies are being weighted more heavily towards providing public transport than towards improving the maintenance standards of the roads. This government directive is clearly outlined in the Government Policy Statement for Land Transport, which is set by the Minister of Transport. A balanced amount of funding is not being allocated for road maintenance.

This explains why the roads are in such a poor state.

The Government, through the Minister of Transport and Waka Kotahi NZTA, has intentionally set spending this way. This policy in turn cascades down and sets Auckland Transport's spending priorities because NZTA matches Auckland Transport's ratepayer provided funding, on the proviso the money is spent on the Minister's priorities.

Are any of the parliamentary candidates electioneering to change this Policy? If not, write to them to ask why.

Locally, ratepayers are extremely frustrated, they pay their rates in good faith, assuming their money will go into their local needs, which for rural Rodney is maintaining the unsealed roads, including keeping the drains and culverts clear.

Until the priority on transport spending changes at a central Government level, Auckland Transport has one hand tied behind its back in its ability to maintain Auckland's roads to the acceptable and safe standards that rural ratepayers expect.

Without a change in NZTA's directive for funding Auckland Transport, we will not see any significant improvements to the maintenance standards of our roads.

It is an election year and only when the government changes the funding formula to include a fair portion of funding for maintaining the unsealed and sealed roading networks will we see the state of our roads to improve.

Members Exhibition 'New Works' on now!





#### **UPCOMING EXHIBITION** Kit Dean and the Museum Archive

Festival of Photography 2023. 10th May - 3rd June

The Art Centre Helensville is temporarily based at Helensville Museum Te Awaroa. As a result we have been privileged to view art in a different context. Utilizing the Museum's symbology and

reflecting on preserved subject matter, has challenged the idea of how we approach and curate shows, significantly photography.

Local photographer Kit Dean's practice is environmentally based with a focus on structure and space. Visual aspects of Dean's work are consonant with the static nature of the Museum's photographic archives. These two projects will present 'resistance' thematically through the art of preservation and contemporary inclusion.



#### Te Awaroa Helensville Museum revives exciting local history project.

Do you know the history of your house? Did you know that the second iteration of Saint Matthews church in Te Awaroa Helensville's Garfield Road collapsed in an easterly gale and had to be rebuilt? In great news, a project designed to capture and preserve information and stories about local history, begun a few years ago, has been revived by current volunteers. It's going to be a collaborative community effort, and everyone is invited to join in. The end goal is to have as much information about each building and block of land as possible, and to have all this information available for research.

The folder containing the work done by a group of volunteers so far on the project 'On the Street Where You Lived' was led by the late Natalie Carroll. It is a treasure trove of hand-written information detailing local knowledge and memories of the people and places in the town of Te Awaroa Helensville. Surrounding areas such as Woodhill, Parakai, South Head and Kaukapakapa will be researched in Stage Two of the revitalised project.

Our local history is fascinating, from the first days of Maori settlement to the arrival of immigrants from overseas to the shifts in land use today, such as the Rautawhiri housing development on land that was formerly a farm. In just one story, Garfield Road was first known as Portage Road, museum President Toni Walmsley says, because in the 1860s it was the route for people, goods, and services to travel to Te Awaroa. The road was later renamed after the 20th American president James Garfield, who was assassinated in 1881 just six months after he took office, and still bears his name. Does anyone know why his name was chosen?

Toni is excited to be leading a team of volunteers to continue this valuable work. "We often have inquiries about land, or streets, or buildings from people who are curious about their home or where they grew up," she says. The answers are all over the place – some can be found in Colleen Sheffield's book 'Men Came Voyaging', others are in people's memories, or filed at the museum - and the goal is to have information centralised and digitised so it is readily accessible.

The project group is very keen to have community engagement. The first event will be at Te Awaroa Helensville Museum on Sunday afternoon, 1pm – 3pm, 28 May. There will be images, written information, and a short talk to kick off proceedings. You are invited to come with your questions, knowledge, and curiosity.

# Come Chase Us with Questions - What do we do? Lots!

Volunteers from Citizens Advice Bureau Helensville help clients with all sorts of information, referrals and issues.

