

West Auckland film nears completion

What started as a vampire-themed photoshoot idea in April 2020 has now developed into a short feature film for Whenuapai couple Chris and Petra Gloyn.

Entitled *Bloodlines* the film is a collaboration between Icarus Productions and JS Visuals. Described as a psychological thriller, it has been filmed on location in Whenuapai, Swanson, Kumeu, Piha, Dairy Flat, North Shore and Waiuku.

Petra jokes about how she came to be scriptwriter. "When our Director of Photography, Joel Staveley, suggested turning the photoshoot idea into a film I said, 'You'll need a script', electing myself to the role. Three days later I had an initial draft."

It was meant to be a short film, but the vision grew and developed, undergoing many scriptural changes along the way.

"As our first film," Chris, the director, said, "it has been quite a learning curve. We started with a small cast and crew but our complement has grown exponentially as the story evolved."

It hasn't all been plain sailing. There have been many cast changes and location issues, and Petra had to come up with creative ways to solve them. All these issues are now behind them and cast and crew are working toward a December wrap date, or mid January at the latest.

Casting for the project was done initially through the couple's own talent agency, Icarus Talent Ltd.

"The Agency couldn't supply all the cast we needed," Chris said, "so we engaged a Casting Assistant, Leonard Matthews, who runs Pasifika Actors Group on Facebook."

The project is self funded and actors and crew are collaborating in the project for no payment. Shoot dates were organised around people's schedules.

"We took largely unknown people," Petra said, "and threw them in the deep end. We have been blown away by what we have got from the actors. We believe we'll have a product that everyone can be proud of at the end."









The couple took a different approach to other production companies, allowing cast to put forward ideas to improve the script, and dispensing with the normal practise of separating extras from cast and crew.

The production is in the final stages of principal photography and the editorial process has just begun for scenes already shot. The couple already has cinemas interested in showing the film and they are looking at a release date in 2024.




Scarlet Payn

CHRISTMAS BOOK FAIR 2nd & 3rd December 2023 Helensville A&P Showgrounds "Still the Biggest & Best Book Fair in the West!"

The Lions Club of Helensville will be holding their Christmas Book Fair at the Helensville A&P Association Show grounds on the weekend of the 2nd and 3rd of December, opening at 9.00am on Saturday until 4.00pm and again on Sunday 10.00am until 3.00pm. Our last Book Fair held in May raised \$11,823 from the sale of books, for which many thanks. Helensville Te Awaroa Museum and the Aotearoa history curriculum

One of the highlights of 2023 at Helensville Te Awaroa Museum was a series of well-received talks on Aotearoa's history, given by Arina Bosch and her Leigh, mother organisation's President. Motivated by changes to the NCEA social studies classes curriculum (for students in Year 1 to Year 10), the talks were titled Polynesian Migration, Becoming Maori, Tribal Arina Bosch contributing to the Europeans, History and Matariki. "The Museum.

idea of the talks was to do a sweeping overview from Pacific migration up to immediately before the Treaty with the hope of raising some of the achievements and events that are sometimes overlooked," Arina explained.

Arina was keen to help expand the conversation around New Zealand history by challenging received wisdoms, "There's a lot happening around elevating our histories and I wanted to contribute to that. I think many of us who whakapapa to Ngati Whatua have been inspired by the mahi of the Pihema, Kapea, Wikiriwhi and Skipper whanau to name a few, who have shown tireless dedication to reinvigorating our language and stories and artforms. It's made us all want to contribute in whatever small ways we can."

Arina says the curriculum change was asked for by a NZ History Teachers Association petition. "It was about creating a push towards enforceable inclusion of more of our own history, not to the exclusion of other things, but it would be guaranteed a place." Bringing teachers up to speed has included training seminars, feedback loops and conference days. "The underlying message is that history is constructed and contested - it's the story of what happened, and it looks different through different lenses. It's a case of treading lightly, there's not an intention to reframe any narrative as the 'right' one. It is more to elevate the conversation. History should stand up against rigorous debate."

The talks at the Helensville Te Awaroa Museum were designed to help schools resource this new curriculum area and feedback so far has been extremely positive.






