

Kumeū Area Maintenance Works

Following community feedback and as part of Auckland Council's commitment to keep the community safe by reducing flood risks, funding has been prioritised to increase maintenance works in the wider Kumeū area.

Work includes unblocking culverts, debris cleaning, bank stabilisation, tree clearance and other stream-related flood resilience works.

This work is critical to improving the resilience of local waterways and reducing the impact of flooding on the community.

Auckland Council is seeking local contractors with expertise in flood resilience infrastructure and knowledge of the area to carry out these necessary works.

The tender is for applicants who:

- have demonstrated capability and experience with floodrelated maintenance
- comply with our health and safety standards
- can meet our financial risk and operational capability requirements
- · are willing to follow council's stream management plan
- are based in Kumeū, Huapai, Waimauku, Taupaki, or Riverhead.





Casinos, fire, and noods at Kaipara College




In fact, people often "get stuck" on life's issues and just need some down-to-earth (including death and dying) advice- who they gonna call? CAB!

Spring to Learn to Keep Bees

The shortest day is long gone, we're on our way to spring. Anyone on the land, from gardeners, farmers and lifestylers to beekeepers are starting to prepare and plan for the coming spring; the work



never ends but a new season will soon be upon us. Beekeeping, like many outdoor activities, is at it's busiest in spring as we make sure that everything is in its best condition to make the most of the summer.

If you're considering getting into beekeeping there are three things that you should know: firstly, start in early spring; secondly, begin with a nucleus hive, this is a small hive that will quickly grow into a full-sized hive and will be easier to manage; and thirdly, learn how to keep bees. Like having kids or other animals, it certainly is possible to start and pick it up as you go along. However, it is much easier to learn a bit first; they're more likely to stay healthy and not cause a nuisance to your neighbours.

Beekeeping clubs around the country are organising their spring classes. I'm fortunate to be teaching at Auckland Beekeepers Club with their Beginners Beekeeping Class (2 days & 2 evenings), and with the more extensive Land Based Training Ltd Apiculture level three course that runs throughout the season with two Saturdays a month. Learning about bees is a gateway hobby that will soon lead to having an interest in botany, ecology, biology, crafting and even woodwork or whichever rabbit hole you choose. I love beekeeping and like many beekeepers, I love to talk about bees and beekeeping; sometimes in schools, community groups or other Beeclubs.

To be a successful beekeeper you should have an understanding of weather patterns, local flora and learn how to keep bees healthy. A beehive in a garden gives honey, more importantly though your garden will flourish and produce much more fruit and flowers than ever before. My courses enable you to learn with like-minded people in a safe relaxed environment, in which everyone can learn in the style that suits them best. This is my last shameless promotion of my classes, and we will be back to themes based around bees, honey, gardens and our environment next month.

A few fun bee facts: bees have five eyes (two compound eyes and three ocelli or simple eyes; bees have a "honey stomach" which they use to carry nectar back to the hive; bees have a "pollen basket" on their back legs to hold brightly coloured pollen; they have a "pollen press" behind their back knee to compress pollen before it goes into their hairy basket; they have a row of hamuli or hooks along the front of their rear wings, this locks both pairs of wings together in flight; bees flap their wings up to 230 time a second; summer worker bees live for 4-6 weeks and winter worker bees live for 6-8 months; bees can smell forty times as well as we can (similar to a dog); bees can sense the earth's magnetic field with magnetite cells in their abdomen (like homing pigeons and any animal that migrates); bees have polarised vision, they can see the sun on a cloudy day which they also use to navigate; bees have trichromatic vision like us but further up the spectrum - they can't see red but can see ultra violet. Learn more about bees with me.

All Hands On Deck

The Te Awaroa Museum, Helensville, was blessed to have the family of the late 'Queen of the Kaipara' Flora Thirkettle allow us to document them talking of their mother. Flora was a pioneering fisherwoman and had to fight for acceptance with doggedness and hard work. Tragically widowed, Flora was left with a young family of seven, no home or income;

"I had two choices; either go fishing or farming, both of which I knew a little about. I couldn't afford to buy land, so fishing was the option I chose. I found this house for sale right on the creek (Kaipara River) off the harbour. It came complete with 'Olive' the launch, the dory, a pair of oars and two nets. I thought if I can get good enough at fishing, I'll be able to keep up with mortgage repayments, which I did."