These range from family and personal; housing and land; employment and business to finance and benefits; legal and Government; consumer, education and health categories.

In addition, a free budget clinic is available every Wednesday by appointment, JPs are here most days and volunteers photocopy, email and scan information for clients.

"There's no rhyme nor reason or even a pattern to the questions we're asked, but it certainly shows the diversity of need and want," CAB Helensville manager Rani Timoti says. "I remember in my previous work at a local community newspaper I'd advise people to call the CAB as I knew the organisation delivered a fountain of knowledge. Since working here, it's true! The CAB database is definitely our first port of call for everything we're asked."

The following is a range of client enquiry examples, upholding confidentiality principles:

- \* Calling Auckland Council to check if Muriwai Beach was open to near residents.
- \* Providing options when goods ordered online arrived but didn't match the description and condition advertised.
- \* Writing a skills-based CV for a client for his prospective new employer.
- \* Advising about a neighbour's drainage causing flooding on their property.
- \* Going through legal rights for casual employees and helping with their employment relationship problem.
- \* Providing a bus timetable to go to Hibiscus Coast.
- \* Referring a family to a South Kaipara counselling service and South Kaipara Men's Trust.
- \* Warning about an online scam which relates to a victim of identity theft and the necessity of contacting the bank about money laundering.

"Such a list goes on and I'm astounded by the depth of some of these issues which our volunteers go into with active listening, open-ended questions and empowering clients so they have more options than what they originally came in for," says Rani.

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
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#### Flood predictions are vital.

"While much of NZ has moved on, the aftermath of flooding and other storm events remains bleak in areas such as northwest Auckland. We must not allow the continually changing clamour of the news cycle to drown out the very real need that still exists here. Authorities have two key responsibilities in this regard.

The first is supporting locals whose lives are still in limbo. It seems to me that official answers are coming much too slowly from local and central government. I've been urging various government ministers to help flood-stricken residents in a number of different ways. And certainty is needed for those with "redsticker" status. But that's not the focus of this column.

Instead I want to focus on the second area of official responsibility, which is to learn every lesson needed to reduce the risk of a further flooding event causing such damage. Some of my constituents have already been flooded out no fewer than four times in the past year and a half. Enough is enough.

A highly practical, relatively easy win can be installing a flood warning system for the Kumeu River.

In fact, it will be a matter of reinstating such a system: a river gauge at Kumeu was decommissioned in 2016 according to the Review of the Kumeu Flood Event of August 2021 carried out by WSP New Zealand Ltd.

The "Healthy Waters" section of Auckland Council have recently told me that they're working on a flood forecasting and warning system for Auckland. Information obtained from rising rivers must be passed in real time between the agencies and, even more importantly, to the residents themselves.

It can't come soon enough, as we're now in a race against time with the rains that months ahead of worsening weather will surely bring. I hope that promptly reinstating Kumeu River's gauge will also enhance the accuracy of the hydraulic modelling for Auckland's northwest, being an area with a large population centre situated next to a flood-prone river.

I've asked Healthy Waters to be kept informed on the progress of these initiatives and have urged that they be prioritised.

And another lesson learnt must be the end of ad hoc development. My view is that we simply cannot indulge "private plan change" applications in flood-prone environments, allowing one-off developments outside the existing envelope of infrastructure.

This particular change will be achievable by the stroke of a pen in the Beehive, which is where I'm directing many of these questions.

I'll keep you posted on the answers. Winter is coming."

#### **Parenting Through Challenging Times: A free** workshop for local parents

Being a parent in Northwest Rodney over the past few years has been tough for a lot of families. COVID, the cost of living, rapid development, and natural disasters have left many parents feeling overwhelmed, and our children have been feeling this as well. This is why Kindred Family Services is offering a free workshop for all parents and caregivers, introducing parenting strategies and concepts to support our tamariki through times of change, uncertainty, heightened anxiety and trauma.

