

An interesting experience to start the year

On the first day of 2024 I had an interesting experience. While pottering around the garden in the early afternoon, I came across a swarm of insects in our lime tree. Although they looked like bees, I was unsure whether they were bees or wasps. A number of them were flying to and fro, but most were just attaching themselves to the outside of the swarm.



As we all know, Facebook has the answer to any query, and sure enough, the response to the uploaded photo came back as definitely bees, followed by how we should get rid of them. One sad person suggested spraying the tree with petrol and setting fire to it. The more sensible and helpful respondents gave us names of who we should contact to have it removed, which in turn has led to a new association and hopefully an informative one for you, our readers.

Within a short time we had a message from Ken Brown offering to come and remove the swarm free of charge. Ken's wife, Sandra, had seen the Facebook post and alerted her husband to our problem. Ken, it turned out, is a beekeeper in our area; he is also an Apiculture Tutor with Land Based Training and President of Auckland Beekeepers' Club. Clearly his knowledge of bees is extensive and his explanation of their behaviour had me spellbound.

Ken described our swarm as fairly small, at an estimated 4,500 bees, and told us that the bees would be swarming around a queen. They give off a pheromone that attracts their sisters to settle in the swarm. He described our swarm as very docile and expected them to be easy to handle. Ken had brought with him a homemade wooden hive, the size of a banana box, to put the bees into for transport. He laid a white sheet on the ground under the lime tree, held the box under the swarm and gave the tree branch a brisk shake. The majority of bees fell into the hive which Ken then put the lid on and laid on the sheet.

Obviously, this process led to numerous bees now flying around somewhat disorientated. Some bees returned to their original branch, so Ken sprayed the tree with air freshener to interfere with the "home" pheromone that was on it. It is important that all the bees stay together, otherwise they would not survive long by themselves. Meanwhile the bees around the entrance to the new hive were giving off pheromones as before, and gradually attracting the returning forager bees to the hive to join their friends.

Ken left the bees to settle into the box and returned around dusk to collect the hive. By this time there were virtually no bees left flying around.

Ken has kindly agreed to provide readers with future articles about these fascinating insects that are so critical to human life. In the meantime, should you have an encounter like I did, please take the opportunity to arrange for the bees to be collected by a local beekeeper or Auckland Beekeepers' Club to help nature continue the wonderful work it does, without us even being aware of it most of the time!

PS. The hive has been treated for varroa mites and is now happily thriving in its new apiary feeding off clover and manuka. There should be a good late honey harvest from them, of course leaving lots for them for over the winter.



Please ensure that you wear suitable walking footwear and bring a drink (plus a rain jacket if the weather looks unsettled).


The walk will take approx. 2 hours and will be around 5km in length.




Facebook page: Our new facebook page "Connection Hub" is up and running with a few planned regular events.

Happy New Year! I hope that all readers of the Helensville Community News have had a great start to 2024.

I am enjoying being back at work now, after travelling post-Christmas to visit extended family in South East Asia.

I had visited Singapore and other nations in that region many times since I first joined the Navy but that was more than 20 years ago now.

Every city that I visited is much changed since that time but I wonder if the same can truthfully be said of NZ (in a uniformly good way) in the intervening couple of decades.

I certainly couldn't help but feel as though residents of those cities have seen a lot more progress than northwest Auckland ever has. There is more planning evident in Singapore's airport alone, for example, than in all of Auckland ... and certainly in northwest Auckland.

While I was not travelling for work purposes, naturally I was taking mental notes about things that they do well overseas that we do poorly at home in terms of planning, transport systems etc. It would be impossible for any of us not to make those kinds of comparisons, I suspect.

Of course this is not to say that New Zealand is not an

exceptional country. I'm genuine when I say that I think we have the best little country on earth.

But, if we are honest with ourselves, much of the charm here lies in our natural advantages, rather than the result of any good planning or policies implemented by central government. Indeed, you could make a case that New Zealand remains a pretty good place to live despite, not because of, the efforts of government actors (whether elected officials or agencies) in the recent past.

States like Singapore seem to have a very permissive regime when it comes to allowing the private sector get on and build commercially, albeit within very well-defined parameters of planning and land use.

In New Zealand, by contrast, often we have these things the wrong way around: very loose notions about what can be done in different areas, and then we make it hard for people to do it. The worst of both worlds!

If you don't believe me, look out of the window while sitting in Kumeu or wherever else you may be reading this column. I bet you are not much more than a stone's throw away from gridlocked traffic in an area of ad hoc growth.

In making arguments for northwest Auckland to get a better deal on transport, I realise that we are not about to get Singapore's mass rapid transit system; population density is an obvious point of difference.

But we can at least get much better than we have now, surely. The first full year of the new government has now begun; wish me luck!

The Helensville and Kumeu Shows will be in town soon and we hope to help make them successful events to kick start 2024.



Helensville Library and Service Centre update for February:

Kaukapakapa. Yes or No to speed bumps on the state highway?

The Rodney local board has allocated \$3.25 million dollars for approximately 600m of footpath in Kaukapakapa (that's almost five and a half thousand dollars per lineal meter of footpath), this money is coming from the RLBTTR (Rodney Local Board Targeted Transport Rate) and is something many community members have been lobbying for over the years, to connect the community hall with North Crescent on both sides of the state highway. Please note the project does not extend to Moses Estate in the north or to Riverview in the south.

As some will be aware; a particular group has been sharing misinformation about the project and more concerning they have been sharing misinformation about me, the elected member on the Rodney local board who lives in the area.

This project went out for public consultation and many community members who provided feedback expressed concern about losing car parking in front of the Kaukapakapa dairy and expressed serious concern for the speed bumps, or raised pedestrian crossings, proposed for the state highway due to the noise, vibration and pollution associated with the speed table option.

Design guidelines allow for pedestrian crossings to be flat / at grade / flush with the road surface if they have kerb build outs or a centre island refuge for pedestrians (or both kerb build outs and centre refuge)

But unfortunately a small group of people, including some who are on the payroll of public entities, have been sharing misinformation and disinformation about this and have tried to lead people to believe the only way to have a pedestrian crossing is if the pedestrian crossing is also a speed bump / raised.

The Rodney local board resolved at our October meeting to investigate the design options for flat pedestrian crossings

"whakaae / review the design options with Waka Kotahi for non-raised crossings further to the local board's decision, one at the Kaukapakapa Hall close to the Kaukapakapa School and one near the petrol station"

While decisions relating to what items make our local board agenda are made by the chairperson I do expect to see this item on our agenda for discussion at our February 2024 Rodney Local Board business meeting. (This is open to the public and anyone can request a deputisation to speak for 10 minutes by emailing the staff at least 7 working days before the meeting or can request to speak for 3 minutes by showing up on the day and advising staff / the chair person you wish to address the board).

The community members who have bothered to contact me personally are almost all in support for a flat option due to the negative impacts on the community and travellers of the state highway if there were to be raised tables and speed bumps installed on the highway. The noise, vibration and additional pollution from the speed tables is something which needs to be considered and when state highway one is closed or congested we can see up to 2,000 trucks a day travel through Kaukapakapa... this is a lot of noise, vibration and extra diesel fumes from the trucks slowing down and accelerating to climb over the speed bumps.
