

Mapping a future together: South Head Community leads conservation push

More than 30 people came together at the Helensville War Memorial Hall last month to chart a future for predator control and species protection on Te Korowai-o-te-Tonga/South Head Peninsula.

Hosted by The Forest Bridge Trust (TFBT), the GAP Analysis workshop placed giant maps of the peninsula at the centre of the room. Iwi, landowners, South Kaipara Landcare, Rewild the West, Nga Maunga Whakahii o Kaipara, Auckland Council regional park rangers, the Department of Conservation, and threatened species experts gathered to mark traplines, predator hotspots, and taonga species sightings.

The result is a shared knowledge base that is now being transformed into digital GIS mapping layers to guide a long-term conservation strategy.

"Our role is not to reinvent the wheel," says Project Manager Helen Jamieson, who facilitated the workshop, "but to strengthen and connect the incredible work already happening on South Head. The enthusiasm and collaboration we saw in that room was inspiring."

Protecting precious taonga

South Head is home to some of Aotearoa's most threatened native birds. The tara iti/fairy tern, our rarest breeding bird with fewer than 40 individuals left, nests at Papakanui Spit at the peninsula's tip. The matuku-hurepo/Australasian bittern, a critically endangered wetland bird known for its booming call, still clings to survival here. And the pateke/brown teal, once widespread, remains nationally threatened but may recover in South Head's dune lakes and estuaries.

Building on strong foundations

The two-year DOC Community Fund project throws some additional support behind an already active project. TFBT aims to unite these community efforts into a coordinated predator control network. The peninsula has been divided into two zones:

- Northern "tip" (8,500 hectares): intensive predator control to support existing DOC, Ngahere forestry, and community traplines.
- **Southern "buffer" (16,700 hectares):** strengthening and expanding community-led predator control efforts.

TFBT will bring its expertise in GIS mapping, digital tools, and predator control to complement community knowledge. Predator Control Team member Cam Rathe is coordinating deployment of remotely monitored traps, mobile arrays, and trail cameras to help build a connected predator-free landscape.

Community learning in action

The first event following the GAP Analysis was a matukuhurepo workshop at Waioneke School, featuring guest speakers Wendy Ambury (Love Bittern) and Boyd Steel (Project 700). Locals learned more about the ecology of this elusive bird and what can be done to protect it.

Looking forward

With the GAP Analysis complete, The Forest Bridge Trust will compile and share a strategic conservation plan through **our newly appointed South Head Community Liaison, Heather Steadman**. This plan will guide work during the DOC-funded project and provide a framework the community can continue to grow long into the future.

"This project reflects our long-term vision," says the TFBT team. "It's about native species thriving across Rodney, with engaged communities and connected habitats."

The Forest Bridge Trust acknowledges the work undertaken by Nga Maunga Whakahii, South Kaipara Landcare, Auckland Council and Department of Conservation, whose funding is enabling this critical work on South Head to take flight.



From the Kaipara College Principal's Desk:

Kaipara College: Fact Over Fiction

Imagine opening your local paper and seeing the headline: "Local School Condones Vaping, Violence and Racism." Outrage would be immediate. Many would believe it without hesitation. Others might even share it online before pausing to consider if it's true.

But in this case, that headline is false. Fake news spreads quickly, and sadly, it often drowns out the truth. We live in an age where judgement is swift, outrage comes easily, and fact-checking often gets left behind.

At Kaipara College, accusations like these are levelled against us almost daily—usually without any verification. The reality is that 97% of our students are outstanding young people who embody our school's WAKA values with embody respect, compassion, celebrating difference, and striving for success. These values underpin our teaching, our culture, and our everyday practice.

Of course, a small number—around 3%—make poor choices around vaping, aggression, or disrespect. But these behaviours are not taught at Kaipara. Students arrive at secondary school at 13 with values and worldviews already shaped by family, trauma, community, society, and increasingly, the influence of social media. Unlearning harmful patterns takes time, patience, and support.