And of course there's the worrying surprises of unexpected bills and life's events, not meeting ends meet or finances being a part of a package of problems people are going through.

Your opinion matters



DID YOU KNOW?

Are you an owner or an occupier/tenant of a commercially rated property in the North West (Riverhead, Kumeu, Huapai, Waimauku, Helensville, Parakai, Kaukapakapa)?

Did you know that you pay a targeted rate, a membership levy, to North West Country Inc, which is a business association, a Business Improvement District (BID) governed by Auckland Council BID Policy. Did you know that the AGM was held on 3rd October at Kaukapakapa?

Notification of the AGM's has, for some years, been buried in newsletters emailed to members. Many 'members' are not registered, or do not read the newsletters regularly, certainly not to the end. Consequently almost no members are present at AGM's.

Did you know that whilst you pay a mandated membership levy, you have no membership recognition or rights without filling out a registration form? Did you know that at the AGM questions/ discussion were specifically banned by the Chair at the commencement of the meeting?

Did you know that at the AGM the Constitution was changed to reduce the elected representation on the executive committee? Now each township requires only one representative. Previously it was 3 each for Kumeu/Huapai and Helensville. Currently Helensville has just one, a real estate agent. Where is representation for retail, industrial, service, professional or hospitality?

Did you know that almost half of the levies collected has always gone to pay for management of the organisation? Did you know this is to increase to more than half next year?

Did you know that the Big Little Local event in Helensville, 11th November, is being funded by the BID this year? Whilst it is the sort of event the BID could/should be facilitating, it is significantly promotional for the business organising it. The owner of that business is on the executive committee of the BID. Do your representatives not understand conflict of interest? There was a specific item on the AGM Agenda for declaring any conflicts of interest. None were declared. I only found out about the funding of this event because I suggested to the BID Chair, subsequent to the AGM, that it was the sort of event the BID should be providing.

The event is a fundraiser for a local charity. So your hard earned \$'s are contributing to promotion of someone else's business and a charity, albeit a very worthwhile charity. Did you know of the opportunity available to you to promote your business at this event?

Did you know that a sizeable chunk of the levies is now being spent on a business hub – leasing a place for the board to meet etc., including fit out, furniture, security etc.?

What have you got for your contributions?

Across the 10 years the BID has existed, I have been forced to contribute around \$20,000. A Christmas tree (relatively recent) in Helensville is the only tangible outcome.

Since the expiry of the lease the council has been unable to successfully obtain a lease application from the Helensville Scouts and this means the lease will now be open for expressions of interest.

The Hall is in a bit of a state (it isn't new) and a new lease holder would be required to commit to a significant upgrade to bring the building up to standard.



This would include some asbestos removal and seismic strengthening. This is a great building in a prime location, so for the right community group this could be a great opportunity.

If no lease holder can be found, then the Scouts would be required to remove the building and return the site back to grass.

New Zealanders Demand Real Change: ACT's Vision for the Future

The recent General Election in New Zealand has brought about a seismic shift in our political landscape. A key part of this change is building a more productive economy that can generate the wealth required to fund high-quality education, healthcare, and infrastructure. Resource management rules need to be reformed to make it easier to develop housing and infrastructure. Property owners should have the presumption that they can use their land, and objections to development should be limited, ensuring we can meet the housing and infrastructure needs of our growing population.

Transport projects like the long-delayed Kumeu bypass should be able to proceed with private funding and be financed by tolls if local people prefer that option. This approach will alleviate the burden on taxpayers and expedite vital infrastructure development.

Energy policy should prioritize affordability and reliability for both businesses and consumers, without being fixated on a particular type of fuel. It's time to end the era of using energy policy as a blunt tool for decarbonization. A ban on oil and gas exploration has been detrimental to our economic prospects and needs to be reversed. We should also cut the red tape that hinders resource development, which is crucial to restoring a productive economy.

ACT envisions a coalition government with a focus on productivity, wealth creation, and education. New Zealanders have spoken loud and clear, and they deserve a government that listens and acts in their best interests. It's time for a new direction, and ACT is ready to lead the way.
