

# Road works for miles and miles

Having had months of disruption as a result of the road widening in Kumeu we are now in for the same chaos and crawling traffic all the way from Huapai to Waimauku! Below is an update from the contractors Fulton Hogan. Ed

SH16 Brigham Creek to Waimauku Safety Improvements – Stage 1 Huapai to Waimauku

Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency is working toward a vision for Aotearoa where no one is killed or seriously injured on our roads. Safety improvements in infrastructure, including the SH16 Brigham Creek to Waimauku safety improvements project, will save lives and reduce the number of people seriously injured on Aotearoa New Zealand's roads and streets.

Stage 1 of the SH16 Brigham Creek to Waimauku safety improvements project focuses on the corridor of SH16 between Trigg Road, Huapai to Factory Road, Waimauku.

To make this corridor safer, we're making a number of improvements:

- Installing flexible road safety barriers to catch drivers who leave their lane before hitting something harder like trees, poles, ditches or other vehicles.
- Installing four turnaround bays to enable safe turning movements along the corridor.
- Widening bridges that are too narrow.
- Creating a wider road shoulder so there's more space for people who cycle.

Fulton Hogan have been awarded the contract to deliver these safety improvements.

#### Construction work to start on SH16

Work is scheduled to start from the 21 August 2023.

Fulton Hogan will firstly establish an on-site office and undertake site wide preparatory work, including vegetation clearance and underground service locations. Following this work, we will be implementing long term traffic management which will involve steel barriers to protect workers while maintaining one lane of traffic in each direction. The first phase of work will be focussed on Berry Bridge, and between Factory Road and Matua Road in the east bound direction.

We will provide further updates as works progress into new phases or as working conditions change.

How will this affect you?

- Day shift will take place from 7am to 7pm, Monday to Saturday.
- There will be some night works during this stage. We will provide information when timings are confirmed.
- This work involves machinery which can create noise, vibration, and dust. Fulton Hogan will endeavour to complete

the noisiest works as early in the evening as possible and maintain industry best-practice methods to keep this disruption to a minimum.

- Traffic management will be in place 24/7 and some detours will be necessary, please follow the signage carefully and allow extra travel time.
- Work will be happening on the road, in berms and footpaths along SH16.
- All work will be fenced to ensure safety of work crews, drivers and the community - please take extra care when driving, walking and cycling.

Gibbs Farm rests on 400 hectares of re-formed farmland on the Kaipara Harbour. The privately owned park is home to an internationally renowned collection of large-scale sculptures by some of the world's leading artists, commissioned and curated by Alan Gibbs over the past 25 years. On your visit you will be able to roam the farmland, to take in the views of the harbour and gain perspective of the sculptures from a distance and right up close. You can self-guide with the comprehensive guide provided and look out for the exotic animals!

Pack a picnic and come and take in the sculptures, animals and the stunning landscape they respond to and transform.

A reasonable level of fitness is required and a visit generally takes 2-3 hours. # A Taste of University Life

# From Penk's Penk's Pen CHRIS PENK-MP It's that time again!

While politicians invariably obsess about "the next election" pretty much constantly (it's never more than 3 years away!), most normal people don't think like that. This is totally understandable, and indeed healthy, with so many real-life concerns to preoccupy the mind.

That said, readers will have noticed election signs recently adorning the northwest landscape, so there's no escaping the fact that in mid-October there will be an election.

My hope is that major issues for this area are debated thoroughly. Clearly the focus needs include de-congesting the roads, adding capacity to our local schools and improving internet connectivity for those living in rural blackspots just up the road from Auckland CBD.

In summary, infrastructure is sorely needed in northwest Auckland to catch up to the demands of all the additional housing here. It's fair to note that these problems date back many years, across successive governments, so a partisan conversation about where fault lies has limited value. Much more important for the people of this area is that politicians and would-be politicians set out what the future should look like.

In my mind it's clear: first, we need to avoid any further ad hoc development. We need to plan so that decisions aren't made at the level of a single development site that detract from the liveability of the area as a whole. And a key aspect is to avoid any more flood-prone areas as locations for housing.

Second, we need to get underway building the Kumeu bypass (or "alternative state highway", as it's officially known) and improving other key arterial roads. These have been talked about for years but we're way past the point where talk is enough.

With that in place, works to widen and improve SH16 will be able to occur with a pressure valve released. Truth be told, these works are themselves long overdue so we urgently need as much progress as possible to ease the blockages at key points along the main drag.

It should be clear to local and central government planners at that point what exciting additions can then be made to the area. An additional high school would be right up there, for example.

Let's talk about these things ahead of the election. And then let's do them.