That is why Kaipara College takes a restorative approach. We don't shy away from addressing issues, but we do so through processes that rebuild relationships, foster understanding, and help students grow into decent young adults. Our Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) framework and restorative practices are woven through both our teaching and our discipline systems. This isn't "soft"—it is courageous, demanding work that leads to genuine, lasting change.

So next time you hear someone say there's a "fight culture" at Kaipara College, or that vaping is unchecked, or that racism is tolerated, we encourage you to pause. Ask: is this fact, or just noise? The truth is that Kaipara College is a school committed every day to respect, restoration, and positive futures for all our young people.

Pollination Nation: Why Beekeepers matter more than ever -Revealing the true economic value of Beekeepers in Aotearoa

Apiculture in New Zealand is currently in a state of flux, with so many competing interests in a relatively small industry it is unsurprising that we beekeepers cannot reach a consensus.

There is a saying amongst beekeepers – ask five beekeepers a question and you'll receive six and a half answers. This highlights the idea that beekeepers often have differing opinions from each other and even with themselves. NZ's national beekeeping organisation has morphed from NBA to APINZ almost ten years ago; only recently APINZ was to wind up with a loss of confidence, but they have been brought back from the brink with an agreement

Other competing organisations had attempted to form a new national organisation, but no one could agree on which sectors should be included and who left out – contenders include: commercial beekeepers, hobbyist beekeepers, honey packers, honey exporters, honey buyers, pollinators, pollination recipients, researchers, regulators etc. Who should be given a seat at the table? On the face of it, it should be quite simple, with beekeepers running their own industry-led organisation, but who actually has an interest? With the rise of Manuka honey exports, it had rejuvenated our beekeeping industry but peaked with an unsustainable 930,000 hives (the highest number of hives in the world at the time, both per capita and per km²). The boom times are over, and the industry has corrected itself and there are now less than 500,000 hives.

Manuka honey had been a boon to the industry but it had also created instability with some new entrants drawn by high returns without long term commitment to bee health and a sustainable industry. This has given the perception of beekeepers being wealthy bee farmers selling a luxury product. I feel that the industry has lost sight of what its core purpose is and the actual benefits that it provides to NZ.

Honey prices have been languishing at a low ebb for years due to over-supply and loss of faith in the purity of bulk honey on the international market. Honey could be seen as a by-product of our industry; honey accounted for \$419 million in exports last year and probably \$70 million nationally. Consider the importance of pollination; this is worth over \$5 billion to our country's exports. Beekeepers are the stewards of pollination in our country, not only the introduced honey bee but also the important wild pollinators. Bees are one of our most delicate livestock and reflect the health of our country. NZ's reputation overseas as a clean green country (whether entirely accurate is another discussion) adds value to most of our exports and should be maintained to the best of our abilities. With the accidental introduction of the deadly Varroa destructor mite 25 years ago we no longer have wild/feral honey bees, therefore beekeepers are essential for pollination.

It is surprising how many industries rely on beekeepers, directly and indirectly. Many crops rely on the honey bee for pollination including kiwifruit; apples and pears; stone fruit; berries; other fruits and vegetables; and seed crops. Also, honey bees pollinate clover which besides feeding livestock helps to fix nitrogen into the soil, reducing the use of imported fertilizers. There are other industries that indirectly benefit from bees, including forestry, viticulture, cosmetics, traditional medicine, tourism and research.

We need to re-evaluate our focus around pollination, collaboration and stewardship, working together for a sustainable future in the land of full fat milk and honey.

Working Towards a New Secondary School for Northwest Auckland

One of the issues I hear most often from local families is the urgent need for another secondary school in our part of Auckland. With rapid growth in the northwest, it's no surprise that existing schools - primary and secondary alike - are under real pressure. Parents want their children to learn close to home, without spending hours each week commuting across to the North Shore or into town. Students and teachers deserve classrooms that aren't overcrowded, meanwhile, with the right facilities to support their learning.