Flora went on to raise her family, eventually earning the trust and respect of the local fishermen and becoming the first woman nominated to membership of the Kaipara Cruising Club - causing two men to resign. In 1963, the added distinction of being the only female seagoing member of the Coastguard in the world, was a role not unfamiliar to Mrs Thirkettle. Running her 26-foot launch 'Olive' on the treacherous Kaipara Harbour, she answered many calls for assistance. "Nowadays I don't think any notice would be taken of it. There's lots of woman skippers and deck hands around now". (It is worth noting that as the times dictated, Flora always wore a dress, even whilst fishing).

Preparing for the Thirkettle family to visit took a village, thanks are due to Kaipara Tavern's Andy Cummings and the crew from the Helensville Network Group for helping us move Flora's dory from the barn to the 'Kaipara Room'. Also thanks to Zach Stark from Wylde Creative and Helen Martin for producing something coherent from our efforts.

Above all, a huge thank you to Flora's family for being so generous with their time and memories. Sons John and Reg, brother Ted, and daughters Cherry and Iris (seated), a grand legacy to her immense strength of character.

Ending the barriers to more homes, cheaper power, and lower grocery bills

Why is it so expensive to buy groceries, to rent or own a home, to keep the lights on, or to drive on safe roads?

It's because it's too hard to build anything in this country.

It often takes longer to get permission to build than to actually build. It's madness.

Consider the soon to open IKEA store in Auckland. Before they could lay a single foundation, they were required to consult seven iwi groups on "cultural monitoring, karakia, and other ceremonies" at every stage of construction. Input was required on erosion control, fencing, planting, even giving on-demand access to iwi monitors on the worksite.

Consent conditions like this drive up costs and make it harder, if not impossible to build.

This isn't an isolated absurdity. I recently obtained the resource consent for two solar farms in Central Hawke's Bay. Those resource consents demanded iwi prayers for the removal of any native plant, mandated public viewing areas, and required planting plans so detailed they specified exactly what species went where and how far apart.

That's for the lucky projects that survive. Many never even start. They're buried under layers of objections and conditions demanded by people whose property or environment isn't even affected. These veto rights aren't distributed equally, they often depend on your ancestry.

And even when projects aren't killed outright, they're smothered under conditions so thick investors give up. One of those solar companies went bust before a single shovel hit the ground.

The result is that investors take their money overseas while New Zealand misses out on jobs, growth, and the benefit of what gets built.

Meanwhile, the cost of compliance gets passed directly to you. Your power bill, your rent, and at the checkout.

At the heart of this failure is the Resource Management Act (RMA). Introduced over 30 years ago to balance development with environmental protection, it has failed at both. It's made it almost impossible to build the homes and infrastructure New Zealand needs, while doing little to genuinely protect what matters.

That's why ACT is leading the charge to scrap the RMA entirely and replace it with a system based on property rights and common sense.

Under ACT's reforms, your land will truly be your land. You'll be able to use it as you see fit, provided you don't harm others' property or the environment.

This new approach will mean homes get built. Infrastructure will finally resemble that of a first-world country, without a generation of arguing over where to put it.

Because New Zealand should be a country where people don't shiver through winter, fear blackouts, or despair of ever owning their own home.

We also know cheaper groceries demand real solutions. When

people are driving halfway across the North Island just to buy butter at Costco, you know something's broken.

ACT is advocating for a fast-track approval process for new supermarket development. It would streamline rezoning, consenting, and investment approvals so a company wanting to roll out ten stores could do so in months, not years.

It would roll out the welcome mat to the Walmarts, Aldis, and Tescos of the world to set up shop here. By removing the barriers that keep them out, we give them a reason to come.

Ultimately, this is about making New Zealand affordable again. It's about giving young Kiwis a fair shot at home ownership, and enabling the kind of economic growth that leads to more wealth, more jobs, and higher incomes for everyone.