"Change and uncertainty are normal parts of life," says Kim Wills, clinical manager at Kindred Family Services. "but over the last few years, the sheer scale and frequency of changes have outpaced our normal resilience factors". Kim says that this has led to a huge jump in the number of families accessing Kindred support, with a lot of these parents seeking support for their children as well.

With these pressures in mind, Kindred Family Services teamed up with Parenting Place to create something specifically tailored to the needs of North West Rodney parents. The result is a 90minute workshop named 'Parenting Through Challenging Times', that draws extensively on research, and is delivered in the entertaining and practical approach that Parent Place is well-known

"We're all really looking forward to it", says Gemma Rose-Peacock, Team Lead at Kindred's Family Centre. She explains that "for kids who have been through uncertain times, a strong relationship with a parent or caregiver is by far the most important thing", and she hopes that this workshop will reinforce what parents are already doing well and provide a few new tools and strategies for supporting children in these uncertain times.

There are six workshops throughout May at various locations and times, including in Kumeu, Waimauku, and Helensville, with both evening and day sessions available. The Kaipara College session on Monday 22 May will be catered specifically to parents of teens, while all other sessions are more suited to parents of primary-aged tamariki and/or younger.

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# Auckland's unlucky number 13.

Labour announced their five preferred options for an Auckland Harbour crossing in March 2023. Apparently, this is the 13th such announcement by governments over the 35 years. According to the Prime Minister, the project is now on a "fast track" and construction will start within 6 years.

I met a former Mayor of the old North Shore City Council recently, who told me that the latest options were essentially the same as the old options.

In 2009 the New Zealand Transport Agency, Auckland City and North Shore City councils agreed to construct three cross harbour tunnels to complement the existing bridge. This would allow two lanes on the existing bridge to be converted for walking and cycling, and limit bridge traffic to light vehicles only.

Two tunnels would serve northbound and southbound truck and car traffic, while the third tunnel was dedicated to public transport. Buses initially, and trains at some point in the future. The Northern Busway was designed to carry trains at some point.

Both NZTA and Kiwirail issued designation notices under the RMA to protect the road and rail corridors around the approaches to a new crossing. In 2010 a Business Case was approved by NZTA. This indicated that the ideal timing for construction would be in the 2020's, because the existing bridge would not be able to carry heavy vehicles beyond 2030.

The new crossings would allow more land to be opened up for high density housing in Auckland's Wynyard Quarter and the North Shore.

At some point in the last 13 years, the project was put on the back burner. Now, in March 2023, a Labour Government under pressure on inflation and cost of living, crime, and co-governance is trying to sneak back into voters' hearts with yet another infrastructure promise.

Such an important project could well have been a priority for Labour when first elected in 2017, or even when re-elected in 2020. Instead they promised Auckland Light Rail to the airport. They have yet to decide a route, let alone start construction.

The last six years has been a huge waste of time, money and opportunity for Aucklanders. People living in the North West can spend 45 minutes in their cars crawling through Kumeu to get to the motorway at Westgate, and then face the same delays at the end of the day. This leads to frustration, which leads to anger and a feeling of deep unfairness.

Unfair, because we have known for at least thirteen years that State Highway 16 should be directed past Kumeu and Huapai, which are not just gridlocked, but frozen in time. The traffic means these lovely country towns are simply unable to develop to their full potential.


Unfair, because when land was developed for new suburbs and lifestyles in the North West, we assumed that roads and rail would be upgraded to match population growth. And unlucky, because under the previous National Government, even having a Prime Minister as your local MP for six of the last 13 years meant so little.

That is why ACT would take the politics out of infrastructure, and hand over the decision making to an independent Highways state-owned enterprise, Highways New Zealand, which would own and operate New Zealand's state highway network.

It would also construct any new state highways and conduct maintenance and improvements on existing highways. Highways New Zealand would be expected to be operationally self-funding out of

user fees, including delivering a return on invested capital to the Government. It would be incentivised to deliver projects promptly and affordably, because delays and cost-overruns would harm underlying profitability and, executive compensation.

Under a Government with ACT, if the roads we need aren't delivered on time, that would be very unlucky for management, not just the poor people stuck in traffic.


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