That's why I've been continuing to push hard for a new high school to be built in the area. While this has been a long-running conversation, the need has only become more pressing as our population continues to expand. We're a growing, dynamic community and our education infrastructure has to keep pace.

I have been raising this issue with colleagues in government and the Ministry of Education at every opportunity. The latter advise that they are working on securing land in northwest Auckland but, as this "update" has remained unchanged for the past few years, it's a matter of some frustration that they have not yet landed this.

From my perspective, it's not just about classrooms, important as those are: it's also about building strong communities where young people can thrive close to where they live.

In the meantime, I'll keep working alongside local principals, Boards of Trustees and parents to make sure that pressure is relieved where it can, augmenting the facilities of our excellent existing schools. But ultimately, with rolls growing towards capacity everywhere, a new secondary school is the long-term solution, and that's what I'll continue to fight for on your behalf.



Fixing what matters: Safer communities as youth crime falls

Once upon a time, New Zealand's approach to youth crime was little more than tag and release. A young offender could ramraid a shop on Friday, be back on the street by Saturday, and repeat the cycle by Sunday. It was a revolving door that left shopkeepers, families, and entire communities paying the price.

For too long, offenders knew the system was soft. Victims were forgotten, and communities felt abandoned.

But things are changing, and fast. Thanks to the hard work of Police and the leadership of ACT's Minister for Children, Karen Chhour, we're seeing a remarkable turnaround.

Serious and persistent youth offending is down 14.6 percent compared to June 2023. Ram raids are falling. Repeat offending is dropping. Communities up and down the country are beginning to feel safer again.

This isn't by accident. It's because ACT's relentless focus on fixing what matters across all areas of Government.

At Oranga Tamariki facilities, Karen Chhour has ensured the basics are finally in place. Locks actually work. Staff wear uniforms. And if a young offender climbs onto the roof, they don't get rewarded with a bucket of KFC anymore.

These might sound like small changes, but they're changing the culture inside youth justice facilities.

Karen has also ensured support is there for at-risk young people by directing investment into upskilling the social worker workforce. This will mean staff are better prepared to guide young people back onto the right path. More than \$103 million over four years is being invested into upgrading youth justice residences and funding initiatives to reduce reoffending.

These improvements are about both security and rehabilitation: making sure facilities are safe for staff and the community, while giving young offenders the tools to turn their lives around.

On the front line, Police deserve real credit too. More officers on the beat mean more visibility, quicker responses, and stronger deterrence.

Ram raids, which once dominated the headlines, are becoming the exception instead of the expectation.

And there's more to come. The wider roll-out of Military-Style Academies for the worst offenders is on its way. These academies will provide discipline, structure, and training – exactly what's needed to stop a teenager from graduating to a lifetime of crime. They will take the most persistent offenders out of communities, give them routine, and show them that actions come with responsibilities. That's how you break the cycle.

Of course, if we're serious about preventing crime in the long run, we need to start even earlier. That's where my colleague David Seymour is making real progress.

As Associate Education Minister, David has overseen the rise in school attendance to pre-Covid levels. In Term 2 this year, nearly 60 percent of students attended school regularly, up more than 11 percentage points compared with 2023. Chronic absence is also falling.

Why does this matter for crime? Because kids who are in school are less likely to be on the streets causing trouble. They're learning, building connections, and preparing for a future that doesn't involve the justice system. Attendance is the first step toward better life outcomes and ultimately, safer communities.

Karen is fixing Oranga Tamariki, Police are tackling crime headon, and David Seymour is lifting school attendance. Together, these changes add up to safer communities and better futures for our young people.

For the small business owner who's had enough of replacing their shopfront window. For the parents who want their kids safe when walking home after sport practice. For the victims who deserve justice instead of excuses. These changes matter.