# Rapid transit for the Northwest of Tamaki Makaurau

We have an exciting and transformational project in the Northwest of Tamaki Makaurau that we would like to let you know about.

As part of the growth of the wider rapid transit network, Waka Kotahi NZ Transport Agency is investigating the rapid transit options to provide people with a fast, frequent and reliable way to get around the northwest of Auckland - from Brigham Creek to the city centre, alongside State Highway 16 (SH16).

This mahi is being led by Waka Kotahi in partnership with Te Kawerau a Maki, Ngati Whatua Orakei and other iwi partners.

#### A better-connected Auckland

The northwest of Auckland is growing and there's an increasing need to provide better public transport options for everyone who lives in and moves around the area.

Rapid transit along the Northwestern Motorway, SH16, will transform the way people move around the region, create connections to the growing rapid transit network, reduce our reliance on private vehicles, reduce emissions and create a more sustainable future for us all.

Rapid transit is fast, frequent and reliable public transport that carries large numbers of people, on dedicated corridors separated from other traffic. This means it is unaffected by general traffic congestion – like the Northern Busway on the Northern Motorway (SH1). Rapid transit can come in a variety of modes including rail, bus and ferry.

#### Feedback wanted for our Local Board Plan:

#### Feedback wanted for the Auckland Civil Defence Group Plan:

Since the major weather events earlier this year Auckland Emergency Management has been working through what they have learnt and are ready to bring their draft Group Plan out for public feedback.

The Group Plan sets out the strategic direction for our work on Auckland's Civil Defence Emergency Management (CDEM) system – it outlines the CDEM vision and goals for Tamaki Makaurau, how they will achieve them and how they will measure their performance. The Group Plan is designed to be used by the CDEM Group, key partners and stakeholders involved in CDEM functions in Auckland. It also provides the public with an understanding of how these stakeholders work together, and the role they themselves can play in building individual and community resilience. The plan covers a 5-year period.

# Traffic congestion is deliberately made worse by consultant's designs

ACT - the transport supercharger for North West Auckland.

For drivers heading to the northwest on State Highway 16 you may have noticed changes to lane marking at the Te Atatu and Lincoln Road interchanges. And since the changes made by Waka Kotahi, queues of traffic could block those off ramps at pretty much any time of day.

If you live in Te Atatu like I do, traffic congestion and delays are now much worse than before the lane changes. This not a design fault, this is the design intent.

The Labour Government and their climate-obsessed consultants took traffic lanes and turned them into bus stops on the motorway off ramps and adjacent local roads.

As a result of trying to fit five traffic lanes into two, rather than the previous three, traffic now comes to a halt in all directions for hours every day. Even the rare buses on those routes are stuck in the same traffic jams. It is infuriating for people needing to go places.

The consultants hired to design this ongoing disaster don't care about people needing to get places by car. On their website they state "Car-dependent transport systems are bad for us all. We get communities spread thinly across the landscape, where people are forced to use a car to get around, and valuable city space is lost to carparking.

They give us a binary choice of either roads and cars, or salvation by bus and bike.

"To invest in roads, we sacrifice investment in public transport and walking and cycling infrastructure, which makes these options less convenient, safe, and comfortable."

New Zealand's transport system is going to continue to suffer as long as it is dictated by anti-progress climate policies. The climate obsessed politicians who claim that roads are the problem, are themselves the problem. People who chose to live in the North and West of Auckland need reliable road transport, whether they are riding public transport or rely on cars.

The real problem with roads is that good ones cost a lot of money. That is why ACT is the only Party proposing a genuine shake-up of how roading infrastructure is funded in New Zealand, ensuring Auckland, and the rest of New Zealand gets access to safe, modern and efficient roads.

For the people of the North and West stuck in gridlocked traffic, in a car or in a bus, ACT is going to supercharge your road.

ACT is proposing to introduce a world-class toll roading system. It will use private sector financing and expertise to get new roads built faster and to maintain existing roads more quickly and effectively. Countries like Ireland have successfully made extensive use of tolling.

In March 2018 then Transport Minister Phil Twyford said "Solving Auckland's traffic gridlock is also important for the rest of New Zealand with congestion in the city between 2015 and 2017 estimated to have cost the economy \$1.3 billion a year in lost productivity".

Under a world-class toll roading system, New Zealanders will have a choice: make use of new toll roads much sooner or wait for tax-funded roads to be delivered later or never.

The delayed Kumeu-Huapai Bypass could be delivered this decade. The promised North West express busway is another road that could be delivered using toll revenues. The choice is in your hands this October. If you want to supercharge your road, give your party vote to ACT this election.
